MERSEREAU HIGHLY HONORED

The President Appoints Theodore Mersereau, Inspector of Boilers in the Steamboat Inspection Service at New York.

Theodore Mersereau, a former resident of this city, and a brother of DeWitt Mersereau, was appointed Inspector of Boilers in the Steamboat Inspection Service at New York by President Roosevelt.

Mersereau had for years been assistant inspector of boilers at the port of New York, and the daily papers say that his promotion was the result of his creditable work in the past. Aside from the honor, the salary of his new position is very large.

He was at one time engineer of the Hunter, which plied between Manistique and the Straits, and shortly after leaving here eleven years ago, secured a position in the department of which he is now the head.

CAPTURED FORGERS

Who Had Issued Forged Orders on Wm. Bonifas of Garden, and Dr. Hughes of Thompson.

Deputy sheriff Chas. Olmsted went to Nahana yesterday and captured Alvin Flynn wanted here on the charge of forging the names of Charley Arnold money orders on Wm. Bonifas. Some time ago Flynn took an order to Joe St. John saying that he had been working and turned the order over to N. A. Bink, who took it to the Escanaba bank for collection. Even then the forgery was not discovered until it was returned to Mr. Bonifas. Flynn had a hearing before Justice of the Peace Levi Leavelle, when it developed that another man was implicated by the name of Marcus, who had been traveling with Flynn. Late last night Dr. Hughes of Thompson brought an order to the court for the sum of \$17.85 that he had cashed for Marcus, also a forgery. It is said that Marcus attended bookkeeping school at some time where he obtained some blank money orders, and those he used. According to the testimony it appears that both are implicated, although Flynn denies having had anything to do with it. Judge Barthelemy bound them over to circuit court for bonds of \$800.—Garden Cr. Iron Post.

FOUR BALLOTS

Every Voter Will Be Expected to Vote Four Ballots This Fall.

When the voter approaches the judges of election Tuesday, Nov. 8th, he will be handed four ballots which he will be expected to vote. The large ballot will contain the national, state, senatorial, legislative and county tickets of the several parties.

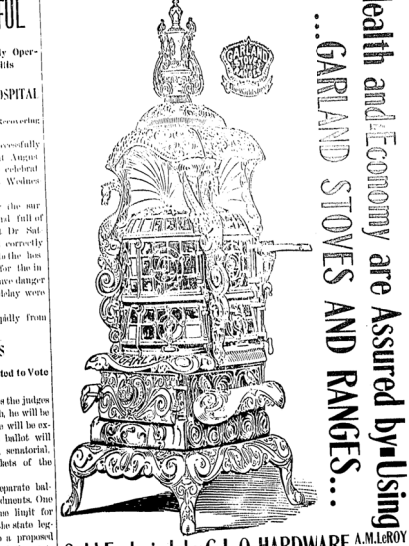
There will also be two separate ballots for constitutional amendments. One proposes a change in the time limit for the introduction of bills in the state legislature; the other relates to a proposed convention for the revision of the state constitution.

The fourth ballot will contain the names of candidates for justice of the peace to fill vacancy caused by the removal from the city of Amos L. Hill.

The big ballot is of prime importance. The Republican ticket appears in the first column of the large ballot and if you will do your duty as a Republican you will place a cross in the circle at the head of that column.

The voters in the township will have three ballots instead of four, as Manistique is the only precinct interested in the election of a justice of the peace.

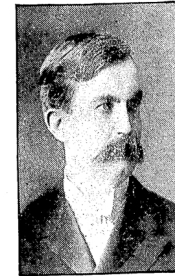

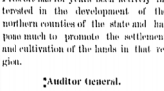

ACCIDENTLY SHOT

Wesley Orr Slightly Wounded in Shoulder by Discharge of Shot Gun

ARM AND SHOULDER INJURED

Accident Occurred Last Saturday in His Own Township.

Wesley Orr had a narrow escape from death last Saturday noon while hunting for partridges in the vicinity of John Creighton's home in Haverhill township. His shot gun slipped out of his hands, and the trigger striking a leg, the gun passed through his right arm and shoulder and narrowly missed his head. His companion, Wallace Adkins, at once carried him and brought him to the Manistique hospital where Dr. Cole dressed his wounds.

He will not be permanently disabled by the accident.

ALONG THE DOCKS

Vernie Coffey Had Narrow Escape During Heavy Blow Monday.

The steamer Harris A. Hart came into port Tuesday morning and discharged a large quantity of freight. The boat was detained at Beaver Island Monday night on account of the fierce storm, and during the night pulled out the spiles to which she was tied, and it was necessary to run the bow on the sandy beach, where she laid until morning.

Vernie Coffey had a narrow escape from a serious disaster on Monday. With two companions he went out on the Lake in the gasoline launch owned by himself and Capt. Piesgenbach. The engine became unmanageable in the heavy seas. Their condition was discovered by Capt. Coffey who started to their assistance, but not having much steam, the tug effort went to the rescue, and towed the boat to safety.

Captain Coffey will fish during the closed season for the purpose of collecting spawns for the United States Fish Commission.

The heavy south-east storm of Monday night filled the channel at the mouth of the river with saw dust, making it difficult for the ferry Manistique to get out of the river.

FISH CHUTES WILL BE BUILT

Game Warden Adkins Has Received Plans for the Chutes to be Placed at River Dams.

Through the persistent work of Deputy Game Warden Adkins, fish chutes will be placed at the two dams on the Manistique river and at the Indian River dam. The plans have been approved by the committee recently appointed by the board of supervisors, consisting of Eugene Howard, W. L. Orr and Chas. Johnson, and when the companies interested are notified to build same the work must be done within thirty days. A penalty of \$20 will be assessed for every month after the first month until same are constructed.

The ladders should have been placed in position years ago, and Mr. Adkins deserves much credit for bringing the matter to a successful consummation. He is certainly attending to his official duties faithfully and well.
