KILL'S CONSUMPTION GERM.

Cuspidor Has Compartment for Containing Disinfectant.

Right in line with the nation-wide war against tuberculosis is the cuspidor invented by a New Jersey man. It may not be a pleasant subject but it is too vital a one to be ignored. This cuspidor is made with a removable inner shell directly under the mouth, and the chamber surrounding the shell is to be filled with some disinfectant. The fumes of the disinfectant, arising continually, destroy any germicidal germs that may become lodged in the inner shell and material by reduce the danger of contracting the dread disease. One change of formaldehyde, for instance, will last nearly a week, but the inner shell should be removed and cleaned daily. The same principle can be used in destroying germs in garbage cans, other receptacles where disease germs to breed. When human lives are at stake the construction of even a humble article as the cuspidor is every proper subject for consideration.

Weed Destroyer.

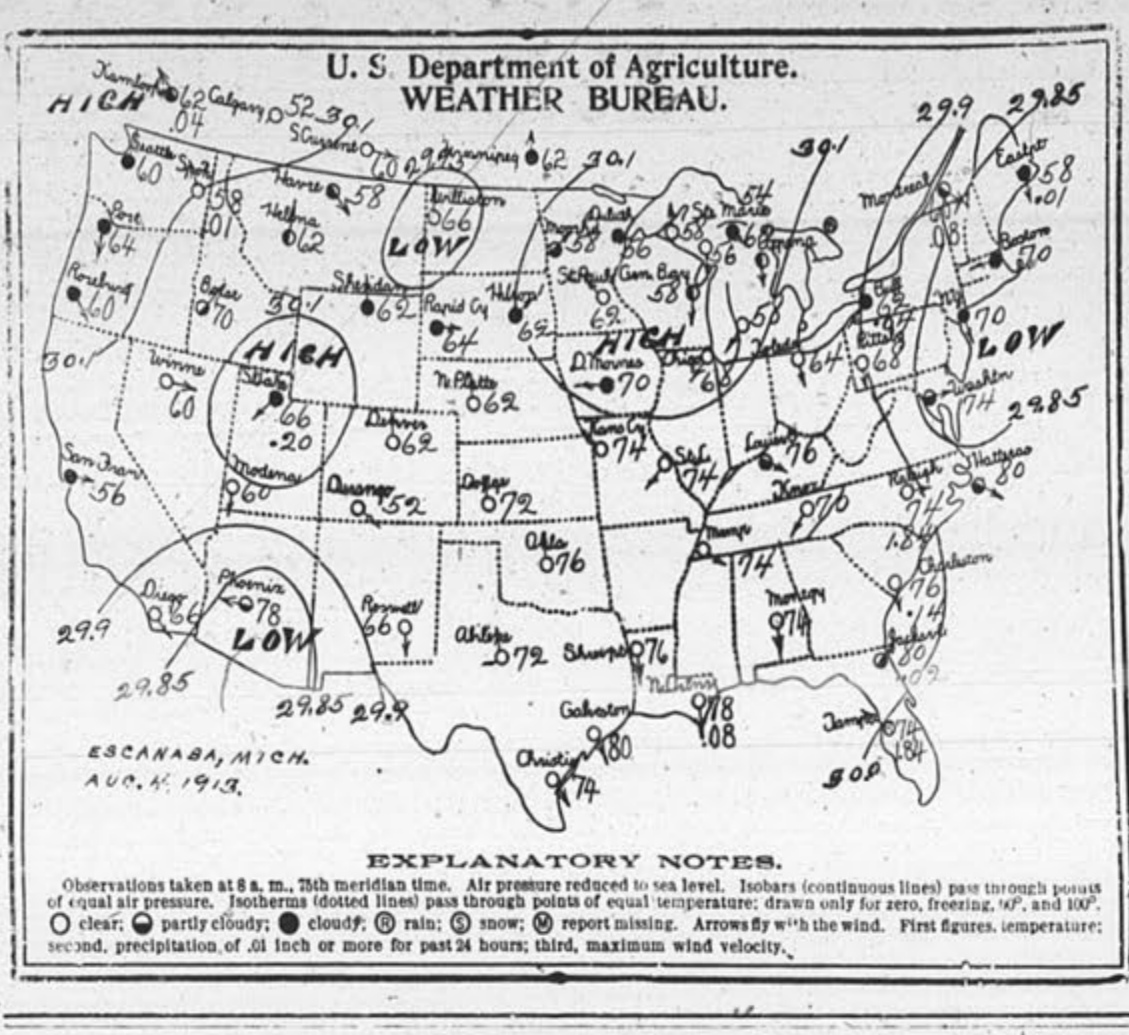
A most ingenious implement for destroying weeds has been invented by a Washington man. A rod is inserted into a metal pan at one end and a reservoir extending out from it just above this point, which is hollow and is an opening at the bottom. The reservoir has a discharge spout leading into the hollow point and a rubber bulb by means of pressure on which the contents of the reservoir are discharged through the spout. The reservoir is filled with tobacco juice.

