WATERWORKS THE ISSUE.

Manistiquette Cannot Afford the Loss of Water and Sewerage Systems.

We are informed that the issue at stake during the municipal campaign will be the question of supplying the village with an adequate system of waterworks. Some of the politicians are in favor of an extensive, not necessarily expensive system of water works while others believing in adequate protection from fire, are in favor of furnishing the protection needed by expending money for several new wells and properly "capping" the numerous wells about town so that there will be an adequate supply of water in all portions of the city for protection from fire.

Several of the wells thus equipped have been frequently used during the past few months and in every case have proved inexhaustible. Hydrating wells an inexpensive and entirely satisfactory system of protection would be furnished.

There are several reasons why a system of waterworks are out of the question.

Manistiquette taxpayers cannot afford to bond themselves in a sum aggregating from \$50,000 to \$100,000 for a system of waterworks. There are many tax payers in the town and the present rate of taxation is burdensome. Then too, a system of sewerage would have to be constructed at a cost equally as great as that of a system of waterworks.

In cities having the population of Manistiquette the revenue to be derived from the system by taxing the property owners is usually sufficient to pay the interest on the bonds and to create a sinking fund for the retirement of the bonds. This source of revenue would be non-existent in Manistiquette.

Nine tenths of the families of the town live in rented houses, and holding no long time leases, they would be averse to going to the heavy expense of tapping the mains and piping their houses. Persons living in rented houses would not be likely to go to the expense and if their landlords did it for them there would, of necessity, be a startling increase in the price of rent.

Manistiquette must have better fire protection but it is not in condition to bond itself for an enormous sum.

A low rate of taxation is one of the greatest inducements any town can offer to promoters of industries. The rate, were the town heavily bonded, would be prohibitive and it would be years before the town would recover from the high-flying effects.

The money that a preliminary estimate or survey would cost the village would be ample to furnish every portion of the village ample protection were wells utilized.

We understand that the principal agitator for a system of waterworks has been a resident of Manistiquette barely long enough to be a voter and that the amount of taxes he pays can be best illustrated by a 0 with the rim taken off.

Ascertain where the candidates for various offices stand on the question and if they are in favor of recklessly plunging the village in debt, see to it that they are not nominated next Monday evening.
