EX-PRESIDENT OUTLINES BULL MOOSE POLICY IN SPEECH AT PITTSBURG

Speaking of the two men, he said: "I'm glad to speak for such men. By their lives they have honored the republic. It would be supreme good fortune to have them in public positions."

HOUSE HOSTILE TO PROPOSED JUBILEE

Washington, June 30.—A bill to create a commission and appropriate \$25,000 for the proposed celebration of the anniversary of the signing of the treaty of Ghent and one hundred years of peace between the English-speaking nations was brought up in the house today, on suspension of the rules and was defeated by a vote of 52 to 185.

BRITISH FOLK URGED TO GET OUT OF MEXICO

The fear that the spread of the Mexican federal troops might result in an uprising in Mexico City caused the British residents there to hold a meeting on Saturday night to arrange final plans for the defense of the concentration district.

British refugees who arrived here today and who had attended the meeting said the general opinion expressed there was that Provisional President Huerta's hold on the situation in the capital was wavering. Many predicted an uprising or a revolt of the federal army within a week or ten days.

Mexico City, June 30.—In view of the existing conditions in Mexico, Sir Lionel Carden, the British minister, today advised all British subjects temporarily to leave the country. He said that the shortage of fuel used in the operation of trains was growing more acute daily and that the trains probably soon would stop running, which would make difficult the departure of persons in the interior.

Eight hundred British subjects are registered at the legation as now residing in Mexico City. It is the minister's plan to get a sufficient number of these to sign an agreement to leave the capital, so that they can obtain a special train from the Mexican government to take them to Puerto, Mex., and also obtain a transport to convey the passengers to Jamaica, where they could remain until the close of the present Mexican trouble.

In well-informed circles it is reported that General Angel Garcia Pena, who was minister of war in the Madero administration but is now one of Huerta's commanders, is to be a candidate for the presidency of the republic in the elections to be held next Sunday in that part of the country controlled by the government.

The other diplomatic representatives so far have failed to follow the example of the British minister.
