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MARBLEHEAD.

History and Trade of the Old Massachusetts Town Which Was Destroyed the Other Day.

Marblehead has a very picturesque site, its buildings covering a high and rocky peninsula. It is almost completely surrounded by the waters of Massachusetts Bay.

Whitefield is reported to have said, after looking at the rocky surroundings: "Pray where do they bury their dead?" The peninsula is about two miles broad and four long, and contains three thousand seven hundred acres.

The harbor is half a mile wide and one and a half long, and is both deep and convenient for shipping. Its first settlers were emigrants from Salem, and they at early as 1649 set up a separate town government.

Many of these settlers were from Guernsey and Jersey, the English Channel islands, and as a consequence their dialect became the prevailing one on the peninsula, and is noticeable up to a very late period.
