REPORT SAYS HENRY FORD IS A BILLIONAIRE

Detroit, Not Rockefeller, Is Nation's Richest Man, According to the Latest Figures.

(By Associated Press) DETROIT, Jan. 11.—Henry Ford begins the New Year with the greatest amount of cash in the bank that any human being ever had.

Henry Ford's bank balance today is in excess of \$121,000,000. He himself does not know within \$5,000,000 or \$10,000,000 of how much actual cash he has at the moment.

Balance Above \$125,000,000 "Our balance today," said Mr. Ford, "is probably between \$121,000,000 and \$125,000,000."

Henry Ford is a billionaire. In reply to a question he told me Friday that he had no doubt that his holdings, based upon their value, could be liquidated and sold for 5 billion dollars.

Mr. Ford says the information because passed for it. Neither he himself nor his observation runs to money. I am, my money means less to him than he any other rich man.

Could Be Sold for Billion "My property," he estimated, "is worth at about \$125,000,000 worth of buildings, 1,000,000 worth of machinery and something else. That is \$125,000,000 in cash. As a going concern, I have no doubt that they could be liquidated and sold for a billion dollars."

Had this \$125,000,000, or whatever it is, that we have in the bank, would you like to see a man with which to work, I might wish it to be the richest man in the world.

AMERICA MUST SIT IN

One day it is given out that Sir Laming Worthington Evans, British secretary of war, has had a conference with Ambassador Harvey regarding the plans for economic reconstruction of Europe and has told him that Great Britain considers American participation in a consortium essential to the success of any such project.

Whether so intended or not, here we have an effective question and an answer that define the viewpoint and position of two nations regarding the most important international movement for postwar rehabilitation.

Unquestionably, too, the President is often in his position. Taking up what is perhaps the least weighty consideration, this country after having invited other nations to come to Washington for a conference on limitation of armaments and adjustment of Pacific and Far East questions, can not as a matter of ordinary courtesy refuse to sit at that conference in Paris called to discuss why and how means which will improve the condition of the world may be achieved and commercial conditions rehabilitated.

But far more important than this is the fact that America cannot afford to remain aloof. As a great manufacturing and trading country, it must have in touch with its customers and with those from whom it buys its leading world power it must have its representatives in any significant international gathering.

Although the Asiatic continent is teeming with unemployed resources, millions in Russia and China are starving and Japan is poor. Crooked stick and futile legs. A few more tons doubling the world's present production of food stuffs.

Filled by American farmers, Siberia alone could feed the world. And that vast area stretching more than 1,000 miles from the Pacific to the Urals has all the trimmings of forest and minerals which combine with good farming land to feed, house, clothe and equip a wealthy nation.

Something big is in the making of Asia, as big, indeed, something big must develop in such a country, and whether it is to make for prosperity or for perdition may depend in large part upon the decisions of present-day statesmen.

European and American purposes and interests need to be crossed those of Asia. The plans and other farming implements built in the United States will reduce the crooked stick farming of Asia, and Manchuria will then be able to keep every Asiatic from starving.

The commerce of the Pacific may soon restore the prosperity which was furnished by the war in Europe. Asiatic war might reduce the world to barbarism. There is nothing little about Asia and the Pacific, and there is room in Asia for all the Japanese in which to develop to the full.

GOING AFTER A CONGREGATION

Luther's unwillingness to let the devil have all of the good songs may have been the inspiration of that Massachusetts preacher who has decided not to let the joy riders get all of the benefit of the automobile. The result arose from North Andover, where this clergyman holds forth. It is true, but reading between the lines, it is a safe guess that he found his congregations dwindling because too many of the worshipers preferred a spin in the country to a sermon in church at a session of the Sunday school.

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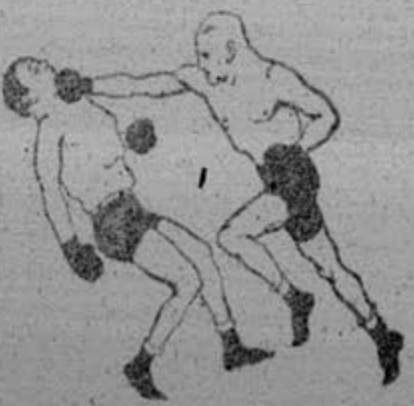
