RUTH SPRINGS TRICK WILLOW

Landis May Be Called Upon to Render Decision on New Bat.

Cleveland, O., July 18.—Babe Ruth is sure the original cuss. When the Babe isn't busy making some runs he is pulling something that will keep Judge Landis and Ban Johnson interested.

1921 Ruth made 59 home runs. The lively ball in use was regarded as the big reason for the Babe's remarkable feat.

The Babe should come through this year with a goodly share of circuit drives, in all probability an investigation of the bat he uses will be demanded.

July 2 Ruth started to use a bat of the type which has never been seen in the baseball world. Since that date Ruth has been on a swat spree that has greatly increased his home-run record.

While 15 of the playing code says that the bat used in baseball must be round, not over two and one-fourth inches in diameter at the thickest part, nor more than 42 inches in length and be entirely of hard wood.

Four Sections.
The bat that Ruth is now using with such great success is all that the rule says and then some.

Instead of being turned out of one piece of wood, the bat is made of four distinct sections, which are glued together.

This unusual bat is said to be the outgrowth of idea advanced by Jim Crawford, in his day one of the greatest batsmen the game has ever produced.

The bats are now being turned out at Whitler, Camp, Crawford being interested in the company that is making them.

With the ordinary bat there are always parts of the wood that are weak because of the grain. As a matter of fact most batsmen so hold the bat that the grain will always be up when it comes into contact with the ball.

Crawford's idea does away entirely with any weakness in the bat. The bat is constructed of four sections of the very best selected wood, so that it is uniform throughout.

It is known as the "quadrebuilt bat," and the claim is made that it is many times stronger than the one-piece affair.

Opportunity for Tricks.
It may be necessary for Ban Johnson, Judge Landis and the other high powers of baseball to pass on this question.

Will Tunnel Through Continental Divide to Shorten Distance Across Nation



Denver, Colo.—The United States Supreme Court has reduced the distance from New York to San Francisco by 178 miles. In a decision upholding the legality of an act creating the Moffat Tunnel Commission of Colorado the Supreme Court also removed the last legal obstacle to the accomplishment of one of the

world's greatest engineering feats. As a result, work will begin within sixty days on the Moffat Tunnel, a tube a little over six miles long, through the heart of the Rockies. One of Longest. It will bore directly through the Continental Divide from Mc-

Co. to Denver. Thus it will cut across the extreme northwestern part of Eagle county, nearly in the center of the state. The distance between these two towns is less than 10 miles—as the crow flies. But as the railroad runs—it is closer to 185 miles; 185 miles of tortuous track over and around moun-

tains. The tunnel will reduce from hours to minutes the time required between the two points. When completed, the Moffat Tunnel will be the longest in the United States. It will be one of the five longest transportation tunnels in the world. The Mont Cenis Tunnel, Mo-

dane, France, to Bardonecchia, Italy, is seven and ninety-eight hundredths miles in length. The St. Gotthard Tunnel is nine and three-tenths miles long. The Alberg Tunnel is six and thirty-six hundredths miles long and the Simplon Tunnel is twelve and three-tenths miles long. In an engineering sense it is believed the Moffat Tunnel will rank even as of greater importance than other of the world's famous tunnels. Time Shortened. Geological formations which will be penetrated, scientists believe, would practically have been impossible to pierce a few years ago. However, late mechanical devices have been invented which are expected to make possible the construction of the tube in less time than was required for the building of the other and longer tunnels. Transcontinental trains, engineers predict, will be running through the Moffat Tunnel within three years. Ten years were required for the building of the Mt. Cenis Tunnel. The St. Gotthard took nine years, the Alberg was completed in something more than three years and the Simplon Tunnel was begun in 1898 and was finished in 1905. Summarized, other facts about the Moffat Tunnel are: Elevation of tunnel, eastern portal, 5190 feet; western portal, 9100 feet. Sixteen Feet Wide. Construction of tunnel lowers railroad tracks vertical distance of 2406 feet. Grades, 0.3 on eastern end and 0.8 on western end. Size of tunnel, 16 feet in width and 24 feet in height. Construction, main tunnel through a pioneer tunnel first to be driven. Pioneer tunnel 8 1/2 feet and center line 75 feet from main tunnel. Formation, probably of granite, gneiss and schist. Similar to formation in Simplon Tunnel, with substitution of granite in Moffat Tunnel for misintegrated mica and schist rock in the Simplon. The new tunnel will bear the name of the late David H. Moffat, who built the railroad west from Denver to Steamboat Springs, which also bears his name. BUT, BOY, THOSE BANQUETS. Easy To Detect Bogus Money

Chicago—Take a close look at the paper money in your roll. Is there a suspicious thickness in the corners of the bill where the amount is printed? Are the fine lines in the decorative scroll work blurred? Does the bill seem a bit of color in its shading? One-Act Show. Well, it's probably counterfeit or raised, and you ought to blame yourself for taking it. Captain Thomas I. Porter, in charge of the U. S. Secret Service here, who still is on the trail of the money makers in spite of his 77 years, will give you small consolation if you accept bad bills. "Counterfeiters make their money to pass only once," he warns. "They're satisfied as soon as the bill leaves their hands and they get value for it. So they don't have to make them either permanent or fit for the closest inspection. Their game, is you know, to pass their money in rush hours on outlying store-keepers." Only a Dub. Captain Porter doesn't give the counterfeit credit for either technical skill or romance. "He's a dub," the captain says. "He hasn't the nerve to go out in the open and rob. And anyone with the skill to operate a camera can make bogus bills. "There's no reason for his existence, no type or psychology to him. Anyone who doesn't want to work, who feels the lure of easy money, is a potential counterfeit. Most fake money is

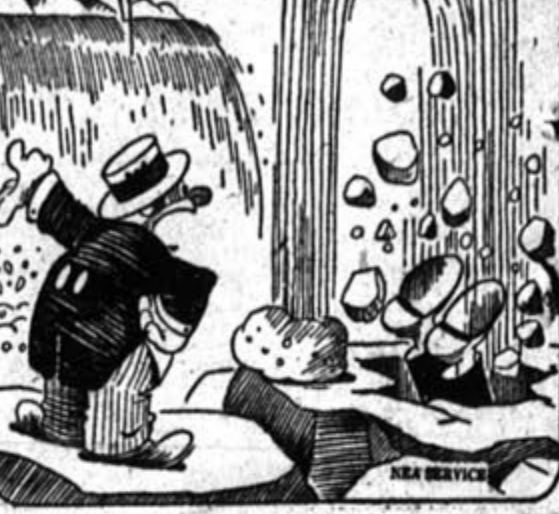
