TIDINGS FROM SCANDINAVIA

News of General Interest from Three Countries.

THE RED TAPE IN SWEDEN

What Had To Be Done Before the Broken Glass in One of the Signal Lamps Used on the State Railway Could Be Replaced—Why the Swedish Minister to Washington Entertains Society in the Way Which Holds in Old Sweden.

SWEDEN.

Talking about red tape, there is certainly an abundance of that in Sweden. It is to be seen from the following statement made by one of the representatives in the rising of the other day while discussing the rolling material used on the state railways of the country. He related an incident from Crocker. The station agent reported to the station director that a glass on one of the signal lamps had broken. The station agent asked the traffic inspector for a new glass; the traffic inspector turned to the supply house in Stockholm; the supply house ordered a new glass from the machine director in the third district; this in turn turned to the central machine shops in Gothenburg; the glass delivered to the supply house in Stockholm, who sent it first to the traffic manager, who after certifying Washington station wife of the which holds in old Sweden. She is a delightful addition to the capital's social ranks, say women who ought to know what constitutes that mysterious thing, a "delightful social addition." She is the daughter of Senator Cronberg, prominent in recent Swedish statesmanship. She has brought all her furnishings from Stockholm, and the legation is one of the best equipped in Washington. Mrs. Lagercrantz gives receptions after the European fashion. She has to entertain her refreshments for the guests and chats gaily. Below stairs guests may play cards if they wish, though the Swedish minister is an exceedingly solemn and non-card-playing gentleman. In another room you may have music and the refreshments that don't go in by way of your ears.

She is a correspondent in a recent issue of the Scandinavia. "Why the patriots in this country are using every available effort to check immigration and the need for the home-entreat agents has been reduced to very narrow lines, the Danish agent is only laughing up his sleeve for his hold of operations in Sweden. At least it appears to be growing larger every day. It just happens in this country that reports to the province that there are a few Swedes who emigrate to America from this section every year and in his case out of ten who are the Danish agent who has made out the papers—agent in Copenhagen—and the emigrant has no trouble whatever in getting through the lines. Still out patriotic Swedes are writing long articles in the newspapers telling how they are checking emigration.

Dr. John George Schulz, medical inspector for the insan asylums of the country, died a few days ago aged forty-four years. Although only a comparatively young man, he had nevertheless achieved most success in his chosen profession and was one of the best diagnosticians for insan cases in all Sweden. He was a graduate of the medical department of the United States university and had spent years of study abroad. During the past year his health broke down completely and last September he had to abandon his work altogether. He had scores of friends in Stockholm and held in high esteem in Berlin and Copenhagen, where medical authorities were familiar with his work.

The Ditch and Trenches of Sodermanland have purchased the beautiful lots in the villa section of Furusund. It is a most ideal location for a villa and the duke has ordered that a suitable building be erected there at once. The building will be completed during the latter part of June and the duke and Duchess will occupy the villa about July 1.

The Moeven Hotel has been sold to Dr. John Scholander, a prominent dentist of Christiania, for 20,000 crowns.

DENMARK.
During the latter part of last month when about 100 fishermen were engaged in fishing through the ice in Skivefjord the ice about them broke. To give way and they all found themselves drifting out to sea. A couple of fishermen threw themselves into the water, managed to swim to shore and get a number of boats and finally succeeded in bringing the rest of the fishermen safely ashore. One man losing their joy when they found themselves all safe on firm ground.

Copenhagen papers announce that the University of Copenhagen will send Professor Otto Jenson to lecture at Columbia university next fall. Professor Bernhard Bendtsen, a student of international note, will deliver lectures on scientific farming in the Danish settlements of the United States during the summer and fall of 1910. Professor Anderson of the University of Copenhagen, will tour the United States under the auspices of the Danish-American association.

