DAILY LETTER

It was another big market today and while the advance was not general, there were several issues that made substantial gains. Steel common closed 2 1-4 points higher tonight than yesterday and was one of the leaders with enough trading in it. Hancock and Greene Cananana were higher. Champion declared another \$1.00 dividend and Amalgamated announced a dividend of a like amount. Magma Copper Co. shares were traded in on the New York Curb today at 13 3-8. This is the company that adjoins L. S. & A. and it is reported that the \$5.00 per share on 20 cent metal. Mass has increased its shipments to 1300 tons daily. The closing today was at best with prices the bullish wave niftul swing, and it seems reasonable to believe the advance will continue tomorrow, at least, stocks are better buys than sales.

BOSTON MARKETS

CHILDREN OF PLURAL MARRIAGE RULED NOT LEGITIMATE IN UTAH

Ogden, Utah, July 15.—In his instruction to the jury in the suit of Albert Geddes Eccles for a share of the estate of the late David Eccles, multimillionaire sugar and lumber magnate, Judge Howell ruled that children of a plural marriage, such as is claimed to have been contracted by Margaret Geddes an David Eccles are not legitimate. This ruling affects the standing of all children born from plural marriages subsequent to the admission of Utah as a state.
