street Mrs. Greene had seen the automobile and said, "let's hurry across." Elizabeth had answered that they could "make it all right."

The two women had come down G street from the Green home and crossed Second street. They were crossing G street at a right angle at Second when the accident occurred. They are said to have been in the center of the street. The Whitesides say that had the women been a step further towards the east side of G street they would have escaped unharmed.

Victor street, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce and son-in-law of Rev. and Mrs. Greene, arrived at the scene a few minutes after the accident. He did not know at the time that Mrs. Greene had been killed, but believed her only to be injured and unconscious. He went to the church, only a block away, and notified Rev. Greene, who was just about to enter the church from the vestry. Professor A. A. Scott was playing the opening music for the services. Street entered the church and notified the congregation that the services would have to be given up for the evening.

Elizabeth Greene, who was rendered unconscious, recovered shortly after the accident and asked that her

mother be cared for. W. R. Whiteside when notified of the accident, immediately called Coroner Hunter and Prosecuting Attorney J. E. Stewart to the scene to look over the ground.

For weeks past the Greene family had been planning for a jolly Christmas party at which all the children of the family were expected to be home. These consist of Killaly and Miss Marjorie Green, who have been attending the Oregon Agricultural College at Corvallis, and Norman Greene, who is working at Powell River, British Columbia; and of Mrs. Victor Street, Kathleen and Elizabeth Greene, all of this city. Killaly, Norman and Marjorie Green have been notified of their mother's death and are expected home tonight.

Bishop Keator, who was in Bellingham last night, is expected here tonight or tomorrow. His wife telegraphed last night, on learning of the accident, that Bishop Keator was in Bellingham and that he would be notified immediately and would come here.

#### A Noble Character

No accident in Aberdeen's history has caused deeper and more sincere regret than that of last night. The news spread rapidly and was received with sorrow throughout the entire community. Mrs. Greene long has been regarded as one of the city's most lovable women. She had made the sorrows of scores of Aberdeen families her own and had always been ready with a helping hand. Her good deeds have been unostentatious and performed without expectation of reward. They are known only to those for whom her work was done.

Rev. Greene is said to be bearing up well under his loss, his religious faith sustaining him in his sorrow. He is thinking of the needs of every member of his family and is making their sorrow as easy to bear as possible. The Greens have been residents of Aberdeen for nine years, coming here from Escanaba, Mich.

W. R. Whiteside said today that it was impossible that Joe Whiteside, driver of the hearse last night, could have been traveling anything but a slow rate of speed. "The hearse," Mr. Whiteside said, "is top heavy and

### SEES PEACE FOR MEXICO

the famous ginoue drink is produced. Very likely many other plants that thrive in this high, cooler climate, also are produced.

I could see no destruction of property on account of the revolution in the city of Mexico and I suppose there was a good deal of exaggeration in the reports made to the United States.

I talked with quite a few French merchants in Mexico City, and their opinions were that Mexico would be better from now on as the common people whom I find quite intelligent, will figure more in shaping the future of Mexico and not as heretofore, when the whole country was ruled by certain amount of rich people.

Amongst the various papers published here there is a French daily, which circulates among 3,000 French people. I met the editor and he told me that the French people controlled the dry goods trade and excepting the Spaniards they were the most numerous of the foreign people in the city.

In regard to the prosecution of the Mexican priests, I could see none of it. I visited many of the churches in Mexico City (and they are all magnificent) and I saw the usual services conducted by the priest to a big congregation.

From Mexico City to Vera Cruz is about 275 miles east, part of this distance is on the plateau where the same product is planted as on the valley of Mexico.

St. Orizaba one enters the lower country the change of climate is shown by extending groves of bananas, oranges, lemons, pineapples, sugar

cane, coffee and many other tropical fruits.

It certainly is a wonderful sight for a man from the north, to see this rich land, where it is summer every day in the year.

I am told by the people of Vera Cruz that the changes in the weather are only very slight and that the average weather winter and summer is perhaps 70 degrees. The winter days are much longer than in the United States. I don't hear many people coughing here.
