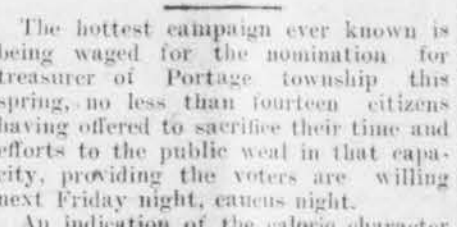
It is expected that five copper country bowling teams will leave tomorrow morning for Marquette to participate in the Upper Peninsula Bowling League tournament.

Boyle Appointed Postmaster.
J. H. Boyle has received notice of his appointment as postmaster at the village of Bark River. The appointment brings to an end a contest that had extended through several months.

Two Full Moons This Month.
For the first time in forty years, up- per peninsula people may see a full moon twice in the same month. It is said this condition will not occur again for another forty years. During February's entire twenty-eight days, a full moon was not visible.

Soo Debaters Defeated.
In the debate at Potoskey between teams representing Central High school, Sault Ste. Marie, and the Potoskey school, the Soo team lost. The decision of the judges was unanimous. The Soo team consisted of Carl Barton, George Comb and Paul Pare. The Potoskey team is ranked among the best in the state.

Hotel Property at the Soo Is Sold.
Negotiations for the sale of the Hotel Belvedere at the Soo, owned by Joseph Burchill, Eliza Burchill, his wife, were consummated when James H. McDonald received a warranty deed for the property. This will not affect the leasehold interest of P. R. Downey, proprietor of the hotel business. His lease will continue. This is one of the largest real estate transfers in the Soo for several months. For the last two years the Burchills have resided in Detroit. They are in failing health and will go to the Pacific coast to make their permanent home.

Will Form County Fair Circuit.
Representatives of the Canadian Soo, Newberry and Manistique fair associations will meet with the managers and directors of the Chippewa County Agricultural society in the Soo next Saturday for the purpose of forming a circuit and arranging dates for the fair fairs which will not conflict. With such an arrangement it is hoped to obtain race horses and other attractions which could not come if longer jumps were to be made. This custom has long been successfully followed farther south, where a dozen or more organizations unite, but it must be limited here on account of the shorter season of fall exhibits.

Hot Contest at Stephenson.
The expected dullness in the village election at Stephenson changed into a brisk campaign, and ninety-eight votes were polled, where a possible thirty or forty were looked for. Of the ninety-eight votes, eight were thrown out on account of irregularities. After the caucus, a week before, when every candidate was nominated by acclamation, an opposition candidate for village president appeared, Dr. Albert Sanders opposing DeWitt Brown, the caucus nominee. As Dr. Sanders was obliged to run on slips and no electioneering was allowed inside of a 100-foot distance from the polls, the doctor's supporters had a big task before them here on account of the shorter season of fall exhibits.

PREPARES FIGURES ON DROUGHT FREQUENCY

Weather Bureau Has Interesting Data on Precipitation the Last Twenty Years.

Droughts in this part of the upper peninsula are not a common occurrence. This is shown by a special report prepared this week by the Marquette weather bureau office. The information is compiled for a government agricultural atlas to be issued shortly by the department of agriculture. The report covers the twenty-year period from 1895 to 1914, inclusive.

The following table shows the number of times during the period mentioned that precipitation to the amount of 25 inch or more in twenty-four consecutive hours did not occur during the season from April 1 to Sept. 30, usually referred to as the growing season, for periods of ten, twenty, thirty and forty consecutive days:

HIGHEST VESSEL IN ALL THE NAVIES

Huge Dreadnought Pennsylvania, Launched Yesterday, to Cost More Than \$13,000,000.

Newport News, Va., March 16.—When the new super-dreadnought Pennsylvania slipped from the ways into the historic waters of Hampton Roads here today she took her place in the lead of the British monster carries larger guns, her main battery is only two-thirds the size of that of the Pennsylvania in number and the American battleship is 3,000 tons greater in size.

The main battery of the Pennsylvania will consist of ten 14-inch, 45 calibre rifles, four turrets, three guns to a turret, the plan of big gun arrangement adopted in the sister ships which preceded her, the Nevada and Oklahoma. Her tonnage measurement is 31,400 tons, and she will carry 27,000 tons of coal and 2,000 tons of oil.

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SOLDIERS' ORPHANS RECEIVE GOOD CARE

Movement to Look After Them, Started Spontaneously, Now Well Organized.

Eretat, France, March 3.—[Correspondence of the Associated Press].—Six hundred orphans and half-orphans of the war are having the time of their lives in this channel fishing port and resort, some of them enjoying the luxury of apartments that rent for from \$3 a day up in the bathing season.

A soldier waiting for the day to join his regiment asked Emil Vitta of the Universite Populaire in Paris: "What are we going to do with our children? We can't leave them alone to become vagabonds in the street."

The result justified Monsieur Vitta's confidence. As soon as his work became known its development was rapid. INCREASE IN PASSENGER RATES

Recent Decision by United States Supreme Court Practically Makes Action by the Legislature Mandatory—Progress Being Made in Solving Great Question.

The legislative investigation which has been in progress since the railroads made their request to the Legislature for an increase in passenger fares has served to clear up misconceptions which existed regarding the status of railroads in their relations to the State and to bring about a rational understanding of the needs of the railroads as common carriers and servants of the people.

An encouraging sign is that the old cry of "Politics" has been dropped and the members of the present Legislature are showing a commendable spirit in dealing with the subject matter as an economic factor which vitally concerns the welfare of every industry in the State.

How vitally everyone is interested in the railroads was shown by the questions asked: What sources have the railroads for revenue? The answer is simplicity itself. There are but two sources—Freight Rates and Passenger Rates—and these combined must yield sufficient revenue to enable the railroads to pay their operating expenses and taxes and earn a fair rate of interest on the property.

The fundamental question presented is whether the validity of the passenger rate can be determined by its effect upon the passenger business of the company, separately considered. What has been said in the opinion in Northern Pacific Railway Company vs. North Dakota, decided this day (ante 1-11), makes an extended discussion of this question unnecessary.

It is apparent, from every point of view that this record permits, that the statutory rate is a very narrow margin over the cost of the traffic. It is manifestly not a case where substantial compensation is permitted and where we are asked to enter the domain of the legislative discretion; nor is it one in which it is necessary to determine the value of the property employed in the intrastate business.

After an exhaustive investigation by the Interstate Commerce Commission, which showed that the railroads could not carry passengers for two cents per mile except at a loss, authority was granted by this Commission to the Railroads in all of the Eastern States, to increase their passenger fares to two and one-half cents per mile for all journeys from one State to another.

Governor Ferris, Lieutenant-Governor Dickenson, Secretary of State Vaughn, State Treasurer Haarer, Auditor-General Fuller and many other members of the Governor's official family, as well as the entire State Railroad Commission and hundreds of heads of large business concerns and manufacturing industries, based on the figures submitted by the railroads and verified by the report presented by request to the Legislature by the Railroad Commission, have declared that the present Legislature should give the railroads increased compensation by passing the proposed law.

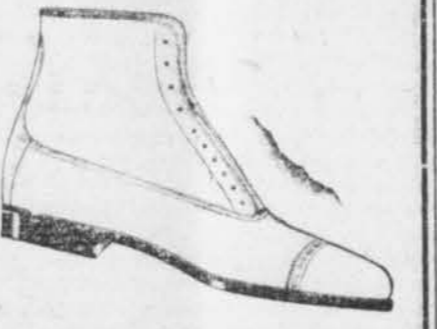
