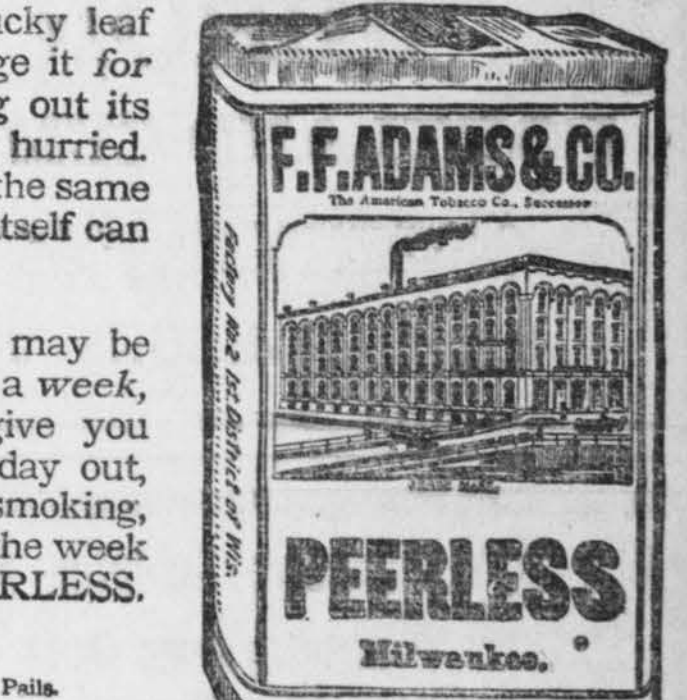

NATIONAL DEFENSE LEAGUE WANTS 100 NEW SUBMARINES.

Washington, July 19.—Congress should appropriate for one hundred submarines at the next session, according to a statement issued here today by the National Defense League.

"A recent account, widely printed by the press, that the general navy board recommended appropriations for at least thirty submarines and that these will be included in the naval estimates to be sent to the next congress by Secretary Daniels, is all right as far as it goes, but it does not go far enough," according to the league's statement. "I am more than ever convinced that the United States should have another hundred submarines, at least fifty of them stationed on the Pacific coast, more battleships, and several battle cruisers, besides a sufficient number of auxiliary vessels."

"The United States now has a total of seventy submarines, built or building, but many of those now in commission are obsolete and practically worthless. If congress will provide at the next session 100 new submarines, with the submarines now authorized, or building, with those that are in commission which are really efficient and seaworthy, the navy will then have a fleet of approximately 150 modern boats that will be able to protect the Atlantic and Pacific coast lines, Alaska, Hawaii, the Philippine and the Panama Canal," is the assertion of the league.

"While most of the new submarines should be coast and harbor defense vessels, a suitable proportion should be sea-going craft with a cruising radius of at least 3,000 miles, a radius large enough to enable the boats to be shifted from coast line to coast line, through the Panama canal, and from the Pacific coast to Alaska or Hawaii under their own power."

Lansing, Mich., July 19.—Owners of abutting property on lakes which have no inlet or outlet have a common right to fish and boat in any portion of the lake, according to an opinion rendered by Attorney General Fellows.

They can go where they will on the lake to fish, provided of course they are not guilty of trespassing on the shore lands of another.

WAR HAS BOOSTED COST OF LIVING

Report of Bureau of Labor Shows How Prices Abroad Have Been Affected.

Washington, July 19.—How the cost of living has been increased in Europe by the war is shown in a study just completed by the bureau of labor statistics.

The report shows that the first effect of the war was the same practically throughout Europe. Its outbreak was followed by a sharp rise in prices due mainly to panic and uncertainty.

"The price figures available are somewhat incomplete, but almost everywhere the upward tendency of prices appears. Potatoes was one of the few articles which showed a fall in price in most of the more important countries.