STAR SPANGLED BANNER.

Original Flag Which Inspired National Anthem Now Property of U. S.

The original star spangled banner, the American flag which inspired the writing of the national anthem while flying over Fort Mifflin in Baltimore harbor on the night of Sept. 13, 1814. It is now the property of the United States government and is an exhibit at the National museum in Washington. This is one of the most historic relics in the possession of the government. The national song was written by Francis Scott Key and quickly gained popularity in all sections of the country and shortly afterward was adopted unofficially as the national anthem. The flag was presented recently to the museum by Eben Appleton of New York city.

He is a direct descendant of George Armistead, who commanded the British fleet in 1814 and who secured possession of the tattered stars and stripes which so proudly waved over the fort after the American forces had repulsed the Brits.



“STARVE THE FLY” IS FIGHTERS’ SLOGAN.

Chairman Edward Hatch, Jr., of the American Civic association said during a convention in Baltimore. “The slogan ‘swat the fly’ should be changed to ‘starve the fly.’”

Mr. Hatch is right. Adults and children may like to be banded in a crusade to kill as many flies as have the temerity to show themselves. But unless the breeding and feeding places of the insect that forgets to wipe its feet are broken up the campaign will be in vain—at least it will fall far short of success.

The thing is a simple factor in the arithmetic of science and health. If there are no places for flies to feed, if there are no places for flies to breed, there will be no flies to kill. The new remedy has the virtue of getting right down to cases. The “swat” formula is only a palliative.

The new remedy is an important one in that it touches the fundamentals of sanitation everywhere. England is almost a flyless country. And England gained that enviable reputation not so much by swatting the fly as by taking the fly’s meal ticket away from him and at the same issuing a close order against the places in which it is wont to breed.

There is no good reason why any enterprising town, county or state, jealous of its health, should not follow a similar course. It sounds spectacular to tell how many flies you have slaughtered during the course of a day. It is pleasant to have their scaples dangling, so to speak, at your belt. But unless you have nullified its means of sustenance and broken up its homestead rights the few you have killed will be re-enforced by millions of others just as deadly and just as aggressive.

How to Prevent Breeding.

If you have a stable do not allow manure to accumulate. The manure should be removed twice a day to a closed pit and should be moved from this twice a week. Do not tolerate manure pies.

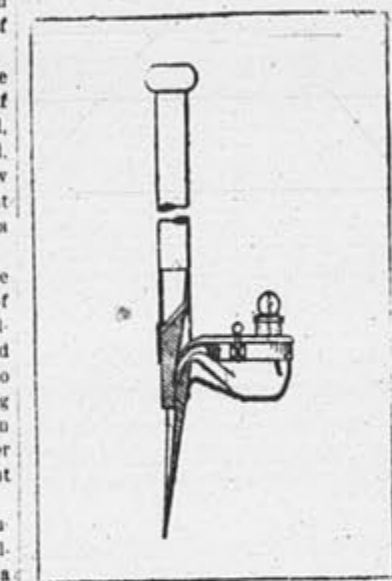
Green vitriol, one pound in a gallon of water, applied once a day will kill the maggots in the manure from a one horse stable.

