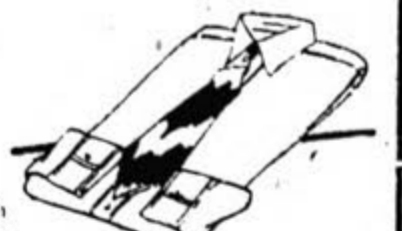

SEEK LAW TO TAX TIMBER

Declaring that two-thirds of the timber cut in Delta county escapes taxation for two or three years before it is taken off the land, Supervisor Helmer Bruce, of Bark River, yesterday urged the Delta county board to launch a movement for a state law making it a criminal offense for anyone to cut timber on which the taxes are not paid.

"The only remedy, now," said Mr. Bruce, "is a complicated series of civil actions. These are not effective. Some of the technicalities involved are almost insurmountable. The law is not enforced and the county is losing thousands of dollars in taxes every year."

The result of the lengthy discussion was the appointment of a special committee consisting of Supervisors Harry Hall of Maple Ridge, Emil Norden of Baldwin and Mr. Bruce, to make a thorough study of the situation and report to the board at the next meeting.

Supervisor H. H. Shepeck of Wells told the board that some jobbers plan for two or three years ahead to escape taxes. They know what lands will be cut over, he explained, and stop paying the taxes. When the timber has been taken off, the land starts "back to the state."

Under the present system, the county treasurer has power to issue a warrant against the logs. This warrant can be served by the

FIRE DESTROYS REPAIR SHEDS

Fire, believed to have started when a coal stove exploded in the men's lunch house at the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul repair yards near the county poor farm yesterday afternoon, burned two buildings and caused damage estimated at about \$2500.

The men's house and an office and storeroom building a few feet away were destroyed before a locomotive and tender from which water was pumped by the North Escanaba fire department truck could be brought into action.

The blaze was first noticed about 4:45 o'clock when an explosion was heard in the south building. In an instant flames were seen coming from all parts of the lunch house. The North Escanaba fire department was summoned. The large supply of chemicals carried on the truck was exhausted in an attempt to prevent the blaze from spreading to the storehouse. Tools, books and car accessories were removed by workmen before the tarpapered roof of the building was set ablaze by the intense heat from the neighboring structures.

With no water connections within reach, the firemen were at a loss to check the flames until the St. Paul locomotive was switched to an adjacent track, making it possible to put a stream on the storehouse by pumping water through the fire truck.

The E. & L. S. tank car was called when the fire was first noticed and arrived a few minutes after the blaze had been controlled.

A strong south wind caused sparks to alight on the roofs of the long line of buildings north of the lunch house. Only the quick work of the St. Paul crew in bringing the locomotive into action argued by the work of the fire department saved thousands of dollars of property from destruction.
