MANISTIQUE HONORED

By Receiving Two of the Principal Offices at State Baptist Convention

A. H. QUICK RELECTED PRESIDENT

And Rev. J. H. Fox is the New President of the Michigan Association

The Baptist anniversary of Michigan was held at Saginaw last week. The several organizations which meet to observe the Michigan anniversary are the Women's Baptist Home and Foreign Mission societies, the Baptist State convention and the Layman's League.

The anniversary opened Monday evening by the annual gathering of the ministers of the State. This conference has three sessions, lasting until Tuesday evening when the President of the State convention calls the convention to order and the main work of the gathering begins. This convention looks three sessions each day until Friday evening when it adjourns and the Laymen of the State hold their annual convocation consisting of a banquet and "toast" or address on questions of special interest to them.

This year nearly 400 delegates to the several organizations met at Saginaw and the meetings were enthusiastic from first to last. These gatherings are of the greatest importance to the Baptists of the State since it is in these annual gatherings that the denominational enterprises and policies are directed. The State Mission Board is here appointed, and has the direction of the Mission work of the State with power to expend thousands of dollars each year for aggressive work in the State. The Bible School Board is appointed and has power to raise and expend large sums of money, this year \$200,000, in the interest of Bible Schools in the State. The officers of the convention hold important positions on these Boards and have a large influence in directing denominational policies. This year our own Deacon M. H. Quick was honored by being elected to the high office of president of the convention without opposition.

Deacon Quick presides over this large assembly with dignity and shows unusual wisdom in making important decisions and in appointing the best committees for prosecuting the work of the convention with success. This year the denominational reports were most encouraging showing splendid growth in all lines of denominational effort.

DEFENDS THE LEGION

Dr. Sattler, President of Local Body, Answers Attack Made Last Week

JEALOUSY BECAUSE OF GROWTH

Responsible for Concerted Attack Upon the Legion by the "Pioneer"

Inasmuch as the "Pioneer" in its last week's issue published an item quoted from the Insurance Independent, attacking the National Protective Legion in a rather harsh and unjust manner, I consider it my duty as president of the local order to not only defend the 100 members in Manistique, but the whole membership and general public as well by a brief reply.

In the published statement the promoters of the N. P. L. are branded as a band of lawless swindlers, compared to those who are now serving time in state prisons for promoting illegitimate schemes.

I am surprised that a man who claims to be public spirited will deliberately publish a statement as the one mentioned above, having established in it such sinister motives toward one of the most practical and prosperous societies in the United States, without first investigating the facts in the matter.

The Insurance Independent has indignantly and resolutely published statements relative to the N. P. L. which are grossly misleading and untrue. These statements have been copied and recopied by local papers which are not friendly to the order, endeavoring thereby to create a sentiment against the organization.

The recent man says that out of a membership of 100 in Manistique, only about 100 have profited by the order. I presume he means that only that number have drawn a cash dividend; while that is true, does he expect a member to draw a dividend the first year of membership? There are several hundred old line policy holders in town, and as only a comparatively few have profited by their investment thus far, does this prove that old line insurance is a fraud? The fact is that where it usually requires fifteen or twenty years to mature an investment in old line, it only takes five years. Besides the members in the N. P. L. are protected against sickness and accident, also have a life insurance. These are features that the editor evidently omitted either through ignorance or to mislead the public.

I would rather give up all I have secured or hope to secure, than to give any reason for the blush of shame to come to the cheeks of my wife or children through any action of mine or through any failure to do that which duty will demand. I desire and expect to be the servant of the people, not a political boss or party dictator."

The escape of high class rogues not only encourages others to repeat their offenses; it saps the confidence of all the people in the justice and equality of law and leads to escape of humbler offenders on the theory that they are no more guilty than men of higher station who have escaped.

The federal courts are far more free than the state courts from the suspicion of respecting caste in crime. This is due, partly to their freedom from local influences, partly to the elevation of their judges above political influence by life appointment. The relentless pursuit of criminals of wealth and station in the military and civil service of the United States is a continually purifying influence in our political and social life.

The spectacle of senators and wealthy bankers, army officers of social prominence and high contractors sent to jail like common thieves is a saving force in the republic.—Minneapolis Tribune.

THE LEGION HAS RIGHT.

Every month or two one of Manistique's citizens, dies, and his beneficiary receives a thousand dollars from some insurance company in which he has paid from \$10 to \$200. No one questions the ability of the companies to pay the amount, yet there are jealous individuals that are sure the National Protective Legion cannot pay \$1000 for every \$500 paid by members. The real source of the fight against the legion is that its rapid growth has made it a number of bitter enemies in the field of life insurance and investment.

The legion has a surplus of about \$5,000,000 and this is growing at the rate of \$50,000 a month. If the legion was securing 250 members a month instead of 5000 as is the case, and if the surplus was growing at the rate of a \$1000 per month no one would deign to attack it. Success always invites envy and jealousy.

One of the principal arguments made against the legion is that the money paid in by the new members is used to assist in paying the dividends to the older members. Is there a life insurance company in the world that does not do the same thing? The policy holder in any life insurance company that insures with that his individual premiums are laid aside and with the amounts they earn are paid back to him at death, certainly knows but little about insurance.

No man ever pays as much into a life insurance company as he secures at death.

For instance the average Maccabee pays in less than \$100 before he dies, yet his beneficiary secures \$1000. No one questions its ability to do this as it is one of the best fraternal insurance companies in the world, and one that deserves support, yet people that are familiar with these facts will attack the legion and question its ability to pay \$1000 for every \$500 paid in.

The legion has been under fire before, and notwithstanding this is enjoying a more rapid growth than any other fraternal order in the United States.

Manistique has 650 members, comprising many of its best citizens, and the unwarranted attack reproduced in a contemporary does not appear to shake them in their faith for an order that is doing so much good.

Ryan of this city is by far the best, best among over one hundred varieties heretofore bred by the upper peninsula."

It should not be necessary to insist upon the importance of this line of work or upon the necessity of providing the station with ample means for carrying on this work more extensively.
