# Teapot Dome Lease Annulment Trial Starts At Cheyenne

## **GOV'T COUNSEL GLAIMS FRAUD** IN TRANSFER

Pomerene Stresses 'Secrecy' of Fall in Transactions.

(By The Associated Press.)

Cheyenne, Mar. 9.-The leasing of the Teapot Dome oil reserves to the Mammoth Oil Company, one of the Harry F. Sinclair Company, which resulted in sensational charges, the resignation of two cabinet members and an investigation by the senate, again flashed into the limelight today as the trial to annul the leases got under way

Today's setting was in federal court before Judge T. Blake Ken

Harding Approved Transfer. Owen J. Roberts and Atlee Pomerene, special counsel for the government, led in the fight to abnul the lease on the grounds that it was obtained through fraud and based on an alleged illegal transfer of the oil reserve from the navy department to the depart ment of the interior. This transfer was made on an executive or der by the late President Harding.

An attempt to locate the "sad-dle" of Teapot Dome, marked the day's sessions, when in its closing minutes, K. C. Heald, a geologist of Yale University, formerly with the government geological survey, ok the stand as the fifth witness the government.

Pomerene Charges Fraud. The "saddle" is a sub-surface formation which might control the direction the oil would take.

The trial opened with Mr. Pomerene, for the government, outlin ing the transactions between Fall and Sinclair which led to the signing of the lease by Fall and Edwin Denby, former secretary of the ind stressed the "secrecy" with which the interior department, under the direction of Fall, observed in handling the transactions.

# SEES NO END

employe into the common interests of genuine co-operators." He quoted a public utility owner as having said: "I wish Henry Ford never had been born, so that people wouldn't think that a man could raise wages and reduce


