## MEMORIAL DAY MAY 30

IN MEMORY OF THE HEROES WHO GAVE THEIR LIVES THAT THE UNION MIGHT LIVE.

WHERE NORTH AND SOUTHWALL CONFLICT PAST. SHALL MEET AGAIN—AT PEACE AT LAST. AND LOVE-IN PARADISE.

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A census bulletin gives the receipts and expenditures of national, state and local governments. Michigan's total receipts per annum are \$7,899,821 of which \$3,056,570 are state and \$2,297,596 are county. Michigan's expenditures are \$17,415,454, of which \$2,492,292 are state and \$5,625,154 are county. Michigan's total revenues tax on real and personal property aggregate \$18,913,591. An appendix to the bulletin gives the receipts and expenditures, schools included, of this state, 20,000 more in population. Detroit's receipts other than from loans and investments were \$3,081,405. Those of Grand Rapids were \$783,853. Detroit's expenditures for loans and investments were \$3,117,969 and those of Grand Rapids were \$866,656. Detroit's per capita expenses are 16.41 and those of Grand Rapids are 13.18.

Dunk's Review, of Monday, has the following to say in regard to the situation: "Storms and floods, prolonged strikes and large exports of gold, have done their utmost this week to give business a vacuum and reduce it to a state of stagnation. The week has not been a very successful one, and yet greater than those of any other in this country, has caused a volume of trade quite large for the season. These things do not appear near an end, and while violence and bloodshed have occurred at a few points, most of the operators are making no effort to work their mines. The lack of fuel has stopped practically the whole of the Elgin Thompson and parts of other Carnegie works, many establishments of great size, and even the water works of the West. Railroad traffic is as yet affected comparatively little, but weeks of idleness for so many either inevitable in or affected by the strikes must lessen purchasing power and demand for goods, and so cloud an outlook which had begun to seem brighter."
