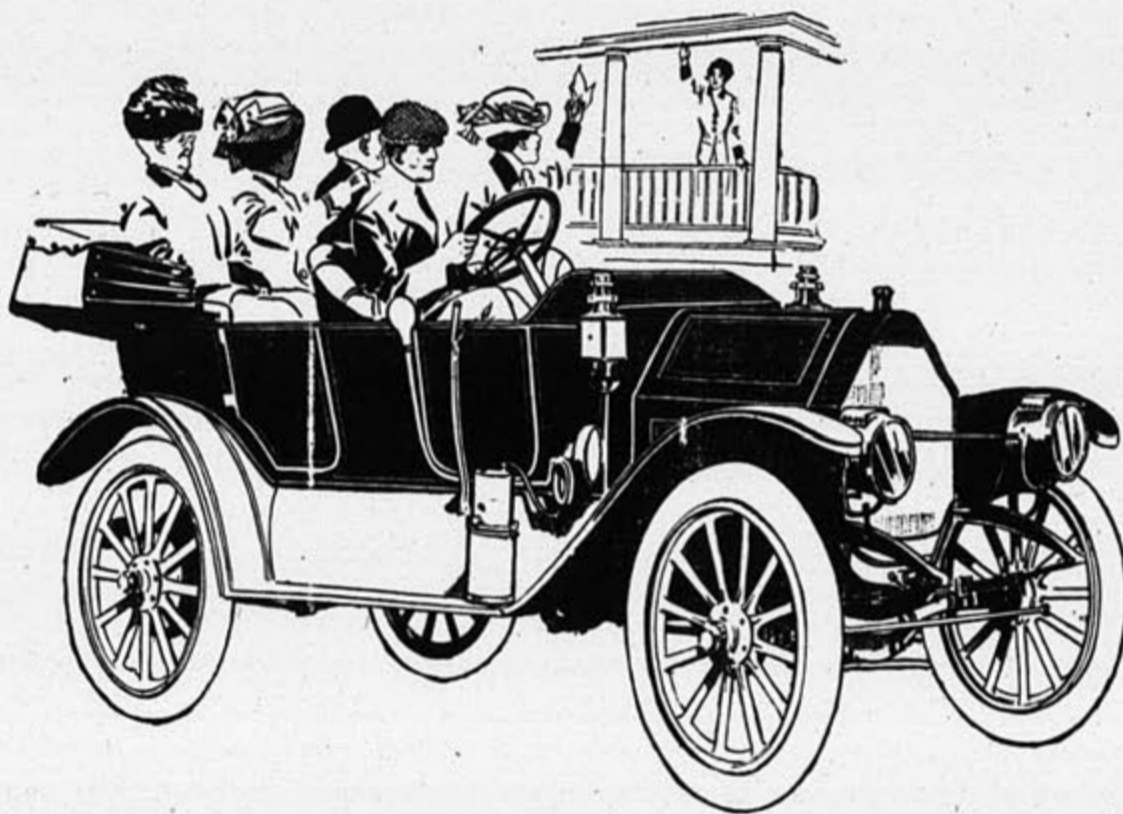

TIPPING TO STOP IN 1912

COMMERCIAL TRAVELERS ARE URGENTLY REQUESTED TO CEASE THIS PRACTICE AFTER NEW YEAR'S DAY.

A TIPLESS AMERICA DESIRED.

Drummers in Every Section of the Country Asked to Form Clubs to Discourage "Tipping" Evil—President Dowe of Commercial Travelers' National League Calls it Nuisance.

"All commercial travelers are requested, if they are opposed to tipping, to address a post card to P. E. Dowe, Pulitzer Building, New York, agreeing to discontinue tipping on and after January 1 next."

This appeal from Mr. Dowe, who is president of the Commercial Travelers' National League, was received in Chicago today. In connection with the boycott against tips, President Dowe proposes:

"To recognize a chain of tipless hotels throughout the United States as Travelers' League hotels.

"To establish Travelers' League tipless hotels or commercial travelers' clubs in many cities where the old hotels do not abandon the tipping system.

"To publish a list of rooming houses in towns and cities where neither of the above plans can be carried out, and with the assistance of the various chambers of commerce to establish central show-rooms for commercial travelers.

"On January 1, 1912, to begin to carry out a pledge to stop all tipping.

upon the part of hotels, restaurants, sleeping cars, etc."

"The employers of commercial travelers and patrons of hotels and restaurants generally are asked to make a resolution to stop the un-American tipping the date named, and employers of traveling men are requested to write expressing their views of tipping to the Travelers' League," says Mr. Dowe.

"Many hotel men claim that the waiters are to blame for the tipping system, others that it is the fault of the public. The truth is, the hotel proprietors do not wish to substitute wages for tips," said Mr. Dowe.

"When one goes to the hotels or restaurants and orders certain articles upon the bill of fare, whether a la carte or table d'hotel, at a stipulated price, it is a contract by the proprietor to deliver properly cooked and decently served, with the usual allowance of bread, butter and water.

"The waiters are entitled to fair wages for services. The head of the Federation of Labor has argued for wages and against tipping for years.

"The prices of hotel accommodations and commodities already are as high as they can be forced, and the public, which regards tipping as the great American nuisance, will no longer tolerate it nor pay higher prices."