If the old fashioned dung outhouse is used it should be thoroughly treated at frequent intervals with chloride of lime.

Garbage cans should be closely covered, or, better, should have a fly trap attached to the cover in such a way that all flies flying upward from the garbage will be sure to enter the trap.

Both Quick and Effective.

Use another liquid that will plant the. The gardener then inserts the point at the root of a weed and presses on the rubber bulb with his foot. An injection is thus squirted on the roots of the weed which soon kills it. Compare this method with the laborious system of pulling weeds up, one by one, and tearing up the turf into the bargain to say nothing of wear and tear on the only back you'll ever have.



Use for Tomato Seeds.

The seeds of the tomato have been regarded as a waste material around the cannery and the problem has been to get rid of the accumulation. Recently a valuable function of the tomato seed has been recently discovered by Italy where the oil from it is said to have been found especially valuable in the manufacture of varnish. This oil has the quality of drying quickly and has other valuable uses.

PLENTY OF RAIN IN THE MONTH OF JULY.

Observer Jakyl Issues Recapitulation of Weather Statistics for Past Month

The month opened unusually warm, the highest temperature, 88 degrees, occurring on the first; but following the opening dawns of warm weather, the daily temperatures were generally a few degrees below normal for the remainder of the month. Excepting on the 21st, when the lowest reading, 17 degrees, was recorded, frost was not so time imminent. With respect to temperature, the month was similar to July of last year, the average being 64, or 2 degrees below normal. The greatest daily range of temperature, 25 degrees, occurred on the 1st, and the least, 7 degrees, on the 16th.

The total precipitation was 4.87 inches, or 1.53 inches more than normal. The greatest amount recorded in 24 consecutive hours was 1.77 inches, on the 11-12th. The precipitation was also marked by greater frequency as well as amount than usual for July. There were but 13 days with no precipitation, and amounts sufficient to measure fell on 15 days, or an average of every other day. Half an inch or more of rain was observed on but one day, the 21st, and was of a light uninjurious nature.

There were practically no windstorms during the month, the highest velocity, 33 miles an hour from the northwest, having been recorded during a brief period of brisk wind on the 3d. The total wind movement was 6,401 miles, giving an average hourly velocity (8.6 miles) that was about normal for the month. The prevailing direction was south.

Notwithstanding the frequency of showers during the month, the record of sunshine equalled the amount usually received in July, or about three-fifths of the daylight hours. Twelve days were clear, 11 partly cloudy, and 5 cloudy.

Thunderstorms occurred on 11 days, but with two or three exceptions, were not of a pronounced character.

NATION DOESN'T PAY FOR ALL ITS MAIL

Railroads Want Full Compensation From the Government

That the present plan of paying the railways for carrying the mail results in great injustice to the railroads is set forth today in a statement issued by the railroads as part of their plan of appealing to the public for support.

Railroads are now paid by two methods of measurement:

According to the weight hauled each mile; and

For each mile a postal car is used for sorting mails en route.

The railroads claim, however, that the nation does not pay for the entire weight carried or all the car space utilized for sorting, in detail.

Weight, ninety per cent of all the money paid to the railroads is for the weight of mail carried. The law stipulates that the mail shall be weighed for a typical period at least once every four years and that payment shall be made during the entire period according to the average weights then actually ascertained. In practice, the Post Office Department has construed this law to mean that the mails shall be weighed not oftener than every four years. The result is that though there is a constantly increasing weight of mail, the railroads receive no payment whatever for the increase until the next quadrennial weighing period, when a basis is arrived at which shall govern the payment to be made to the succeeding four years.

