The Prussian Commanders.

GEN. VON MOLTKE. Gen. Von Moltke, the Chief of Staff of the Prussian forces, was born in Mecklen-burgh, in the year 1800. His father was an army officer. He was educated at the mili-tary school of Copenhagen, and entered into the service of Denmark. But after-ward when the annexation of Schleswig-Holstein, where his father owned property was under consideration, he accepted the German side of the dispute and took service with Prussia in 1822, gradually rising

to a position in the staff ten years later. Shortly afterward he visited Turkey, and was invited by the Sultan to assist in the efforts that monarch was then making to improve the military standing of the Turkish army by the introduction of European reforms. He seems to have been engaged in the service of different states for several years subsequently. It was not until 1855 that he acquired his present position in

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
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
