#### LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 9.—An explos-ion occurred at the Giant and Judson powder works near West Berkely shortly after 9 o'clock this morning de-stroying the works and much proper-ty for several nules round. Five shocks were felt in this city within a few minutes, the last four being of ter-rific force, shaking buildings, cracking number of walls and breaking plate glass in buildings eight blocks up from the water front, There were 180 men employed at the works, and of these it is known but few escaped with their lives. Relief parties have gone from Oakland to the scene of the explosion, which is 12 miles from this city. A large number of Chinese were employ-ed in the works. The explosion was so terrible few bodies can be found. The body of a Chinaman was found on the railroad track half a mile from the works. At the office of the Gant powder company, this city, it was thought that the Judson works, which are located at Lobelle, about three miles from the Giant works, were safe. The Giant works are located at Point Isabel and Highland near Stege, and comprise five buildings and three magazines. Of these buildings the acid and nito-glycerine works were destroy-ed and at least one magazine blown up. The other buildings not immediup. The other buildings ately destroyed took fire.
