## School starts a week late

School started this week in Manistique, even though teacher and support staff contracts have not been ratified by the school board or teacher's union. Manistique Area Schools Superintendent Dr. Herb Harroun said students and teachers are geared-up and ready to go back to the classrooms. "I'm glad we finally got school started," he said. "When the kids don't know when they are going to start, it takes all the fun away from school."

Harroun said school officials and teacher union representatives hammered out a one year agreement. "We are not releasing details about the contract until it is ratified by the school board, but there is not a lot of language change (in the new contract)," he said. "It was hard to talk money when we were all waiting for the results of Proposal A, the Headlee Override election and the state package."

Harroun said school will open until June 9 for students and June 10 for teachers because of the week delay in classes. "We will still be off on Nov. 15 and 16 for the opening of deer hunting season," he said. "If we try to stay for the beginning of the season, we always have problems."

## EPA turns down initial proposal from PRPs

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) turned down Manistique Papers' and Edison Sault's proposal to permanently cap harbor PCB contaminated sediments during the current construction season. According to Manistique Papers' spokesperson, the plan is down, but not dead. "The EPA did not feel permanent capping was a viable option for this construction season," said Eric Bourdo. "The EPA's Community Relations Coordinator for Manistique Harbor said there are many reasons the EPA did not feel the plan could be undertaken this year."

signed permission from all the people with interest in the harbor," he said, "which is the entire community." "They would also have to get permission from all the people who use the waterway." "After that, they would need signed permission from the Lake Michigan Carriers Association and the Michigan Department of Transportation. "All these groups must fully understand and have no objections to the action."

Leveque also noted the PCB levels in the harbor are too high to get by the Toxic Substances and Control Act (TSCA), which regulates where PCBs are to be disposed of. "The harbor is not designated as an area for PCB disposal," he said. "PCB levels are too high so the TSCA requirements would never be met."

## State troopers make drug arrests in area

The subjects were arraigned on Saturday where bond was set at \$100,000 after being charged with manufacturing CAT, possession of CAT. Continued on page 4A

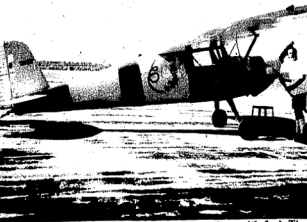
## Summer means an increase in business

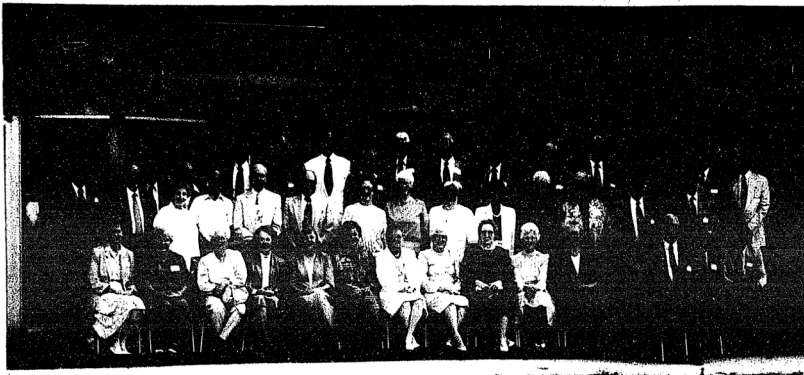

### At home with Sarah

Meat is the hub of the meal for the average American family. Occasionally we enjoy making a very special meat entree, either a deluxe cut or a unique way to prepare a regular cut. This makes for a special meal. Rouladins are just such a dish. They are made with round steak and though they are fussy to prepare, they make a special dinner fit for the most honored guests.

**ROULADINS**

3 pounds round steak	1 teas. Worcestershire Sauce
1 pkg. seasoned stuffing mix	2 teas. prepared mustard
1 large onion, chopped	1 can beef broth or 1 cup hot water with beef bouillon
1/2 large fresh mushrooms, sliced or 8 oz. can mushroom pieces	
garlic, salt, and pepper	
1/2 oz. can tomato sauce	

Prepare stuffing per directions and cool. Pound steak to 1/4 inch. Cut into 8 pieces. (Make pieces fairly good size in order to be able to roll and tie.) Put stuffing on center of each piece of meat. Cover with onions and mushrooms. Roll up and tie with string. Coat with flour, salt, and pepper. Brown slowly in hot oil in a frying pan. Remove to Dutch oven or crock pot. To the dripping in the frying pan add: tomato sauce, Worcestershire sauce, mustard, and beef broth. Pour over Rouladins. Bake, covered, at 325 degrees for one hour or until meat is tender, or cook in crock pot for 4-6 hours. If necessary thicken broth with corn starch. Makes 8 rouladins.

 The driver of the vehicle also had a suspended license.

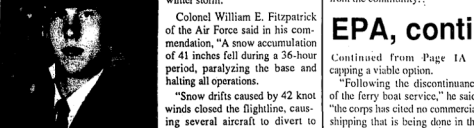

 I guess when you are from a large city where there are many high schools, the true fans seem to be widely dispersed throughout the community.

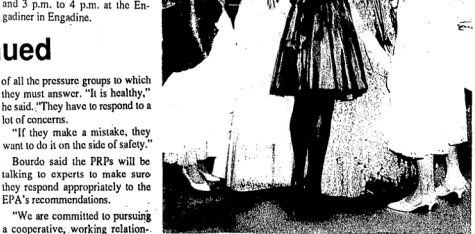
Sure, there were some intense rivalries, but nothing that can compare to the constant support received by area teams.

