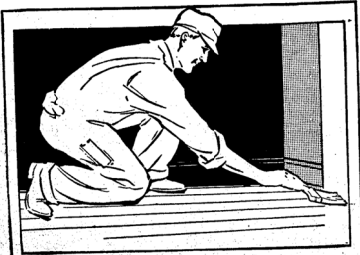

Will Test Value Of Reed Canary Grass

The value of reed canary grass for pasture is being determined at the Upper Peninsula Experiment Station by L. H. Blackless, research assistant in animal husbandry, and B. R. Churchill, research assistant in farm crops. Sheep are being pastured on this crop and a comparison made with permanent June grass and red clover pastures. Records of actual weights and pasture days are being kept of the sheep on the different lots.

A great deal has been written in farm papers about reed canary grass," says Mr. Blackless and Mr. Churchill. "Because of this publicity many people have asked us about the crop in Upper Peninsula conditions. We believe one year's test will give some indication of results and we invite anyone interested to visit the experimental station at Round-Up time August 12. 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MORE FOR SMALLER COUNTIES

The schedule of apportioning federal money to Michigan counties announced last week in Escanaba by MURRAY D. Van Wagoner, state highway commissioner, means that Schoolcraft county will get \$123,000, according to figures computed by John McCarthy, county highway engineer.

This is more money than the county received for work on federal and state trunk lines in the past, according to Mr. McCarthy, and refuses to a large extent to the opinions on that point in a recent issue of the Escanaba Press in which it was charged that Van Wagoner's schedule would result in discriminations against upper peninsula counties to the benefit of the big counties in lower Michigan.

Commissioner Van Wagoner announced that henceforth this money would be distributed to the various counties on the basis of population, area and trunk line mileage. The Press charged that this would mean less highway work for the upper peninsula and more for the lower.

It probably will mean that some of the bigger counties of the upper peninsula, like Delta, Marquette and Chippewy, will not get their share of the money, but the smaller counties like Schoolcraft, Alger, Luce and Baraga, will be able to get a more just amount of money for trunk line construction.

The estimates made by the county highway engineer would indicate that this is the case.

\$568,200 Ready for Northwest Farmers, Land Bank Declares

Financial relief for farmers of the Northwest could be greatly expedited if creditors and farmer debtors could compose their differences and let the Land Bank Commission's agent, send out the hundreds of thousands of dollars waiting for them. This relief is wanted for the creditors as well as the debtors, many creditors being in as severe straits as the farmers.

"Some states have already set up boards of conciliation. In one state at least those boards are offering their services to bring about such compositions on over-taxed farms. The extension of such compositions at the universities are doing a little to bring about these agreements. The debtor and creditor must come to effect these compositions. Unless they are effected, and unless something is done to bring the debtor and creditor together, the full relief which the government is trying to bring about will be impossible.

Save All Good Oats For Seed Next Year

Good prices for oats, with enough quality to make them suitable for seed are predicted by Michigan State College, which advises farmers to save any of their grain which is suitable for planting next year's crop.

This is the second successive year when seed oats are apt to sell at a premium. Last season's yield was fair but the quality was not so good and growers who had rats of good weight had little trouble selling their oats at a nice advance above prices for feed.

New oats will probably be of fair quality in this state but the yield will be very low. Reports from the principal oat producing states indicate that a short crop is being harvested all over the country and that buyers are all early looking for stocks of seed oats.

Michigan has a ready market for grain and seeds built up through years of supplying high quality products to other states. The present unusually short crop probably started buyers to search in Michigan for good seed stock.
