Notice is hereby given that the Board of Supervisors of Delta County has ordered and there will be held a special election on Monday, August 4th, 1919, in all the several voting precincts in the several cities, wards and townships of Delta County, to be conducted in full accordance with all the provisions of the general election laws of the State of Michigan, as to registration, time of opening and closing of the polls, polling places, manner and conduct of the election, canvass of the votes, etc., and that said election shall be held at the following places in the several voting precincts of said County:

Notice is hereby further given, that at said election so ordered to be held as aforesaid, there will be submitted to the electors of said County a resolution adopted by the Board of Supervisors of Delta County, at a duly and legally convened meeting of said Board, held on June 23rd and 24th, 1919, which said resolution proposed to raise the sum of TWO HUNDRED THOUSAND (\$200,000) DOLLARS, by bonding the said County, for highway purposes, the money so raised, and the bonds so proposed to be issued, to be IN LIEU OF AND IN THE PLACE AND STEAD OF a certain highway bond issue voted upon and approved at the April 7th, 1919 election held in said County, for \$200,000 now cancelled because of legal defects.

The resolution to be submitted and voted upon at said special election on August 4th, 1919, reads as follows to-wit:

Whereas it is deemed necessary to cancel and nullify all proceedings taken relative to the \$200,000 Delta County Road Bond issue approved at the April 7th, 1919 election, because of technical legal objection to the validity of said bond issue; and

Whereas, it is a matter of great necessity to the welfare of the people of this County that the extension, improvement and repair of the present County Road System, be immediately provided for, because sufficient funds can not be raised by taxation for such purpose; and

Whereas, it is the sense of the Board of Supervisors of Delta County that the sum of two hundred thousand (\$200,000) dollars will be sufficient to carry out the present plans to build, extend and repair the county road system;

Therefore, Be It and it is enacted, Resolved, That there shall be issued by bonding the said County of Delta the sum of two hundred thousand (\$200,000) dollars for the purpose of graveling, macadamizing, building stone roads, building or repairing bridges, or in any other way in the discretion of the Board and the Board of Road Commissioners of Delta County, providing for the better construction, improvement and care of the highways of this County, and that said bonds be dated and issued, approved by the electors of said County at the election hereinafter provided for, as soon as convened thereafter and to be of such denomination as to bear such rate of interest, and to become payable at such dates, maturity and at such place or places of payment, as may be, in compliance with all constitutional and statutory restrictions and limitations, duly and properly determined by this Board, and

Be It Further Resolved, that the proposition of raising said sum of Two Hundred Thousand (\$200,000) dollars by bonding the said County of Delta for said purposes, be submitted to the electors of said County at a special election, hereby called to be held in said County on the 4th day of August, A. D. 1919, in the several voting precincts of the cities and townships therein, and that due and public notice of the holding of said election and the voting upon said proposition be published at least once each week for three (3) successive weeks previous to the time of submission and vote in a newspaper printed and circulated in said County, and that the Sheriff of said County be and is hereby instructed and directed, in conjunction with the County Clerk, and the city clerks of the cities and the township clerks of the townships, to post copies of said Notice of Special Election in at least three (3) public and conspicuous places in each of the several voting precincts, in the cities and townships of said County at least thirty (30) days previous to the time of such submission and voting; and

Be It Further Resolved, That the Board of Election Commissioners of said County of Delta be and they are hereby authorized and instructed to prepare and furnish for said election ballots substantially in the following form:

Free Electric, Gas and Water Service

Read What Will Happen If You Take It:

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

(15361) Section 1. Every person who wilfully or fraudulently injure, or suffers to be injured, any meter, wire, line, pipe or appliance belonging to any water, steam, electric or gas company, or prevents any water, steam, electric or gas meter belonging to such company from duly registering the quantity of water, steam, electric current or gas measured through the same, or in any way hinders or interferes with its proper action or just registration, or attaches any line, wire or pipe to any line, wire, pipe or main belonging to such water, steam, electric or gas company, or otherwise uses or burns or causes to be burned or used any water, steam, electric current or gas supplied by such company, without the written consent of such company or its duly authorized agent or officer, unless the same passes through a meter or is measured by a meter set by said company, or fraudulently uses its water, steam, electric current or gas, or water, or wastes the same, shall for every such offense, if the value of such water, steam, electric current, gas or damage so caused shall not exceed in value the sum of twenty-five dollars, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars or by imprisonment of not more than ninety days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the state prison for a term of not less than three months nor more than three years, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court and if the value of such water, steam, electric current, gas or damage so caused shall exceed in value the sum of twenty-five dollars, shall upon conviction thereof be punished by a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars or by imprisonment in the state prison for a term of not less than three months nor more than three years, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court; Provided, That such criminal prosecution shall not in any way impair the right of such company to a full compensation in damages by civil suit.

(15362) Section 2. The provisions of this act shall extend to and apply to all offenses against all water, steam, electric or gas companies and boards or municipalities owning or operating plants for producing, manufacturing, furnishing, transmitting or conducting water, steam, electricity or gas, either natural or artificial.

(15363) Section 3. In all prosecutions under this act it shall be prima facie evidence on the part of the people of the violation of the provisions of this act, to show that the respondent other than a lessor had control of or occupied the premises where the offense was committed, or received the benefit of such water, steam, electric current or gas so used or consumed.
