

STATE DISCOVERS A WAY TO SAVE A LARGE EXPENSE

Will Take Much Work From Traveling Agents of State and Give It to Safety Department.

(By Associated Press)

LANSING, Aug. 15.—The new department of public safety has announced that the work of state inspectors of traveling insurance and reinsurance companies will be handled by a method of study which it is believed can be applied to almost every state-owned insurance and efficiency.

The state insurance has been conservative in its position of the state. They are to be called upon to inspect such titles as the state insurance. 

BACKING UP THE CONSTITUTION

Note that the full report of the vote in the senate on the proposal to ensure the fourth amendment to the constitution is at hand; it is possible to comment more fully upon what happened. The fourth amendment, it will be remembered, guards the people against unreasonable searches and seizures. As always interpreted by the courts, it means that nobody, whether an officer of the law or otherwise, may go through another person's pockets or enter his house and search it without a search warrant duly issued upon oath. There is, of course, an exception to the rule where a crime has been committed before an officer's eyes.

It was represented to the senate and not denied that officers would enforce the prohibition amendment by searching persons and making seizures without warrants at over the United States in their zealous attempts to detect violations of the Volstead act, and it was proposed to strengthen the fourth amendment by providing fines and imprisonment for officers who disregard it.

The proposal met with opposition because, as was said by senators like Willis of Ohio and Nelson of Minnesota, that the prohibition law could not be enforced if the fourth amendment was backed up so rigidly. There was much discussion of other points, but the substance of the argument was that the fourth amendment would have to be ignored if the eighteenth amendment had the best answer offered to the demand that the people should be made secure in their own homes when it came to enforcement officers, for the most part good fellows who ignore the fourth amendment of their own accord.

Yesterday the senate rejected that view and supported the amendment rather than part of it which the extreme temperance crowd supports. There will be a fight over the amendment as enformed but if the senate has any backbone it will insist to the last that the bill of rights was violated in attempting to be observed.

A FIELD OF EDUCATION

The New York Commercial remarks that an important element in reconstruction should be making the American public more enlightened and more interested in investments. The business needs to be interested and informed about investments the bringing used by the financial world to accomplish that object is well devised to judge the public and open leaves its followers uncertain.

Undoubtedly there is truth in what the Commercial says. There are much talk during the war that the great popular sales of government bonds would teach better investment habits and there must be some truth in that theory, but the people certainly have a great deal to learn which that experience did not teach them. No persuasive agent was needed to convince Americans that the bonds of our own government were good. They bought them without inquiry and learned nothing about the value of other forms of security.

Somewhere it has been discovered that a great many of the consumers are too ignorant or too negligent to turn in their temporary bonds for permanent bonds or even to collect interest when it comes. With such facts before them financial men do not lack proof that there is a large field for educational work.

MISS ALICE IS RIGHT AGAIN

Representative Alice Robertson adds another to her record of sound opinions in small matters when she says, "My male colleagues in congress think I am a woman. When I get into an elevator they make way for me and remove their hats. I wish they wouldn't."

Why should they take off their hats? An elevator is a public conveyance like a street car where nobody takes off hat and the relation between men and women in the elevator of a public building is no different from the relation that they sustain to each other in a public corridor of the same building.

There is no reason why men should take off their hats in the presence of women in the elevators of the Michigan Central station, for instance, that would not apply in the waiting room or the tenement. That is to say, there is no reason at all.

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



WOMAN'S HAIR IS HACKED OFF; HOME IS BURNED

Three Men Seize Mrs. Schlosser
and Set Fire to Home
As Husband Sleeps.

(By Associated Press)

WATERTOWN, Wis.—Mrs. Max Schlosser's appearance at the front door of her home seven miles south of here, on the Coffee road early yesterday morning, probably prevented the family from being wiped out by fire started by three men for motives of revenge, according to Sheriff W. A. Woelffer.

Mrs. Schlosser was seized by the men, her hair hacked off with a butcher knife, and sent back to the house with orders to keep her mouth shut or she would have her head cut off. Thirty minutes later the whole front of the house was in flames and Schlosser barely had time to remove a few of their household effects before the house was destroyed.

Bloodhounds were placed on the trail of the three men suspected of the crime. The hounds arrived at night and it was feared that they would have difficulty in picking up the scent in case of rain which fell Wednesday and early on Thursday. Sheriff Woelffer has one man under surveillance and arrests may be made soon, the sheriff is certain.

Woman's Hair Cut Off

Mrs. Schlosser appeared at the front door as the three men were saturating the place with oil, intent upon destroying the house and Schlosser, her wife and baby asleep inside. The men interrupted in their task, seized the woman and cut off her hair for the purpose of threatening her into silence. An oil can containing a small amount of kerosene was found near the entrance of the house by the sheriff and supports the theory that the men intended to burn the house and the family when interrupted by Mrs. Schlosser.

Husband Sees Men

Schlosser was aroused by the cries of his wife and rushed to the front porch in time to see what he believed to be three men disappearing into the darkness. He fired at them with a shotgun. One man returned to the scene with his wife and the other two, in fear of being discovered, fled to safety. The sheriff was held this afternoon at a meeting of the family.

Thirty minutes later the fire was discovered.
