THE BIG RACE MEET

Plans Perfected for the Races to be Held October 5th.

ABOUT \$500 IN PURSES

Purses are More Liberal Than Any Ever Offered by Larger Upper Peninsula Cities.

A meeting of those interested in the proposed horse race to be held in this city on Wednesday, October 5th, met at the city building Wednesday evening to perfect an organization and make plans for the event.

W. L. Orr called the meeting to order and stated the objects of the meeting. Lewis Schuster was elected president and Edward Jewell, secretary and treasurer.

The following committees were appointed:
Printing—W. G. Evans, Geo. E. Holbrook and J. H. MacNaughton.
Collecting—Lewis Schuster and Andrew P. Elstrom.
Wednesday, Oct. 5th, was decided upon as the date for holding the meet, and it commences at 1 o'clock.

The program is made up of four races for which large purses are being run. The first will be a free for all, trot or pace, mile heats, best time in five. Purses \$2400 divided as follows: \$1, \$1, and 10 percent. An entry fee of 5 per cent. will be charged also 5 per cent. additional from the winners.

The second race will be a 250 yard or two for which a purse of \$300, divided as in the first race, is offered with similar conditions as to cost of entry and percentage paid by winners, also with regard to distance and number of heats.

The third race will be a green race, half mile heats, winner to get two of the three heats. The purse for this race is \$50, divided as follows, \$25, \$15, and \$10.

A half mile running race will complete the program and the purses of \$25 will be divided between the winners. The second race will be made for entry in the last two races but at least three entries must be made in all the races and two must start, to secure purse.

All entries must be made not later than 6 o'clock p. m., Oct. 4th, and the American Trotting Association rules will govern all races.
The track is being put in perfect condition and it is expected that the principal promoters to make this the principal sporting event ever held in the city.
Any information desired may be secured from Secretary Jewell who will furnish entry blanks upon demand.

FLOURING MILL FOR MANISTIQUE

A Gentleman is Considering the Desires of Manistique as a Place for Locating His Mill.

Mr. Geo. Mallette has a friend in the lower peninsula, a miller by trade, that is seeking a new location in which to establish a flouring mill. He thinks that Manistique would be a good place in which to locate and is sufficiently interested in the town that he expects to visit Manistique and investigate conditions here shortly. If he should decide to locate here he would install a modern and up-to-date mill. The project deserves encouragement from business men and farmers.

FAVOR OF ROAD IMPROVEMENT

One of Clermont's Prominent Citizens So Expresses Himself.

Mr. L. W. Holbrook, who was elected one of the delegates to the convention from Clermont township, was in attendance at the county convention last Wednesday. There were two other candidates for the honor for which he was elected, viz: H. Knagge and Anos Strauffer and the caucus was the hottest in the history of the township. He is one of the most progressive farmers of the county, and with his brother, owns the Fox River farm in that township. He is enthusiastically in favor of improving the road between Manistique and his township so that the trip to the county capital will be without the danger to life and limb by people desiring to visit. HARMONY PREVAILS

The Nominations Made Wednesday Will Tend to Obliterate Factional Differences.

EVERY NOMINEE WILL BE ELECTED

No Valid Reason Can Be Offered by Anyone to Refuse the Tickets.

While the result of the convention may not suit everyone, especially the defeated candidates, it is apparent to all that a long step toward harmony in the Republican ranks of Schoecraft county was taken last Wednesday afternoon.

The PIONEER-TRIBUNE, during the pre-convention campaign, treated every rival with uniform fairness, but expressed no preferences, and repeatedly reiterated that the ticket to be placed in nomination would have its unqualified support as well as every other Republican ticket both county and city, since the paper has been founded.

Both factions have been recognized in the nominations just made, and no possible excuse why the nominees should not receive the hearty support of the Republican vote can be justly advanced.

All of the candidates with very few exceptions have been residents of the county for many years, and have the respect and esteem of their acquaintances, and their ability to fill the offices to which they will be elected next November cannot be questioned.

Magnus Klugstad, who will succeed Sheriff Moody, was the candidate two years ago and was defeated by a very close margin. He has elements of support this year that he did not have at that time and his majority will be entirely satisfactory this time. He has been a resident of Schoecraft county for more than twenty years and has always earned his livelihood by working in the woods and mills. During Sheriff Elstrom's tenure of office he was faithful and the experience he acquired thus will be of material assistance to him in conducting the affairs of the office. That the Republican party will never have cause to regret his nomination and election goes without saying.

Mr. V. I. Hixson, who has had much experience in the conduct of the office of prosecuting attorney will succeed himself. This he has capably and suitably given him at the convention.

Otto A. Bowen, who has so acceptably filled the office of county clerk and register, has a large circle of friends who best wishes attend her to her new home.

IS A BIG DOCKET

Many Cases to be Tried in the Circuit Court Which Convenes Next Week.

MAJORITY ARE CRIMINAL CASES

Manister Hankley's Trial is Included in the List.

The largest docket in the history of the county will confront the circuit court next week. Included in the list are two dozen or more alleged violations of the liquor law, a murder case, a rape case and a forgery case, in addition to the usual list of chancery and law cases.

A partial list follows:

- The People vs. George Miller; rape.
- The People vs. Daniel Strickland, alias Daniel Hankley; murder.
- The People vs. John Robinson; assault with intent to commit murder.
- The People vs. Peter Borow; violation of liquor law.
