Smoking Stables,

The Colonial Farmer has the following remarks on fumigating stables :

Sulphurious acid gas is generated or produced by fire and sulphur-brimstone-is simple and very cheap, and the process is as follows: Procure a small chaffer of red hot cinders from a coal fire ; set a small crucible on the hot coals, and put a piece of brimstone stick as large as a man's thumb into it. This will fumigate a large cattle shed or barn in about twenty minutes. Contrary to the expectation first entertained, the animals seemed to enjoy its fumes, and it has proved a tonic as well horses in the arena have been stallions; as a disinfectant to them. The results from experiments with it are shown, which lead to the conviction that the diseases such as cholera, pleuro-pncumonia, mange, ringworm and lice, have disappeared before this gas, and that greasy heels in horses have been cured by it, while serious cases of glan-ders have also been amended by the judicious use of this hitherto-considered poisonous gas. In addition to the use of this gas, sanitary measures should be enforced in regard to cleanliness and a thorough ventilation with the allow-ance of a generous diet.


