"THOUGHT IT WAS A DEER."

Every year during the deer hunting season, the newspapers of the upper peninsula are kept fairly busy chronicling the accidental slaying of human beings by fool hunters who roam the woods armed with high power guns that send a bullet great distances through the woods. These accidents occur through the propensity of such hunters to blaze away at random every time they see a movement or hear a noise in the brush. In such an instance, the shooting of a human being through mistake is deplorable enough but when such a thing occurs during the closed season for deer hunting it is an act of criminal carelessness which should be severely punished. Such an incident was that which occurred last Sunday when Guy Harlow of Lathrop lost his life as the result of the carelessness and cowardice of a rattle-headed hunter. During the deer hunting season one who goes into the woods takes numerous precautions to so attire himself that none but the veriest addeptate would make the criminal mistake of taking him for legitimate game. In the closed season it is different; people go into the woods with no thought of danger from this source, and neglect—and rightfully, too—all precautions for safety which they would take during the open season. The law of this state provides a heavy penalty for the accidental shooting of a human being during the open season and the

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doubtful crime of Edward Shipley, who while hunting in the closed season, caused the death of Guy Harlow, should be held up to the hunters of the upper peninsula as a warning, not to be disregarded except at great cost. Too much stress can not be laid upon the wrong of hunting deer out of season; nor of hastily blazing away at objects, the nature of which the marksman is not absolutely certain. Were such tactics universally followed, the number of deaths and injuries resulting every season from this cause would be materially decreased. So long as fools are permitted to roam the woods with guns there will be accidents of this kind and the inexcusable excuse will ever be, he "thought it was a deer."

SUICIDE AND INSANITY

New York is shocked over the fact that 433 cases of suicide have occurred in that city in the last seven months. The increase is not confined to New York, but is general throughout the whole country. At the same time the census bureau reports a great increase in the number of insane. There are more than twice as many hospitals for the insane as there were 13 years ago, and most of them are full. The number of inmates has grown from 40,000 in 1880 to 74,000 in 1890 and 150,000 on December 31, 1903. The number of insane in hospitals per 100,000 population increased from 81.6 in 1880 to 186.2 in 1903. Suicide and insanity are so closely related that increase in the one is naturally accompanied by increase in the other. Perhaps insanity is greater or less degree is more common than most of us suspect. Eminent alienists say that none of us are wholly sane. Many of the world's wisest men are known to have had a tinge of melancholy in their blood and to have been subject at times to periods of great depression. Napoleon at the beginning of his career was in great financial distress and was prevented from drowning himself only by the timely pecuniary aid of a schoolmate. Bismark is said to have declared after the battle of Sedan that he would have killed himself had the Prussians been beaten. Byron while writing "Childe Harold," said he would have blown out his brains but for the reflection that it would give pleasure to his mother-in-law. Reasons for self-destruction are often very curious. Men

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have put an end to their lives to escape toothache or other pains. The dread of disease has been known to effect the mind to such an extent that the victim has destroyed himself rather than face it. Joshua B. Riddle of Jefferson City, Mo., recently killed himself because he was too fat. Irene Bogbins of Atlantic City, took her life because she had a new lavender dress to be buried in. George H. Smith of New York believed himself too old at 45. Representative Adams of Pennsylvania killed himself because he had lost money and found himself with only his salary of \$5,000 a year.

One need not be an alienist to be able to see, from these trivial causes and the countless other almost trivial ones which have caused the recent epidemic of suicide, that insanity in some form enters into it. No sound mind could dwell upon such trifles. No mind properly balanced could approach self destruction.

What is the matter with our American life that it thus unsettles brains with increasing regularity? It even affects those who come into it from the outside more severely than our own, for insanity is found to be more prevalent among foreign-born than native-born.

Men are going crazy at a more rapid rate than women; and laborers and servants more surely than those of higher occupations. Soo News
