MORRIS KINNER DEAD

Was Killed While at Work at the Tannery Plant Last Tuesday.

CLOTHING CAUGHT ON SHAFT

Was an Old and Respected Citizen of Manistique. Funeral was Held Yesterday.

Morris Kinner, an old and respected citizen of this city was killed at the plant of the Federal Lumber Co., about eight o'clock Tuesday morning while engaged in his duties as engineer of the portable engine. While in the act of oiling the engine his clothing caught on a shaft or pulley and he was thrown with such force as to cause almost instant death. His body was instantly removed to the morgue.

Funeral services were held from the Methodist church this afternoon. Rev. Osborne officiating. The body of Walter Woodruff and William Tennant were recovered this week. No pains were spared by friends and relatives and their efforts were rewarded as stated.

The body of William Tennant was recovered on the shore of Indian Lake last Tuesday evening about 5 o'clock by Asher Fox and an Indian boy named Innes. The body was found in the same vicinity where LeRoy Woodruff's body, and the boat were found last week. The funeral services were held from the Methodist church this afternoon. Rev. Osborne officiating.

THE CAUCUSES

Were Largely Attended Wednesday Evening. Eight in First and Second Wards.

O. A. BOWEN WINS OUT.

The Issue was the Clerkship and Treasurer of the Delegates.

Much interest was manifested by the caucus called for Wednesday evening of this week. The fight centered on the two candidates for register of deeds and county clerk, viz Messrs. Ashford and Bowen. Both hustled hard and were ably assisted by friends but without the contest was not marked by animosities or bitterness. All candidates were seemingly satisfied with the slate chosen for the Fourth ward and as a result there was no contest. In the Third ward Mr. Ashford decided at a late hour Wednesday afternoon not to place an opposition slide in the field, but contented his efforts in the First and Second wards where the indications for results appeared more promising. In the two wards above mentioned there were two slates and the Bowen slate won out by big majorities.

A resume of the caucuses follows: THE FIRST WARD. The first ward caucus was called to order by Committee man Norton. S. McNeil and John I. Jennings were placed in nomination for chairman, and Hans Christensen and John Knopf were appointed as tellers. The vote on chairman resulted in McNeil's election as he received 60 votes and Jennings 26.

The officers were then sworn and upon nominations being called, two slates were presented. The Bowen ticket with James Norton, S. McNeil, August Norman and Victor Marin, received sixty-five votes, while the opposition slate received twenty-one. The Ashford slate was J. I. Jennings, Frank Wharfield, John Lindsley and Alex Larsen. Harry Adams having resigned from the ward committee and as Dr. Burdick another member of the committee had removed from the ward, the vacancies were filled by the election of Sherman McNeil and Alfred Dadrstrom.

NAMED A TICKET.

The Democrats Held Their County Convention Last Saturday and Placed a Ticket in the Field.

HARMONIOUS AND WELL ATTENDED.

Mooty for Sheriff, McKinney for Treasurer and Geo. McPherson for County Clerk and Register of Deeds.

The Schoolcraft county Democratic convention convened at the court house last Saturday afternoon as per call of chairman, A. S. Putnam. Twenty delegates were present and every one of these were old time members of the party that have always been loyal to their political principles and beliefs, and at no other time within the past ten years, has the opposition party held a convention participated in by more representative members of the party. The convention was called to order by Mr. Putnam who was elected temporary chairman. Chas. B. Bails was elected temporary secretary.

Upon motion the chair appointed the following committees: Permanent organization—Dr. Walker, Thos. Helmka and Geo. McPherson. Credentials—John Costello, Charles Witter and D. J. Ward. After a short recess the committees reported.

The temporary organization was made permanent and the following delegates were found to be present and entitled to seats in the convention: Thompson township—Floyd Duell and Simon J. Bouscher. Inwood township—John Black. Manistique township—Andrew McDonald and John L. Witter. Doyno township—Thos. Conarty, A. H. Johnson. Manistique City—First ward—Geo. McPherson, Thos. Callahan, Thos. Helmka and C. E. Ward. Second ward—H. McConna, C. E. Bails and Frank Dolk. Third ward—C. B. Gray, Dr. Walker, J. B. Lewis and Fred Nelson. Fourth ward—John Costello, A. S. Putnam and Chas. Witter. The chair appointed H. McConna and Floyd Duell as tellers. The officers were then sworn by Harry Ashford.

THE CAUCUSES

Will Show. John Durmo was elected chairman and James Christensen, secretary. H. H. Abell and C. H. Zerbach were chosen tellers and the officers were sworn by Lewis Schneider.

THE THIRD WARD.

The caucus was called for the court house, but as the supervisors decided not to open the doors for the caucus the crowd assembled at the city building. Mr. W. F. Crane was elected chairman and J. H. McNaughton, secretary. E. E. Johnston and Ed. Jennell were selected as tellers after which the officers were sworn. Mr. O. A. Bowen then placed the following slate of delegates in nomination: W. F. Crane, W. S. Cross, Gust Ekstrom, Julius Peterson and Thomas Hannan. The slate was elected by acclamation.

Committee man Ekstrom called the caucus to order and Will B. Thoms was elected chairman, Geo. A. Wickie secretary and J. H. Van Tassel and J. H. McCallum were appointed tellers. The officers were sworn by Justice Hill. John Coffey, Chris Drevelahl and W. F. Koluaver were placed in nomination and there being no other nominations they were elected by acclamation.

The caucus completed its work in just six minutes. Norbert Duchesney Dead. Norbert Duchesney, aged 72 years, died at his home on Furnace street, Monday of this week. The deceased has been an invalid for years and during the past few months was helpless. He was born in Canada, and emigrated to Manistique about twelve years ago. He leaves a widow and six children to mourn his loss. The children are Mrs. Louisa Wilson of this city, Prof. Doel Duchesney of a business college at St. John, Quebec, Miss Virginia and Messrs. Arthur and Willie of this city, and Herman of Gladstone. Funeral services were held from St. Francis de Sales church Wednesday morning, and were largely attended.
