Another one of Manistique township's characteristic hard fought Republican caucuses was held at the opera house last Tuesday afternoon. The caucus was called to order by Committeeman Ashford who read the call for the caucus.

Messes W. H. Nelson, superintendent of the furnace company, and W. L. Loranger were named in nomination for chairman.

Upon motion Mr. Ashford appointed the tellers. He selected Harry Rose and Dr. Malmgren.

MUST GET TO PEKIN.

United States Determined to Rescue
Americans if Alive.

WASHINGTON, July 13.—"On to Pe-
kin" is the policy adopted by our gov-
ernment. It is said that regardless of
the issues raised as to the authenticity
of the last Chinese note or the accuracy
of its statement of facts or the question
raised as to the responsibility for the
present situation, our government at
least is determined not to relax its ef-
forts to reach Pekin, to get in touch
with Mr. Conger if he is alive, then
take the necessary steps for the pro-
tection of American interests, and in fact
to do all the things set out in Sec-
retary Hay's note to the powers,
including a reckoning with the person
or persons responsible for the
outrageous events of the past six weeks.
Twenty-four hours consideration of the
Chinese note leaves the officials here
convinced that it marks the beginning
of a general effort on the part of offi-
cials to relieve themselves from respon-
sibility for the treatment of the foreign
ministers and the fighting at Tien Tsin.
That, in itself, is regarded as a hopeful
sign of the approaching collapse of the
Boxer movement and the termination
of the state of insurrection that exists
in Pekin and Shantung.

PRINCE TUAN INSANE.

This Is the Latest Sensation Connected
in China.

CHIEF Foo, Monday, July 9.—It is re-
ported on good authority that Prince
Tuan has become insane.

In consequence of the movement of
the rebels toward Tien Tsin, the Ger-
mans have withdrawn some of their
troops from Taku to protect Tien Tsin.
The women and children from New
Ohwang have arrived here.

RECOGNITION IMPOSSIBLE.

Twenty-four Bodies Recovered From the
Saale, Making 168 in All.

NEW YORK, July 13.—Twenty-four
bodies were recovered from the hold of
the burned steamship Saale during the
day, which makes the total number of
dead taken from this ship about 60.
Most of the bodies were so badly burned
or mutilated that recognition was im-
possible, but several were identified by
initials or names on articles taken from
parts of clothing that sometimes re-
mained. All of them appeared to be of
workmen in the holds of the steamship.

One hundred and fifty-nine bodies of
victims have been recovered, and eight
more are known to be on the Saale,
having been located but not taken out.
This makes 167 bodies recovered from
the ship, river and bay. One other
body was found off Rockaway, making
the total thus far 168.

IS ONLY TEMPORARY.

Martial Law in Force at Nome Pending
Establishment of Government.

WASHINGTON, July 13.—The war de-
partment has received the following
message from General Randall, dated
Nome City, Alaska, June 20, via San
Francisco, July 1:

"At request of chamber of commerce
have assumed control of affairs in town
of Nome until the arrival of the judge
and the establishment of municipal
government under recent act of con-
gress. Estimated this date 10,000 peo-
ple in the town and no effective civil
organization for protection of life and
property."
