HARVARD UNIVERSITY HONORS PRINCE HENRY BY MAKING HIM LL.D.

WAR WELCOME IN BOSTON

Created by the Mayor and Other Officials and is Introduced to a Joint Session of the Legislature by Governor Crane—Business Houses Along the Principal Streets Appropriately Decorated for the Occasion.

Boston, March 7. Prince Henry's first view of Boston was of a snow-dusted city on a hill, and he was met by a clear sky. Hundreds of workmen were busy at daylight clearing the streets through which the prince and his party were to pass and at 5 o'clock they were in full condition.

The host storm had tempered the decorations but it did not prevent the restoration and nearly the entire route through the city was brilliant with color before the prince and the German flag of red, white and black predominated in many places over the red, white and blue.

Long before the special train due, crowds began to assemble in the neighborhood of the Great South station and extended to the squares assigned for the passage of the procession.

Mayor Collins and President Doyle of the board of aldermen and President Dolan of the common council were received by Admiral Evans as soon as the train stopped. The prince and his party were escorted into the car and introduced to Prince Henry.

Colonel Hughes, military aide to President Roosevelt, led the way into the big station where the cavalry was lined up at attention. This followed Rear Admiral Evans, Major Henry, Assistant Secretary of State Hill and Mayor Collins. Other members of the party brought up the rear.

As the line of carriages moved out of the driveway at the end of the station the immense crowd on the steps to cheer and the procession made its way through the throngs of persons making most hearty demonstrations of welcome.

Visits the State Legislature. At the Somerset Governor Crane and President C. W. Eliot of Harvard university called on the prince. Governor Crane remained but a few minutes. Shortly after the prince started for the stations, where he was received by the governor, the lieutenant governor and the heads of the military and naval departments and the state departments.

After the formal introductions a short time was spent in conversation. This was interrupted by the arrival of Mrs. Davis, who expressed that the legislature was in joint session to pay to his majesty the prince. He received the members of the city government and met 25 veterans of German wars. Mr. Collins introduced the veterans. One of them made a cordial address to the prince and in German. He expressed delight at seeing the veterans and shook hands with each.

Following the reception, the prince was escorted by Mayor Collins through the library. Retaining the Hotel Somerset, Prince Henry received Judge Francis C. Lowell and Henry L. Higginson, representing the corporation of Harvard university, and at 1 o'clock started with them for Cambridge.

Degree for Prince Henry. Sanders' thesis was crowned with medals, who stood at the prince's side and his suite and President Eliot and the faculty and corporation of Harvard. As the party moved to the platform the audience cheered and indulged in loud huzzahing. An orchestra in the background played and, as all were silent, closed its performance with a flourish.

With the first strains of the national hymn Prince Henry arose and stood at attention until the hymn was over. President Eliot then stepped to the center of the platform and, addressing Prince Henry, conferred the degree.

As President Eliot uttered the words "doctor of laws," Prince Henry arose. His attitude was dignified. His only response was a grave bow. The prince and his suite and the faculty retired, followed by the cheers of the students.

Harriages were taken for University hall, where luncheon in honor of the prince was served by the Harvard corporation.

Just before leaving Cambridge Prince Henry received a telegram from his brother, Emperor William II, congratulating him upon receiving the degree of LL.D. from Harvard university and saying that it was the highest honor which America could confer upon him.

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SCORE EMBUMBED.

SEVERE MINING DISASTER OCCURS IN A COLLIERY NEAR MONONGAHELA, PA.

BUT TWO GET OUT ALIVE

Viciously Estimated That From Ten to Thirty Others Are Still in the Mine and Fears Are Expressed That All Are Dead—Furious Fire Raging but Rescuers Are Attempting to Reach the Impaired Men.

Monongahela, Pa., March 7.—Another explosion occurred shortly before noon in the Catburg mine and two men were killed. It is thought that other men are reported entombed in the mine, which is burning furiously, and it is feared that all are dead. A rescue party is trying to reach the mine and to get in before the fire gets into the mine.

From what can be learned, John Hager, a machinist, was in the mine at noon or shortly before, and placed his safety lamp in one of the rooms in the mine. He was followed by another man, and the two were talking about the fire in the mine. Hager was standing in the mine when the explosion occurred. He was killed by the force of the explosion and many of them rendered insensible. Hager was standing for a minute, but as soon as he regained consciousness, he crawled over the protruding forms of the men and succeeded in getting into the mine. He was followed by James Turner. Both men were horribly burned about the face and hands, but they were able to get into the mine and tried to reach the workmen.

Workmen Piled on the Floor. Without success. He then went back to the opening and was taken in charge by a physician. Turner and Hager were taken to their homes. The party was on its way to work when the explosion occurred, but it is not known as to how many men were in the mine.
