LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 9.—An explosion occurred at the Giant and Judson powder works near West Berkeley shortly after 9 o'clock this morning, destroying the works and much property for several miles round. Five shocks were felt in this city within a few minutes, the last four being of terrific force, shaking buildings, cracking a number of walls and breaking plate glass in buildings eight blocks up from the water front. There were 180 men employed at the works, and of these it is known but few escaped with their lives. Relief parties have gone from Oakland to the scene of the explosion, which is 12 miles from this city. A large number of Chinese were employed in the works. The explosion was so terrible few bodies can be found. The body of a Chinaman was found on the railroad track half a mile from the works. At the office of the Giant powder company, this city, it was thought that the Judson works, which are located at Lotelle, about three miles from the Giant works, were safe. The Giant works are located at Point Isabel and Highland near Stege, and comprise five buildings and three magazines. Of these buildings the acid and nitro-glycerine works were destroyed and at least one magazine blown up. The other buildings not immediately destroyed took fire.

TANGHERS, July 8.—Messrs. Chamber and Bonsal, who are traveling in Morocco, have been severely maltreated in Fez. They were also grossly insulted by dependents of the government. Mr. Bonsal was shopping in the town and just escaped falling a victim to an armed mob. A representative of the Moorish government and Messrs. Chamber and Bonsal appeared before the British minister, who after an inquiry into the case, decided that they had serious grounds for demanding redress. They had given the Moors no cause for annoyance.

The following decision of interest to mariners was recently made in the New York courts: Where two tugs are approaching each other in a narrow channel in such wise that by continuing on they will meet at a point where it is difficult and dangerous for them to pass, it is the duty of the tug going against the current or tide to stop before reaching such difficult point and wait for the other tug to go by her.

The PIONEER is decidedly in favor of early nominations of county officers, so that there will be an end to the usual contentions as to who shall be the candidates on the ticket. For some of the offices there are already several candidates in the field and a personal bitterness is naturally springing up that will continue to grow until the matter is finally decided by the convention. Hence the sooner it is settled the better, and then let all our opposition be directed against our common enemy, the Democracy. Delay only tends to weaken our own forces by fomenting an unpleasant strife among our own people. We are independent in this matter and can afford to be, as we have no personal favorites in the field; they are all our friends; but we want these petty contentions ended, for the good of the State and National tickets. Hence we say the earlier the County Convention is held the better.

Men are coming to the surface rapidly for this or that county office; most of them good citizens and would make splendid officers if elected; but there comes in trouble over the matter; some of them cannot "get there," and it is useless to encourage them in their aspirations. Hear every man's claim for position, weigh them well; but do not commit yourself to any one unconditionally until the convention decides. Attend the preliminary caucus and see that the right kind of delegates represent you in that convention. That is your duty and privilege.
 Benjamin Harrison and Grover Cleveland are not new men, whose standing has to be inquired into by the voters. They are both well known. Harrison defeated the stuffed prophet before and will again, as the masses have become satisfied that he is the right man to fill the office of President. The race promises to be a clean one from first to last.

The English press is working hard for the election of Grover Cleveland; a fact that the American voter should remember when he casts his vote next November.

Four candidates in the field for President now: Harrison, Republican; Cleveland, Democrat; Weaver, People's party and Bidwell, Prohibition. The two first named are in the race and the last two are waiting only to see the procession pass by.

CRIMES AND CRIMINALS.
 Frank Holmstrom, 33 years old, a laborer, was murdered in Pittsburg by his two brothers-in-law. The killing was the result of a drunken brawl.

Westly Clever made an attempt to commit a criminal assault upon Mrs. Farmer in Vernon, Ky., when she seized a revolver and shot him dead. General Schofield has received a telegram from General Wharton, commanding the department of Texas, saying he has no information of the revival of the Garza movement, or of any political uprising whatever along the Rio Grande.

Otto Von Seifer, a journeyman baker in a cell at the central police station, Minneapolis, where he had been placed for being drunk. Investigation showed that the man's skull was broken. He may have fallen and sustained the injuries or it may have been a case of murder. Detectives are investigating.

FOREIGN.
 One hundred deaths a day from cholera are reported at Baku, on the Caspian sea.

The Norwegian cabinet has resigned on account of the king's refusal to sanction the starting of a resolution in regard to the establishment of separate Norwegian consulates.

The premier of New South Wales has received a letter threatening him with death unless the elections bill is withdrawn from parliament. It is rumored that a plot to murder prominent members of the assembly has been discovered.

MISCELLANEOUS.
 In the Yale-Harvard boat race Yale won by fifteen lengths.
 The Democratic national committee will meet at the Fifth Avenue hotel, New York city, July 20, to elect officers.
 Mrs. Anne Broderick and three children were suffocated in a fire at New York city, caused by a lamp explosion.

Henry Weld Fuller, the only brother of Chief Justice Fuller, died at the residence of his son in New Rochelle, N. Y.

Sales agents of the anthracite companies met in New York and decided on a general increase of 30 cents per ton for Western points.

The steamer City of Chicago, which went on the rocks at Kinalead Friday evening, has been broken up by the waves and is a total wreck.

The Kansas state Democratic convention met at Topeka Wednesday and adopted a resolution naming the ten electors nominated by the People's party as the choice of the Democrats.

The president has decided to appoint Colonel Robert Williams, senior assistant general, to be adjutant general of the army vice General J. C. Kelton, retired, who will be appointed governor of the soldier's home at Washington.

Harold M. Sewall, of Maine, consul general at Samoa, has tendered his resignation, and it has been accepted by the president in a letter expressing the highest appreciation of his excellent services.

Near Murray, Ky., a threshing boiler exploded, killing Albert Hamman, the engineer, and wounding two other persons who were assisting about the threshing, four of whom are fatally injured.

The International Navigation company will soon comply with the terms of the recent act of congress admitting the steamships City of New York and City of Paris to American registry, and four ships of similar size and swiftness will be constructed in the United States.

WORLD'S FAIR NOTES.
 An exact fac simile of the San Louis Rey mission, perhaps the finest and most celebrated of all the famed old mission ruins in Southern California, will be seen at the world's fair.

A group of Caribs from the Lesser Antilles, descendants of the cannibal race discovered by Columbus as his second voyage, will be at the world's fair, engaged in making baskets and in other native industries.

An agent of the Turkish government is on his way to Chicago to superintend the construction of the Ottoman pavilion and a Turkish village for the world's fair. Accompanying him are native masons who will build the pavilion.

It is reported that King Alexander of Serbia, has decided to visit the world's fair next year. He is 18 years old, and son of the much talked of ex-King Milan and ex-Queen Natalie.
 Major Fred Brackett, of the United States treasury department, is in Chicago to make arrangements for handling world's fair exhibits from foreign countries which must go through the hands of the customs officials. He estimates that a large force of men will be required to properly conduct the work.

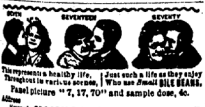
