NEWS OF THE WEEK. EXTRA SESSION OF CONGRESS. The President issued the following proclamation on the 5th inst.:

THE SEAT OF WAR. The British government enters a formal protest against the assumption of Russia that its declaration of war against Turkey was justifiable and in the interest of Europe.

THE EAST. There has been 3,549,629 lbs. of alumina shipped to Europe from New York, during the past seven months, valued at \$4,000,000.

THE WEST. The official report of the surrender of Gray Hawk, the number of the fighting Indians at 389, of whom 217 were men, two thousand ponies were also given and 117 stand of arms.

WASHINGTON. By an order of the president a large number of the pension agencies at different places have been consolidated, and all but one of each group of agencies so consolidated will be discontinued.

THE STATE DEPARTMENT. The State Department on the 4th inst. received from the Minister to Mexico official information of the release of the American Consul at Acapulco, and Secretary Evans has instructed our Minister to enter a formal protest and demand from the government of Mexico an apology and full reparation for the outrage.

CRIMES AND CASTIGATIONS. The body of John T. Daily, builder and owner of the Windsor Hotel, New York, was found on Sunday morning, May 6th, floating from the door of a deserted dwelling in Woodside, a small village near Long Island City.

ENGLAND'S ANSWER. Lord Derby's Note to Russia—Position Taken—The Position of Russia Not Approved. London, May 7.—Lord Derby's answer to Gortchakoff's circular note is published. It is in the form of a note from Lord Derby to Lord Loftus, British ambassador at St. Petersburg. Following is the text:

GENERAL. The visible supply of grain, comprising the stocks in granary at the principal points of accumulation, at the end of the week ending the 24th inst. was as follows:

FOREIGN. The Transvaal republic has been annexed to the British empire and the British flag hoisted at Pretoria.

THE CAR ALEXANDER. Alexander II, Emperor of Russia, who succeeded on the death of his father, Nicholas I, March 2, 1855, was born April 29, 1818, in the reign of his uncle, Alexander I, and is, consequently, entering his 59th year.

A WASHINGTON ROMANCE. The visit of Alexis has caused gossip to revive stories about the mischief which Gortchakoff, and particularly his quarrel which is said to have led to the recall of poor old Baron Gerolt, the Russian minister, who had served the interests of his government here for 30 years.

THE GREAT STEVENS BATTERY. The yard in which the battery was built is situated in Hoboken, and is enclosed by a high board fence. The length of the vessel made it necessary in building it to dig beneath the sidewalk and make a large pit under it on Hudson street.
