The first information was given the American secretary of state verbally by the ambassador in persons. Secretary Lansing replied formally that the American government could ficial confirmation of such proposed accept only a written statement of Berlin's point of view. The ambassador then left for the German em-

bassy, where the formal, written statement ,together with the authorization from Berlin, was drawn up and presented to the American government during the afternon.

Together with the information that brought to official Washington the sinking of the Lusitania, the state department announced that Germany would probably be unable to render any report of its own upon the sinking of the Arabic for the reason that the submarine that operated on the scene of the Arabic disaster had been sunk. This announcement followed the receipt of advices from Germany and the submarine that was supposed to have sunk the Arabic and Dunsley was captured or sunk by the English shortly after the Arabic sank. It developed that Ambassador Gerard, in Berlin, had telegraphed the state department the day the Arabic disaster, that Berlin had a report that a submarine was thus destroyed. This the state department did not make public until today, following Ambassador Bernstorff's announcement.