An illustration of the injustice of this quadrennial weighing system is in the fact that just after the weighing of the mails in Ohio in 1907, the printing of stamped envelopes and newspaper wrappers was changed from New England to Dayton, Ohio, so that many railroads have been required to handle this traffic for four years without compensation, while other roads have been receiving for the same period compensation for service not performed. This principle is at present working great hardship to many railroads. The parcels post started January 1, 1913, and immediately there was a great increase of mail and a reduction of express matter for which the railroads had been previously paid. Congress has allowed a 5 per cent increase in pay to compensate for the parcels post, but the records already indicate that the Government's postal revenues will increase this year from 20 to 30 per cent on account of the parcels post.

The Government makes no additional payment for speed or for frequency of service. There is no greater pay accorded the railroads for carrying mails at a speed of sixty miles per hour than for fifteen miles per hour. There is no greater pay for 100 trips a day than for one trip a day. The aggregate weight of mail carried, and therefore the pay, is the same, whatever the speed or whatever the frequency with which it is carried.

The railroads maintain, therefore, that while weight is the proper measure of pay, it should be ascertained every year and paid for accordingly.

Railway Postal Car Service. To facilitate the distribution of mail en route, the railways have provided 1388 traveling postal cars. The mileage made by full railway post office cars of all sizes in the performance of service during the fiscal year 1912 was 126,798,405. Passenger cars on American railroads the same year yielded revenue of about 25 cents for each mile run. If the railway postal cars had yielded as much per mile, it would have amounted to a total of \$31,699,601.

Compressed Gas.

Within the last 10 years the practice of transmitting compressed gas from some central station to small towns has grown rapidly. In Illinois one plant now supplies nearly 4,000 consumers, in Indiana another has as many, and in California a plant has about 5,000 consumers on its line of pipes. Another plant is now projected to supply 8,000 consumers, and it is estimated that 100 miles of piping will be required. The system has been developed to compete with electricity. The mains used vary from two to six inches in diameter. When the gas is delivered the pressure must be reduced, and this is effected either by a local low pressure distributing system, or by service governors connected with each meter.

EFFECT OF IRON ON DIGESTION.

Organic Salts Seriously Check Action of Stomach's Juices.

In an interesting dissertation published at Berlin, Dr. A. Dauterhoff records the results of some experiments bearing on this subject.

The time of digestion was in one case three hours and ten minutes; in another it was seven hours and ten minutes; in another it was seven hours and a half.

But fast cannot be the only cause at work, for perchloride and phosphate also tend to hinder digestion. Even reduced iron has a similar effect for it partially dissolves in the juices turning chloride.

NEW FOOTBALL RULES WILL HELP THE PUNTER

Change in Rules Will Allow Kicker to Stand Anywhere Back of the Line

New York Aug. 2.—The intercollegiate football rules as promulgated by the football rules committee show new changes in the gridiron code for the season of 1913.

The most important change is the rule which permits the kicker to stand at any distance from the line of scrimmage when kicking instead of at least five yards behind the scrimmage line.

Walter Camp, in outlining the work of the rules committee, says: "On alteration was brought about by the fact that a player could not be returned to the game after he had been taken out except at the beginning of a period.

"Player may be returned once at the beginning of any period or at any time during the fourth or last period."

"The rule relating to a forward pass or a kick, made from behind the goal line, together with the rule relating to dropping back linemen, has also been rendered clearer by changes in the wording."

"In the rules regarding the conduct of players after a forward pass or after a kick insertion of the words 'after the pass has been made' now makes it clear that players may interfere with one another until the pass is actually made."

London schools have 583,255 school sittings, New York 689,959, not all occupied in either case.

The smaller number of pupils in London means partly that more of the children of the moderately well to do there attend private schools, partly that the children of the London poor leave school for work at an earlier average age.
