JUDGE LANDIS IMPEACHED IN HOUSE TODAY

"FORGET PARTISANSHIP AND PUT SHOULDER TO THE WHEEL" IS KEYNOTE OF THE MESSAGE

President-elect Harding Starts Work On Inaugural Address.

Heavy List of Appointments Will Take up Most of Time Until Saturday Night.

ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla., Feb. 14.—A plea that the nation forget partisanship in the future and put its shoulder to the wheel of reconstruction, is expected to be the keynote of President-elect Warren G. Harding's message to his countrymen when he comes into the presidency.

Although his inaugural address is far from being completed, it was learned today that considerable work has been done towards its preparation and the subject has been selected.

It is understood it will be very brief and Mr. Harding will attempt no detailed discussion in it of a national solution.

One of the outstanding features of the address is expected to be an appeal for confidence in the nation's business ability, lighted with the assurance that during the next four years the administration will keep away from meddling in the business methods of the country. Details of a taxation policy is to be revealed until Congress has been called in a special session in April.

His address will touch on international problems concerning peace details. He will pledge the peace agreement coupled with the American reservation. There is expected also to be a work of friendship for Mexico and other Latin American countries.

Mr. Harding is devoting little time to the actual writing of the document. He has a heavy appointment list covering the next few days and by Saturday night will have heard the advice of several prominent leaders. Included in these is Charles Evans Hughes, whom it is expected will be appointed Secretary of State in the new cabinet.

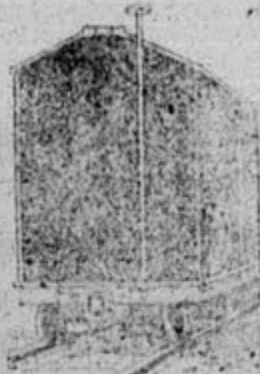


## \$250,000.00 Advertising

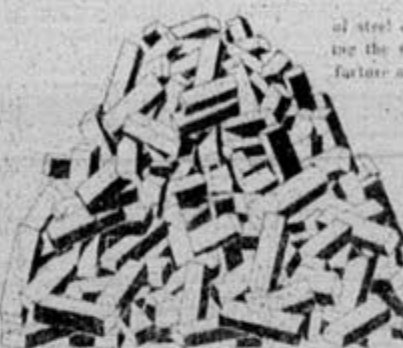

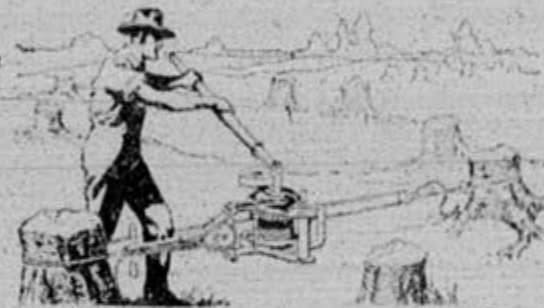

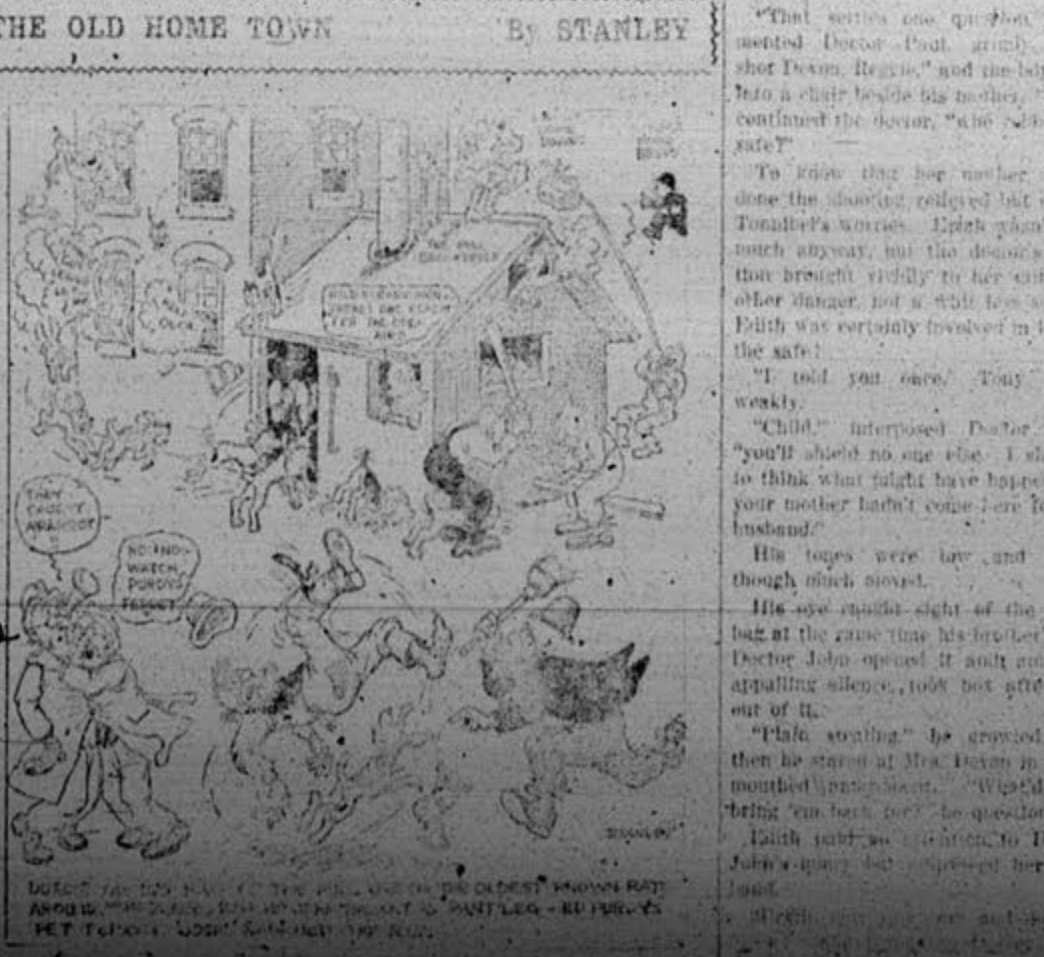
