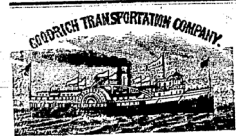

Says Mr. Blaine, speaking of Canada: "If they come with us, they can have what we have, but it is an absolute wrong against the rights of American citizens that millions of men who owe the U. The Cleveland Leader says that a Democrat Bohemian club of 60 members in that city, recently changed its name to "Republican Bohemian club" and came over solidly to Harrison and protection. The club now numbers 70 members—only two of whom ever voted the Republican ticket. They are workmen who don't propose to vote to reduce the scale of American wages to the English or foreign standard. The British export trade in 1893 was \$160,000,000 less than it was in 1873, ten years before. The steady decline in that time was due to a great extent to the establishment of protective tariff laws in some of the leading nations on the continent. A similar decline in the ten years from 1883 to 1893 would practically destroy the foreign trade of the United Kingdom; hence the eagerness of the British manufacturer to have the rich markets of America—the best in the world—opened up to him. The loss on the continent would be more than recompensed.—Indianapolis Journal.

A pitiful howl is sent up by the state because Bartley Breen was not allowed to vote his fraudulent proxies in the recent labor convention. Will some of these papers please explain how Mr. Breen came by these proxies. It is currently stated that not a convention was held in any of the countries—not even his own—covered by these proxies. The laboring men would like to know by what right he puts them in his pocket and attempts to deliver them as a job lot to the free trade candidate for Governor.—"Negroes Herald."

The True Northerner hits hard when it says: "The Mills bill taxes sugar, a Louisiana product, sixty-eight per cent, and places salt, a Michigan product, on the free list; it taxes rice, a South Carolina product, one hundred per cent, but places wool, in which the entire north is interested, on the free list; it places a duty on undressed marble, a Tennessee product, of forty cents per cubic foot, but makes northern building stone, freestone, sandstone and granite free. It is protection for the south and free trade for the north, and that is one reason why the voters of the north will repudiate the democratic party."

The Mills bill will reduce the workman's wages all over the United States. If the workmen are satisfied with the lowering of wages, then let them vote for a supporter of Free-Trade, like Mills. If they want higher wages, live better and more comfortable than European workmen, let them vote for men who will protect American labor with a suitable tariff. Did workmen ever emigrate to a Free-Trade country? Do the American workmen ever emigrate to Free-Trade countries? No, they do not; but the workmen from Free-Trade countries are glad to come to the United States, where they receive nearly twice as much wages, consequently have many more comforts and are much happier.—Chicago Journal of Commerce.

ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

STATE OF MICHIGAN, OFFICE OF SEC. OF STATE.

LANSING, Aug. 20, 1888. To the SHERIFF OF THE COUNTY OF SCHOOLCRAFT:

Sir: You are hereby notified that at the General Election to be held in this State, on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday of November next, the following officers are to be elected, viz: Thirteen electors of President and Vice-President of the United States; a Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Auditor General, Commissioner of the State Land Office, Attorney General and Superintendent of Public Instruction, also, a member of the State Board of Education in place of Eda Jenks, whose term of office will expire December 31, 1888; also, a Representative in Congress for the 14th Congressional District of this state to which your county belongs, also, a Senator for the 29th Senatorial District, comprising the counties of Schoolcraft, Alger, Lapeer, Chippewa, Delta, Emmet, Mackinac, also, a Representative in the State Legislature for the Representative District comprising the counties of Schoolcraft, Alger, Lapeer, Chippewa, Delta, Mackinac.

You are also hereby notified that at the election the following proposed amendment to the Constitution of this State will be submitted to the people of the State for their adoption or rejection, viz: An amendment to Section 6 of Article 6, relative to Circuit Court provided for by Joint Resolution, No. 11, Laws of 1887.

Section 6. The State shall be divided into judicial circuits, in each of which the electors thereof shall elect one circuit judge, who shall hold his office for the term of six years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. The legislature may provide for the election of more than one circuit judge in the judicial circuit in which the city of Detroit is or may be situated, and in the judicial circuit, the county of Saginaw is or may be situated. And the circuit judge or judges of said circuit, in addition to the salary provided for by this constitution, shall receive from their respective counties a fixed additional salary as may from time to time be fixed and determined by the boards of supervisors of said counties. And the board of supervisors of each county in the Upper Peninsula is hereby authorized and empowered to give and pay to the circuit judges of the judicial circuit to which such county is attached such additional salary or compensation as may from time to time be fixed and determined by such board of supervisors.

You are also hereby notified that at said election there will be submitted to the people of the State for their adoption or rejection a Revision of the laws authorizing the business of banking, provided for by Act 235 of the laws of 1887, in accordance with Section 2, Article 15 of the constitution of this State.
