

SALES TAX URGED TO PAY THE BONUS

HARDING SAYS OTHERWISE IT SHOULD WAIT

Suggests Postponement Unless Sales Tax Idea Is Accepted.

Declares Sale of Surplus War Property Will Bring 'Great Relief' to Treasury.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—President Harding informed congress today he considered a general sales tax the way of raising funds for the payment of the soldiers' bonus.

The executive in a letter addressed to Chairman Farley of the house ways and means committee, suggested that unless congress saw fit to enact a sales tax, the passage of bonus legislation would be "temporarily postponed."

"I believe," the president wrote, "the existing budget will accept the view of a general sales tax to meet the pressing needs of the treasury. I would suggest that there be no added difficulties to the problem of the budget."

"I express my hope that some such plan will be able to let the government get over this emergency situation which will justify the sacrifice."

See 'Great Relief'

Declaring that the government had under consideration the disposition of surplus war property and other means which would bring "great relief" to the treasury, the president said it would be wise to let the bonus go over, in case there is a situation which will justify the sacrifice.

Action Predicted

Statement of a sales tax as the only practical method of raising money for the bonus was stated by the president in a message to congress today.

The president's message was addressed to the members of the senate and house of representatives.

THE RUTLEDGE ACT

A statute of the state of Michigan says it shall be the duty of the police in conformity with the ordinances of the city and the laws of the state to apprehend any and all persons in the act of committing any offense against the laws of the state or the ordinances of the city involving a breach of the peace and to take the offender forthwith before the proper court or magistrate to be dealt with for the offense.

But this is too slow for Superintendent Rutledge of the Detroit police department, so he has promulgated a new law that is much simpler. Referring to the use of firearms by the police he says: "The officer has a right to fire at anyone whom he may reasonably suspect of having committed any crime. He should shoot if he suspects the name of having committed a felony, and the man refuses to obey his orders to stop."

Thus the problem of the best of the detective making his hands, become judge and executioner all in one according to his "own discretion and judgment," to employ the expression of the superintendent's expressions.

The legislature of the state at its last session declined to pass a capital punishment bill, and while there is considerable sentiment in favor of such an enactment, it is by no means certain that one will go on the books at the next session. But this does not disturb Superintendent Rutledge. He knows what he wants, and he issues a ukase which embodies the essential principle of the old Mexican "law of flight." And recently when through error, a man narrowly escaped being shot a victim of the "Rutledge act," the only consolation he received was the remark of an inspector that he was lucky not to be killed.

In writing this we are not forgetful that there are bad conditions in Detroit that make stringent police work necessary. We also agree with the superintendent when he says people ought to stop when ordered to do so by police officers because there may be some very good reasons for the request, but in the absence of martial law there is no justification for shooting on mere suspicion, or because people are not properly deferential. - Detroit Free Press.

Their method of procedure is to advocate a reduction of the efficiency of the American fleet so that it will be materially weaker than the strength allowed it under the terms of the arms compact. If these people have their way the navy will remain ostensibly a first class establishment, but in reality it will be only a second class one because it will be slow ship.

The scuttlers argue this way: "We are told that the peace of the world has been insured for fifteen years at least by the arms conference. Then why do we need a big navy?" This sounds pretty good. It is good bait for the thoughtless. But really it is difficult to understand how anybody who knows enough to get himself elected to congress can be stupid enough to take so superficial a view of any question.

If peace is insured for fifteen years, it is because agreements and understandings have been arrived at on the basis of a carefully considered balance of strength, which incidentally allows the American government to reduce the expense of their maintenance below anything that otherwise could be dreamed of. Much good international feeling has been engendered too, but the real basis of the arrangements concluded is a mutual naval adjustment. Throw this adjustment out of gear, and the work of the conference is nullified and endangered.

One sure way to throw it out of gear is to create a situation in which the United States will be impotent to play its full part as a sea power for keeping the world generally in a peaceful state of mind. In fact, it probably is no exaggeration to say that a kind of American naval chessmen will create the ruin of the whole naval compact and consequently the ruin of all the new assurances of peace.

We do not mean there ought to be no economies in the navy department. Every possible safe economy ought to be practised. Whenever a cut in estimates can be made without crippling the fleet, that cut should certainly be made. But there ought to be some employment of sense and reason in making the job.

A dispatch from Ireland says that the new government is threatened with trouble because so many Irishmen want office. This country has had the same difficulty but has always managed to get along.

Josephus Daniels thinks it's pitiful, for he and his crowd really wanted to do all the things that have been accomplished at the Washington conference, only they didn't.

It will not be easy to convince the three or four thousand men who lost their jobs in navy yards that the arms conference was an unoxoed blessing.

U. P. ROAD PROGRAM IS DEVELOPING

Cloverland Will Benefit by Work Outlined for Coming Spring and Summer.

(By Associated Press)

MARQUETTE, Feb. 15. - Recent developments in the road program of the state highway department, as outlined in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, are set forth in a recent letter from H. I. Davis, district engineer at Escanaba to George E. Bishop, secretary of the Upper Peninsula Development Board.

Road Information

Following are a few of the more important of the report:

The road from Hiram to Hildreth in Chippewa county, has been abandoned as a trunk line. There is no road on the location of this trunk line, but it is possible for a party to run one mile east from the point south of Hildrethence south and two miles west at a point three miles north of Hildreth.

The trunk line from the Line-Chippewa county line to Trout Lake has been abandoned. There is no road in place over this location, and all traffic must run from Trout Lake west on route 14 and 12 thence north on route 88 to trunk line route 25.

Federal Road Job

There is a federal road job in progress on Trunk line 12 from Noran to Bryan. It will consist of surfacing, grading and drainage structures from the east end to a point just east of Epoufette. Every effort will be made to have the vital points completed during the season of 1922, and it is expected that much of the trunk line will be in a way which will be most favorable to the completion of the work.

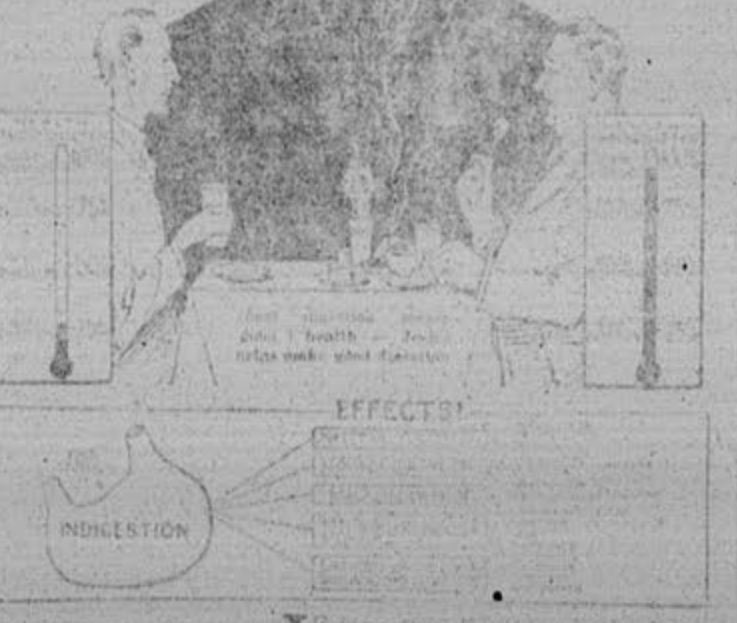
