PROFESSOR SCHURMAN.
 Cornell's New President Has Decided to be a Republican.
 The newly elected president of Cornell University, Professor Jacob Gould Schurman, is a late but enthusiastic convert to protection and Republicanism, a fact on which the great educational institution is to be congratulated. It is only recently that Professor Schurman became a citizen. During his stay at Cornell as a professor of philosophy he has been carefully studying politics and po-

 Ideal history in this country, with the purpose of identifying himself with one or the other of the great parties on becoming naturalized. In a speech before a Republican campaign club at Ithaca during the gubernatorial contest of last year he formally announced his position and decision in these words:
 I am a Republican by conviction. Many of you are Republicans by birth and conviction combined. I have come to be a Republican solely through conviction, not having always been such. I have watched the course of events and the procedure of the parties in this country somewhat closely for five years, and I may say that though I was a member of the Democratic party I yet had at one time, and for a considerable period, a predilection for that party because of its free trade teachings; but I became thoroughly disappointed with the Democratic party because of President Cleveland's distinctionless course in the matter of civil service reform, and with the attitude of that party on that subject over since and although, as I said before, I was inclined when I first came to this country to favor free trade, I became convinced, after a long and impartial study of the subject, that however it might be in England, peculiarly situated as it is, and whatever might be true in small countries, generally for this country, for all great countries, for an entire continent, the protective principle is the proper one to follow. That was that I began to lean toward the Republican party, and when the Democrats of Ohio came out in a platform for free trade and free silver I went over body and soul to the Republican ranks. I say I went over. I do not mean by that that I went over from the Democracy, for I never was a Democrat, but that I then and there became a true blue, thoroughgoing Republican.
 President Schurman will add strength to Cornell university through his advocacy of protection. His openly avowed change of position was made after he

had been a student in POLITICAL economy, social science and international law under the greatest educators and renowned teachers of these branches in the great university of London, through the personal influence and aid of the great positive strength, for he had both sides of the tariff issue.—New York Press.

Out on the Hypocrite.

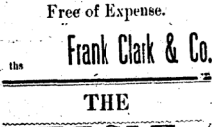

For the World's Fair.

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., June 1, 1892.
 EDITOR OF THE PIONEER—Dear Sir:
 We wish to make a display of Michigan woods and wood products at Chicago next year that will create a sensation. It can be done if the people of our State will render our committee reasonable assistance in gathering what we have to show. We feel confident of this help, and take this method of asking for what we need.

1. A section, not less than four feet long, of such kind of timber tree growing in the State, from as near a typical specimen as possible. Of the more prominent kinds employed in manufacturing, we would like sections of the largest trees in the State, and solicit information on this point.

2. Boards are wanted which illustrate the beauty of grain found in all our woods used by manufacturers and finishers; these to show various methods of sawing, as well as styles of finish.

3. A complete museum of the seeds and fruits of Michigan timber trees will be made. Not less than a quart of each kind is desired.

4. In a general way, we desire to make a complete exhibit of everything manufactured from native woods in our State. This is not intended to intrude upon the domain of finished manufacture goods, like furniture, carriages, etc.

5. We desire to gather a museum of curious forms of wood products, like knots, knurls, natural grafts, gnarled limbs, and anything curious or monstrous connected with tree growth or mutilation.

6. We wish photographs and sketches of Michigan trees, timber, forest scenes, logging and lumbering operations—anything that will illustrate our timber products and methods of utilizing them.

7. One important object we have in view is to present and illustrate any new uses to which woods are put; information and aid in this direction is sought.

We ask you to aid us, by correspondence and the advertisement of our needs, to learn where anything can be found which will contribute to a complete exhibit. We shall establish a depot in Grand Rapids for assorting and preparing the collection. All articles received for exhibition will be labeled with the name and address of the donor. Any suggestion you may make in furtherance of our plan to secure a complete and attractive exhibit will be gratefully acknowledged, and we earnestly request that you do not lay this communication thoughtlessly aside, but "lend a hand" in performing the task assigned our committee.

All communications should be addressed to Chas. W. Garfield, Grand Rapids, Michigan, Superintendent of Forestry and Forest Products.
