Biscuits are in the quick bread family and are really easy to make even though many homemakers complain more about making biscuits than anything else. The technique is simple but exacting. Once you have learned to make tender, flaky biscuits, it is easier to make them right than to make them wrong. The secret is accurate measuring of ingreeidents and thorough, speedy mixing. This gives you a dough that is oft and well-mixed; soft dough makes the lightest, most tender biscuit and well-blended dough results in a fine even texture.

# Compromise

The City-County Department of Public Works (CCDPW) are currently holding a series of public hearings to obtain citi-zens' suggestions of methods to improve the existing School-craft County sold waste collection system. At the three meetings that have already been completed, many of the more vocal citizens, especially commercial cus-tomers, have been calling for a county-wide "free enterprise" system

many of the more vocal citizens, expessing terminations, take been calling for a county-wide "free enterprise" system. While a few of the "free enterprise" advocates simply ob-jected to public officials making choices in their names, most of the citizens supported "free enterprise" because it would give them the opportunity to hire the cheapest available dis-posal service. Morey, the "bottom line", is a great concern among area commercial customers. Cutting operating costs can lead to profiles, insuring that a business can survive. But just because "free enterprise" may be in the best inter-ests of area business, it is not necessarily in the best interset of all Scholarat County residents.

ests of area business, it is not necessarily in the best interest of all Schoolcardin County residents. It is feared by some that outlying residents-- a senior citizen who lives 10 miles down the road and puts out one bag of trash a week, for example-- may be ignored by the "free enterprise" hauler who would not make a profit by seeking out such customers.

Individual and commercial clients have different factors to consider when they form an opinion of what type of system will serve them best. If nothing else comes out of these hear-ings, the CCDPW should realize that our County, though relatively small, has diverse waste disposal needs. These needs may not be met by a sweeping exclusive contract. Likewise, they may not be met by a loose "free enterprise" system.

Having individuals adhere to an exclusive contract while allowing commercial customers the freedom to choose their a system practiced in other communities -- may be an

appropriate solution for our area. There is not an easy solution for our waste disposal dispute, and compromises will have to be made by all parties involved for the best interest of the entire County
