Washington, April 13.—The supreme court of the United States has established no new principle in the injunction which it upheld against the Stone-cutters' Union but has merely developed the objection against the nation-wide use of the power of boycott by labor unions.

There is nothing to prevent akainst any employer who is declared "unfair" by that local, but the decision does mean that if a union in one city attempts to influence, coerce or otherwise affect the action of a union in another city, the power of the courts can be invoked to restrain oh concerted action.

power to influence other members of a national organization is inherent in the right of labor to use all the influence it can over its own members and that anyone who believes in labor union Surpass U.
