PEN HICKER HOME.

He is still quite sick but improving slowly.

Private George Penhick, who was in Cuba with the Tenth, Fourth and Fifth regiments, Houghton, and was at Camp Wikoff, returned home Tuesday afternoon. He was taken to St. John's hospital Long Island City, shortly after the regiment arrived at Montauk Point and for several days, two weeks ago, his life was in danger. Excellent medical attendance and splendid nursing aided with his strong constitution brought him over the dangerous point of the dreadful fever which has claimed so many of the boys of the Tenth who offered their services in defense of the Stars and Stripes. Our people have prayed that Pen might be spared to return and all were glad to welcome him to his home.

It was not known until noon Tuesday that he was to return that day but nevertheless hundreds of friends met him at the depot and a procession of carriages and wheelmen, headed by the Manistique Band escorted the young soldier to his home. At the depot, upon the arrival of the train, the band played "Home, Sweet Home."

Pen's illness has made him a nervous man, his eyes swollen, his face jaundiced and when he arrived at the depot he had to be assisted from the train to the carriage. Many friends greeted him on his arrival and he expressed the pleasure it gave him to look upon familiar countenances and to be at home again.

Since his arrival his condition has improved wonderfully and soon he may expect to be able to visit with his friends again. As yet, but the most intimate friends are allowed to visit with him. Twice since his homecoming he has been down the city in a carriage.

He brought with him from Santiago a mackintosh, field glasses picked up in San Juan Hill, an officers' belt belonging to one of Cervantes' lieutenants, cartridges, etc.

While at Camp Wikoff Pen was accidentally cured by Messrs. Osborne and Guck, the former a professor in the Houghton school of which Pen was a student, and the latter of Lake Linden. These young men cared for him when it was thought that he would soon answer his last roll call and to them he is greatly indebted for a new lease of life.

His experience since leaving home some four months ago is the same as told by hundreds of others, and its successful condition speaks more than words can tell of the hardships he must have withstood.

SACRIFICING OF LIFE.

Injuries to Mr. Ramsey by falling down stairs Causes Death.

Charles Ramsey, aged 70 years, father of Contractor William S. Ramsey, of this city, fell down stairs at the Delta Lumber Co's boarding house, Thursday night at 12 o'clock Wednesday morning and the injuries received were such that he died about fifteen minutes after. Dr. Suttler, coroner was not notified of the accident and upon examination decided that death was caused by hemorrhage to the brain. It was thought not necessary to hold an inquest.

Mr. Ramsey had retired quite early in his usual good health and must have taken ill in the night and in attempting to go down stairs slipped and fell. Mr. and Mrs. Jewell heard a noise as if of someone falling and Mr. Jewell went downstairs to find the fatal fall. He spoke to him but received no answer, then lifted him up and found that he was unconscious. Mr. Jewell called Mr. Chapman and they carried for

him to the hospital as best they could, but life soon left the body. They found that he was injured about the head, with a fracture on the forehead and neck in rear and it was thought the neck was broken which proved untrue. Word was sent at once to his son W. Ramsey of this city, who at the time was near Boise and a special messenger was sent there to appear him of the sad demise of his father's life. Mr. R. returned home on the afternoon train and immediately arranged to have the body brought to his home and prepared for burial.

The funeral occurred yesterday afternoon and was conducted by the Masonic order of which deceased was long a member, having joined the order in 1882. Services were held in the Protestant church and the body interred in the city cemetery.

Deceased was born in Douglas, Lanark Co., Scotland, February 6th, 1828. He came to New York in 1850 and 1853 moved to Long Point near Toronto, Canada. In 1853 he settled in Ohio and in the fall of the same year came to this county where he resided continuously. His wife died many years ago and was buried at Glasgow, Scotland, and two daughters and a son are also dead, leaving but one member of the family, W. S. Ramsey, of this city.

The funeral was largely attended although the day was very unpleasant. Some thirty members of the Masonic order followed the remains of the deceased brother to their last resting place.

