## THE PINGPONG CRAZE.

Sadden Furor in Society Created by Table Tennis.

### SPREADING TO THE OUBLES.

New Game Which Came From Australia Gains Wide Popularity in the United States—Oubles Can Be Had For From \$2.50 Up to \$10.

Rules Governing Play.

For two seasons the game has been popular in Australia, New Zealand, India and the British Isles. Early last fall it was introduced into the United States and Canada, and in a matter of two months it had caught the popular fancy.

G. S. Cox, who managed the tour of Harry Yardon in the United States and who recently returned from a visit to London, reports that the tournaments in the English metropolises attract large crowds and that the outfit there cost as high as \$75.

These expensive affairs are used in pavilions and are made with gold and silver sideposts and other costly accessories. So far the game has gone to such extremes on this side of the water, and outfits can be had from \$2.50 to \$10.

A Chicago dealer is authority for the statement that at least 60 per cent of the people whose names appear in the blue book are possessors of a pingpong outfit. From homes the game is spreading to the clubs, and visitors on any night to the Winter club, University club and Chicago Athletic association can hear the ping and pong of the celluloid balls as they come in contact with the mallets of the players.

Following the wake of the clubs come the hotels, the Virginia being one of the first to secure an outfit for the benefit of its guests. Bowling alley keepers who have the space are contemplating installing the game, and Captain A. C. Anson has already made negotiations for an equipment.

With the game catching on at such a pace there appears to be every probability of the leading clubs playing matches, and the same condition of affairs exists here as in London, where the National Sporting club has been obliged to set apart special rooms for the game and where the billiard halls are practically deserted.

Pingpong is a sort of miniature lawn tennis, which can be played on any fair sized dining table, although for special matches there are specialized arrangements. The ball, which is con-

stricted of celluloid, is slightly smaller than a golf ball and feels much like a blown bird's egg. It is about five inches in circumference. The racket, which is of batonides, as they are variously termed, are light rattan affairs covered with parchment, sheep or cat skin, according to their prices.

The laws of the game are as follows:

1. The game is for two players. They shall stand one at each end of the table. The player who first delivers the ball shall be called the server and the other the striker.

2. The server shall stand behind the table and within the limits of the width of the table.

3. The service shall be strictly underhand and from behind the table; that is to say, at the three o'clock position the racket may not be over the table, and no part of the racket, except the handle, may be above the waist.

4. The ball must drop on the table beyond the net and on or off the table it is called a "fault" and counts to the striker out.

5. There is no second service except when the ball touches the net or gets in passing over and drops on the table beyond the waist, when it is called a "let."

6. If the ball in play strikes any object on or around the table, before it drops on the table (out or in) except the net, it counts as a stroke if the striker out fails to return the service to the table in play.

7. The striker out with a stroke if he fails to return the service to the table in play or returns the ball so that it falls outside the table.

8. No volleying is allowed, whether intentional or otherwise, and if any ball shall be touched before striking the table it counts against the player. In the case of a fault, however, a ball passing the limits of the table without dropping on it is dead and counts against the striker.

9. The method of scoring shall be by points, twenty points on one side of the game, the service changing after each five points scored. Should the score reach twelve all it shall be called "game" and the ball shall be served to the other side.

Some players prefer to count as in lawn tennis, the points being precisely the same. At present most of the Chicago games are singles, but by putting a line down the center of the table double can be played. In England the regulation sets are provided with side nets, which are several inches higher than the net itself. These are used to prevent players from returning the ball into their opponents' half of the table outside of the posts.

### Novelty in Matchboxes.

In Europe a new kind of matchbox is rapidly becoming popular, says the Chicago Evening Post. It consists of a drum or cylinder, in which matches are placed in such a manner that only one of them can be drawn without being moved forward by turning a small lever. When this lever is pressed, the cylinder revolves, and as it moves it matches fall into a groove, where it is gripped by a couple of catches. The most moment it is thrust forward and is lit by being passed over a rough metallic surface. Thus when a match is wanted all that is necessary is to press lightly on the lever. At once the light is forthcoming, and at the labor of striking the match on a box and then holding it in the hand at the risk of burning one's fingers is saved.

## PUBLIC SCHOOL MUSIC.

Mrs. Crosby Adams, in "Music."

If, then, we start our responsible work as teachers in the public schools with the conviction that what we are is the most vital thing, what else shall we bring to our work as teachers of music? The advice of old Pope Wick, Clara Schumann's father, would be useful today. To these are the three trifles he named as essentials to a good teacher: "The finest taste," "the deepest feeling," "the most delicate ear," and, in addition, "the requisite knowledge, energy and some practice." If, as Robert Schumann has said, "without enthusiasm nothing real comes of art," shall we not be that quality? Just a word or two under those headings:

1.—"The finest taste"—to my mind, as a teacher of many years' experience with children as well as adults, this is most important. In its largest meaning it is a recognition of the difference of the child's musical needs, an appreciation and tolerance of these states, and a selection of the most suitable material for these evolutionary periods in his life. There is no doubt whatever that the child passes through changes in other than the physical life. As a rule his sense of color starts where the Grecians were when Homer wrote the "Iliad," namely, an appreciation and perception of only the primary colors. And while the environment of the child in the nursery might be arranged from a more artistic basis in its permanent effects, the dash of strong colors need not satisfy the craving of the child's nature should be supplied to minister to this transitory period. Have we not seen even grown people, under cover of fashion's decree, satisfy this desire for color effect by blossoming forth quite regard—less of the aesthetic of the situation? The parallelism in music is that in ministering to the wants of the child we shall not deprive him of what is his due as his peculiar stage. Ask—how can we be a classic you will be benefitted at his reply. The idea is, as far as is consistent to meet him on his own ground and to find the material which will satisfy him and yet lead to a finer sense of taste of which we are speaking, remembering that Rome was not built in a day and that our education and enjoyment of a Tchaikovsky or Beethoven Symphony will come by strata after strata of impressions. What we appropriated as our own truth was we went along as what has remained with us.

2.—"The deepest feeling"—Berlioz says, "Music alone speaks at once to the imagination, the mind, the heart and the senses." The heart-quality must enter in here. We have unfortunately confounded sentimentality with sentiment, and what passes for playing and singing with "expression" would puzzle anyone, at times, to define.

3.—"The most delicate ear"—I make a plea for the restoration of this sense. When our teachers are fully awake to the responsiveness of children, through this as well as other avenues to the soul, they will be more than eager to extend the possibilities of the ear by training from day to day. Not every pupil can devote himself to music as a special study, but it should be possible for more people to understand that one can also be an "artist" in the capacity of listener.

As to the "requisite knowledge" referred to as an additional necessity on the part of the teacher here, too, we find cause for encouragement. There are many teachers who are enlarging their horizon by continual study of voice, instrument and harmony. The inspiration of good concerts is not to be overlooked.