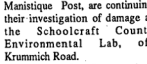

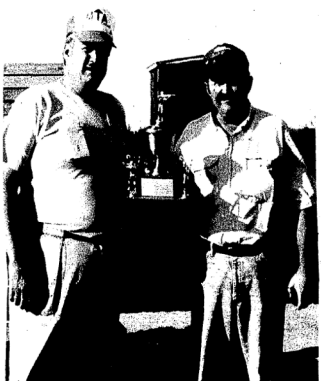

# Seul Choix fisheries of Northern Michigan

## Memories

Talk about exciting... "Pauls Netting Gazette" March 1933 issue was just donated to the Gulliver Historical Society by the family of the late Leonore F. Goudreau Fish. (born August 29, 1895-died July 31, 1993). The story printed tells about the name of Goudreau outstanding in development of prominent fishing locally. The following story was written by Mrs. John Goudreau (dec.) of Gulliver, Michigan, mother of Mary Agnes Wachter.

Seul Choix (pronounced "Sell-Shwa") is located on the northern shore of Lake Michigan, about 25 miles from Manistique. A beautiful lighthouse is situated at the end of Seul Choix Point where the three keepers' families are located. The chief occupation of the people is commercial fishing.

The point was given the French name Seul Choix, meaning "only choice," many years ago when a French steamer, caught in a severe storm, took shelter in the bay beyond the point. The only place of shelter which the crew could find and thus their "only choice."

The present population (1933) is less than one hundred, but in years gone by it ranged as high as seven hundred. At that time, sailing schooners from Chicago would gather the fish, all of which were salted in barrels. Several years later a boat named the "A. Booth," made two round trips a week and took the fish in a fresh state to the market. Another boat, the "Lady Washington," on her way from loading a cargo of fish sank in Seul Choix Bay, but all lives were saved. At the present time Seul Choix might be called "Goudreau Point," for all the fisheries are operated and the land owned by various members of the Goudreau family. How this came about is an interesting story.

The first Goudreau to come to Seul Choix was Amable Goudreau,

a Frenchman from Three Rivers, Canada. Working south, little by little, in his trade of blacksmithing, he finally discovered the business possibilities of fishing off Seul Choix Point. He is known as the first man to set a pond net for commercial purposes on the northern shore of Lake Michigan. His seven sons carried on the fishing tradition, but the only one of them still active in fishing operations is his son, Isaac, who fishes with one boat and nine pond nets.

Of the younger generation, the three brothers, John, Harvey and Vern, all following their father's footsteps by sticking to the fishing game. John's fisheries are located in the bay known as Gull Point where he operates two boats, eight pond nets and several traps nets. Harvey and Vern are situated at what is known as the "Harbor," an unusual natural harbor where nature has placed a ledge of rocks extending into the water to serve as a breakwater. Harvey operates one boat and four pond nets. Vern, the "baby" of the family, at the present time operates on shares with his mother, the fishery that his father, Amable Goudreau II, conducted for so many years. It consists of two boats and seven pond nets. William, the only son of the late Alex Goudreau, operated his own and also his mother's fishery which is equipped with two boats and eight pond nets. They are located at the harbor.

The boats now used range in length from 22 ft. to 28 ft. - all gas boats from a Kahlenberg to a Ford engine. The types of fish caught are chiefly Whitefish and trout, and the fisheries are eight

and ten miles south of the railroad to which the fish are taken by truck for the New York markets. The trucks are also used for direct shipment to Chicago. Shipments made daily except Sunday.

The Goudreaus are a hardy and persistent folk-they must be, for Seul Choix is considered one of the roughest fishing points on Lake Michigan. Besides the accident of the "Lady Washington," mentioned above, many other ex-

men found the bodies of five men and one woman who had attempted to save themselves in the life boat. One man survived, but he was so crazed from the experience that not until three days later was any information gathered from him.

A few years later, John's father Amable Goudreau II, by quick thinking saved the lives of seven men who were in a life boat which met a situation similar to that of

Goudreau says that he is going to make a decoration for his new fish shed as a result of the last important accident. About 25 years ago, a flour boat, the "Rochester," getting too far down under the Lighthouse point and running to shallow, almost broke in two just off his fishery. The well known "Favorite" pulled her out, but one of her anchors of this type used 70 years ago is still there. (This same anchor may be viewed in front of the Manistique water tower donated in memory of George and Martin Goudreau.)

When John pulls it out this summer with his lighter and a winch, he will have an antique, the like of which many museums cannot boast of owning.

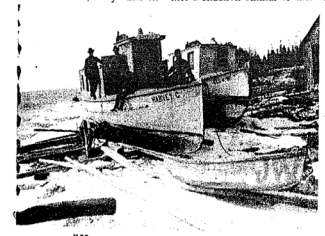
Because the Point at Seul Choix is one of the roughest on Lake Michigan, the Goudreaus require very strong tugs to stand the test. Practically all of the twine used is knitted by Paul's Fish Net Company at Chicago and gives them splendid success. This concludes the article from Paul's Netting Gazette.

When speaking to the descendants of these first pioneers, the one thing that comes out in all conversations is, it was a very hard life and they had a lot of work. Robert Goudreau, son of Vern, remembers working with his dad setting pond nets. The hardest part was driving the 50 ft. long tamarack stakes into the bottom of the lake. "My dad and I built our own 'Spiral Drive' and the sand was jettied away as the spiral drive drove the poles down." The Goudreaus normally fished for Whitefish, but occasionally during the Jewish holidays caught suckers and shipped them to the Standard Fish Company and the Fred Willmer Fish company in Chicago. The pond stones to anchor the net price was always higher at this
