They market prices by making necessary readjustments in the scale of retail prices, but they are chiefly concerned over the growing searcity of many important railroad tracks, Mrs. Pultan was thrown drugs in every day demand for compounding prescriptions.

As for the price advances, it is genortilly conceded that so long as the war demand continues there is no hope for a return to anything like normal prices. Conditions governing the trade are decidedly unfavorable,and outsiness is hampered because of the previously mentioned scarcity and high prices, both of which are becoming more serious each week. Predictions as to how high the prices will eventually soar appear practically worthless under present conditions, but in the opinion of the druggists "the worst is yet to come."

Assistant Secretary of the Navy Says The Undersea Boat Has Not Replaced the Battleship.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, assistant see retary of the navy, sees the value of the submarine; but it has its limitations. and, writing in the North American Review, he says "without hesitation that it has not replaced the battleship as the principal factor in war at sea. 

CARE OF INTERNED COSTS MUCH MONEY In France Alone Outlay Is at the

Rate of \$35,000,000 a Year.

Paris, Oct. 10 .- (Correspondence of the Associated Press.)-The supervision and support of subjects of belligerent countries interned or allowed to reside in France has given the government a vast amount of work and entailed an expense of approximately \$35,000,000 to date.

"The government's policy has been to treat justly all subjects of countries at war with France residing within its territory at the outbreak of the war and to treat them as liberally as the necessary precautions for the nation's security would permit," the Associated Press is informed by Minister of the Interior Malvy, upon whom this great responsibility has devolved.

"At the beginning of hostilities," he continued, "it became necessary to interne in concentration camps 30,000 subjects of countries at war with France. That number has been reduced to 14,-000 by the repatriation of a certain number by agreement between the interested powers, and by according to other residence permits that seemed to be justified by their ethnological origin or other considerations.

"The Poles, Tcheques and Alsatians and the Austrians of Italian origin natives of Trentino have benefitted from these exceptional measures. Residence permits have been issued to 1,124 Germans and 576 Austrians. Some of them are naturalized Germans whose attitude towards France has been correct in all circumstances. Some are fathers of boys serving in our armies. Others are old and tried servants in French, English or American families who are vouched for by their employers.
