San Francisco, June 28-(/P)-Radio dispatches picked up by the Federal Telegraph Company from the steamer President Pierce at 8:05 o'clock tonight, said that the Pierce heard the army Fokker at 7:35 p. m., talking to the President Cleveland asking for a radio bearing.

The Cleveland was about 1100 miles off of San Francisco. The Pierce was about 600 miles.



Planes Have Radial Motors.

Grace had received a new propeller for his plane and was working feverishly to make ready for a start from the "Barking Sands" of Mana, on the Island of Kaual.

His plane is the Cruizaire type. It has a 220 horsepower radial type engine, capable of traveling 120 miles an hour. The craft loaded. would weigh between 4 .-000 and 4,500 pounds.

The army plane has three radial motors, each capable of developing 200 horsepower. Loaded the ship weighs 13,500 pounds. Its cruising speed is 105 miles ap hour and expected to cover approximately 3,000 miles on its 1.040 gallons of gasoline.

Provisioning of the Fokker was one of the last duties. Army men in charge of placing rations and water aboard the plane ar-

rived at the airport at 6 a. m., and stored aboard two one-quart bottles of hot liquid, one of cocon and the other of soup. A supply of hardtack and five

salions of distilled water completed the larder.

Instruments necessary in the navigation of the plane were conveniently arranged in the middle compartment of the ship. The earth inductor compase was on a stationary tripod.