There were 224 apothecaries in Denmark in 1908, one for every 11,650 if one for every 16,000. This means that more medicine is used by the Danish people today than fifty years ago, and that the apothecaries do not work so hard as formerly.

NORWAY.
It is really a surprising matter to note how the Mielchen fund has been growing. It now reaches the goodly sum of 214,000 crowns, and is in honor of the former premier and the name of Mielchen seems to be a great drawing card in Norway, the fund being so popular in popularity. Of the above mentioned amount, 80,000 crowns were raised in Christiania and vicinity.

Last year there were postal money orders sent from the United States to Norway amounting to 9,600,000 crowns. In 1907 they amounted to more than 11,800,000 crowns. In spite of the fact that the United States is Norway's largest market, Norway exports more than 100,000,000 crowns worth of goods to the United States each year. The American republic is often mentioned most unmercifully in this country.

In Stavanger and other Norwegian cities where Norwegian beer is not at present available, the local assembly of dealers who had license prior to 1882 are now selling Danish beer and quantities of it from that country in large quantities. The far from seems that there is no law which prevents the sale of foreign beer in Norway.

Shipwreckers have been frequent in Norway this winter, especially in the northern section of the country, where entire districts have been abandoned. A number of lives have been lost and the cold weather has in many places caused the loss of lives and suffering among the few who remained.

Recent dispatches from Victoria, B. C., say that a whaling company is being organized in Norway to send two floating whaling stations conveying the best kind of whaling steamer to the Antarctic to take off the Falkland Islands, South Shetland and South Georgia.

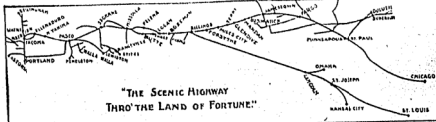

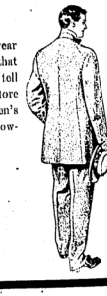

FISH TUG DISABLED.

Capt. Fiegenbaum and crew at the mercy of the waves for many hours this week. Capt. Fiegenbaum and crew had a harrowing experience Wednesday afternoon and night. They left port with Fiegenbaum's gasoline boat to do a little fishing in the vicinity of the harbor, about two o'clock Wednesday afternoon, and on their return to port went aground at Blumrose's point, at an early hour in the evening. They managed to re-launch the boat, and as their supply of gasoline was exhausted, they were at the mercy of the gale that was prevailing at the time. Their sail was whipped to shreds, and with anchor dragging they were blown out into the lake. One of the harbor tugs, was sent out to search for the boat, but the evening, as it was known that they were overdue, but failed to find it. The search was resumed in the morning, but they were sighted about eight miles out. The crew suffered severely on account of the cold, and were in grave danger the entire time.

THE GRANGE ORGANIZATION.

And the Fan Behind the Work in Schoolcraft County Organizer "White" Deserves Much Credit. The order of Patrons of Husbandry has just completed its campaign in this county by the organization of a Pomona or county Grange. In this connection it is timely to consider how the work was accomplished. The work of organization was completed in about seven weeks, by one man Deputy John P. White. At the annual meeting of the National Grange held last November, the report showed that only thirteen new Granges had been organized in Michigan last year. Deputy White began work in the organization in November, and on December 8th he came to the upper peninsula, first coming to Luce county. Between that date and the present, he has organized eighteen subordinates and one county Grange, in the counties of Luce, Mackinac, Delta and Schoolcraft. This is a wonderful record he made in a comparatively working entirely on foot, walking an average of twenty miles a day. Mr. White says with two or three exceptions he has been on the road every day during his life as a pedagogue. He lays no claim to being an orator or public speaker, and the success of his efforts can be attributed to hard work, and a home to leave cavasus. He is a successful young dairyman residing in Ottawa county, this state, and has a herd of registered Jersey cows. As a broken arm made it impossible for him to milk, he took to the work of organizing Granges. Here a thorough believer in the order, and his very earnestness carries much weight with those he meets.