Lightning Plays Havoc.

Lightning struck the residence of L. L. Burdell, 210 So. line agent at Whitecloud, during the electrical storm only Tuesday morning. The bolt set fire to the building, burning it to the ground. Content of the house was saved. Loss on it about \$100, no insurance.

Luckily Mr. Burdell's family were away on a visit, for when home the family occupied a room on the second floor, into which the bolt entered.

Monroe, La.—The retail grocery store of H. K. Fluter was destroyed by fire. The loss on stock and fixtures was \$500.

Milwaukee—An unknown bicyclist ran into the river and drowned.

Spokane, Id.—A cyclone swept over Springfield township, killing three men, six horses, fourteen cows and destroying a number of barns and out-buildings.

New York—The first gust of wind that preceded a thunderstorm blew down the heavy iron superstructure of New York, at the foot of West Twenty-third street, killing two men and injuring ten.

Duluth, Minn.—Archibald Platson was killed, Arthur Treadwell probably fatally hurt, and Charles Warren and Lieut. Cameron badly injured in a collision with a trolley car. All of the injured were members of Hook and Ladder No. 1.

Two Rivers, Wis.—Forest fires are raging in this vicinity.

Morris, Ill.—The Catholic Church at Morris was destroyed by fire. Loss, \$20,000; Insurance, \$5,000.

Revere, Mass.—The big bathing pavilion at Revere beach, built by the Metropolitan Hotel commission, has been burned. Loss to the state about \$50,000.

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DOG DAYS IN COURT.

Interesting Legal Battles About Our Canine Friends.

From News and Comment: A pretty little dog in Michigan was found to have desecrated \$10 worth of meat at one sitting. Cheney vs. Russell, 41 Michigan, 620. If a dog greedily and maliciously behind the counter of a shop and there feloniously applies to his own use bread and cheese left for mice and rats, and vies from the effects of poison against the owner, his death does not lie at the shopkeeper's door, though he die there. Appleton, Ch. J. in State vs. Harman, 75 Mo. 502. An Am. B. & O. C. P. No. 21, 219, N. S. 729. Where a small dog was away from home desecrated, although the statute required a collar, and was killed by a large dog, and the defense was that the killing was lawful because of the want of a collar, it was held by the court that the big dog was not de facto a police officer or constable, and was not shown to have examined the records to see whether or not the little dog had been licensed to travel without a collar. Detroit vs. Hackett (Mich.), 3 Cent. L. J. 473. On the prosecution of a negro for stealing a dog with a collar on, when a defamer to the indictment was sustained, the prosecution claimed that he stole the dog with the collar on, but the defense claimed that he stole the dog only and the dog took the collar. The prisoner was finally discharged.—3 Cent. L. J. 514.

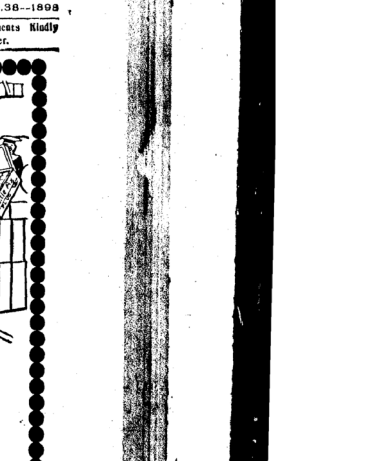

UPPER PENINSULA NEWS.

The Escanaba Mirror is again agitating the project of dividing Michigan into two states, with the straits of Mackinac as the boundary, and suggests that Escanaba be made the capital of the "State of Superior."

A little child was met with a peculiar accident recently at South St. Marie which resulted in its death. It fell while walking on the sidewalk, and a nail which was sticking up through a board pierced its forehead, making a fatal wound.

Canada's new library is now open. It is a fine building, a good location and the expenses of running it will be borne equally by the Calumet & Hecla and the school board. In addition to the library there will be a bath room, reading room, entertainment hall and rooms for different forms of amusement.
