Lansing, Dec. 10.-Prosecutions in Michigan by federal officers for violations of the interstate laws regarding the shipment of protected game, are expected. J. S. Hunter of Washington D. C., special agent of the game conservation department of the United States bureau of agriculture, is working on several clues which have been turned in to federal headquart-

According to Mr. Hunter there is a protected game c"learing house" in Chicago. Shipments of venison, partridge, quail and other game pro'ected by the federal laws and whose shipment for sale is forbidden, have been sent to Chicago in clandestine ways. Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa and Michigan seem to have been the states from which most of the game was pro-

Last week Mr. Hunter held conferences with state game officials. Chief Clerk Charles Hoyt was detailed to assist Mr. Hunter.

It is expected that before long prosecutions in the federal courts in Chicago will be commenced.




