NORTHWEST IN GRIP OF SEVERE BLIZZARD

ESCANABA STILL IN GRIP OF STORM AND RAILROADS GIVE UP

Escanaba Traction Company Operates Cars and Is Only City in Peninsula So Served.

Continuing without abatement, the storm which started Tuesday night and Wednesday and still today, with the exception of a brief respite today, is a tough with the outside world.

Not a train entered or left Escanaba after 11 o'clock this morning when the Chicago train due at 9:50 the night before came limping in. Train 117 was not up here and nothing has gone north since 7 o'clock yesterday morning.

Crew of Shovelers. Train 119 came down from Alpena by last night about seven o'clock and brought along a crew of about 15 shovelers who got off here. This train started south but was stuck at Marquette and that was the end of the line on the Northern system and such a thing as shovelers can be expected with some degree of accuracy.

The Escanaba and Lake Superior Railway is receiving around 100 cars a day but more up the example of this morning after a train started from Wolf Lake and arrived before reaching Escanaba. Efforts were centered on getting this train back to Wolf and the 6:30 A. M. was then prepared to start it.

A St. Paul train composed of two engines and two coaches was stalled three miles east of Iron River. It was reported this morning.

No Delivery Service. Local street cars, operated by Escanaba and Iron River, are still running but delivery service is impossible to get thru the storm today.

### EXPERT EXPLAINS HOW TO OPERATE ORDINARY FURNACE

Problem of Caring for the Fire So It Will Last Overnight, Is Explained.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23. Advice to operators of household furnaces, especially the kerosene and oil-burning type, has been applied to the Bureau of Mines for a number of days. Claimed to Have Made Less Tow Years Ago Than Any Year in the Last Ten.

NEW YORK, Feb. 23. The American farmer, who rose to unprecedented heights of prosperity in 1918 and 1919, cannot say in 1920 that he has gained in any way. In fact, the first time in his life, he is reported to have lost money. The farmer's income in 1920 was \$1,000,000,000, a drop of \$1,000,000,000 from their income for the year before.

The farmers who represent about 10 percent of the gainfully employed, have received during the past decade a share in the total national income varying between 12.5 percent in 1911 and 14.1 percent in 1918, 1919, 1920, when it dropped to 14.9 percent. The final figures for the total income in 1920 can only be approximately estimated by the delay in publishing the income tax returns.
