Upper Peninsula Secures More Power. The turning of a switch last week at the Escanaba Traction company's new No. 3 dam, on the Escanaba river at Chandler's Falls, made available for Escanaba and Delta county's industries an additional motive force of 3,200 horse-power. With the turning of the switch the traction company was given a reserve store of electric power that will be used in moving the wheels of present and future industries of Escanaba and the surrounding district. Some of the power furnished from the new dam for the present will be used at the plant of the Escanaba Pulp & Paper company, where additional grinders are being installed, making possible the doubling of the pulp output.
