Dim Lights As Accident Curb, Police Warn

Manistique State Police Co-Operating With Automobile Club Appeal

Because blinding headlights have been a frequent cause for the large toll of accidents, an appeal was made this week by Automobile Club of Michigan for car owners to place more emphasis on dimming their "brights" when approaching oncoming vehicles.

In a letter to C. J. Scavarda, of the state police, Ernest P. Davis, director of safety and traffic for Auto Club, asked that state troopers pay particular attention to this fault of night drivers.

State police in Manistique have been notified to check on cars in this area.

After cleaning the headlight lenses and checking the wiring system, the lower beam should provide sufficient illumination for ordinary night travel, Davis said.

"The high beam, he said, "was designed for use in the open country, or in hilly or mountainous districts where sight distances are shorter. But to be on the safe side, and to be fair to the driver of the car coming toward you, the beam should be depressed whenever necessary."

Juveniles With Rifles May Cause Parents Trouble

Spring fever that sends juveniles afield with .22 calibre rifles may not get their parents into trouble, and the conservation department wants it definitely known that its off-season gun permits authorize no indiscriminate shooting.

The department has been issuing gun permits at the rate of 500 a week since the first of the year, many of them to returned servicemen, for such legitimate purposes as target practice and the killing of crows and predators.

Small boys abroad after the winter's confinement have been guilty of shooting at telephone pole insulators, bottles tossed into the river, songbirds and even windows of vacant buildings. Few of them, roaming the countryside with gun and gun permit, realize that, just as in hunting season, they must be accompanied by parent or other qualified older person until they pass their seventeenth birthday. Laws against trespass affect them just as strongly as in hunting season, also.

Conservation officers who find unaccompanied juveniles using firearms in a way to alarm suburban residents may hold the guns until the parents are interviewed. Older offenders may be prosecuted for careless use of firearms.

State Health Commissioner Issues Warning To Guard Against Disease
"Every person who has not been successfully vaccinated for smallpox in the past five years should see his physician immediately for this protection." This warning is issued to Michigan citizens by the state health commissioner, Dr. William DeKleene, following notification from the U. S. Public Health Service that the west coast has an outbreak of smallpox introduced from the Orient.

In a notice to the Alger-Schoolcraft health department, Dr. DeKleene stated that the west coast outbreak is apparently a more deadly form of the disease than Michigan has known since the 1921 epidemic of hemorrhagic smallpox.

"Except for a few areas where health officers have continually emphasized vaccination, Michigan is vulnerable," the commissioner said. Although there are no records on the percentage of the total population vaccinated, he estimated that it is less than one-third. Michigan's first case of smallpox since November 1945, was reported April 3 from Emmet county.

In 1918 he was sent to Honduras, Central America. Establishing a mission in Tegucigalpa he studied the Spanish language and began missionary work in the villages of the interior which was to continue for many years.

Many times his travels took him on foot over rugged and wild mountainous terrain. Often the trail was completely obliterated by the encroaching jungle.

In 1926 he accepted a tour as chaplain with the Civilian Conservation Corps. He was called to active duty with the army in 1940, arriving for duty as Sixth Air Force Chaplain in March 1945.

APRIL IS CANCER CONTROL MONTH
