ESTERDAY ARRESTED

Warrant issued for Attempting to Take the Life of Miss Roberts.

Frank Esterday, of Cleveland, who arrived in this city on Thursday last and stopping at the American House, was placed under arrest Saturday evening by Sheriff Ekstrom and Marshal Jacher, upon a warrant issued from the prosecuting attorney's office by Miss Abshale Roberts, charging Esterday with attempting to take her life. When Esterday was arrested he was at the American House. He was searched but no firearms were found on his person.

The story of the affair as told, is that Miss Roberts became acquainted with Esterday in Milwaukee some two years ago, that he had shown her some attention and that they had been on friendly terms. His friendship had kindled into love but had not been reciprocated by the young lady. Esterday came here for the purpose of asking for Miss Roberts' hand in marriage, called at the dressmaking parlor on Oak street for that purpose, was refused, then he became enraged and threatened to take the young lady's life. The young lady in the shop claim he exhibited a revolver.

Miss Roberts left the parlor to notify the authorities and Esterday followed, going to the hotel where he was arrested and then taken to jail.

Monday morning before the time set for Esterday's examination, the charge against the prisoner made by Miss Roberts, was changed to that of assault and battery to which charge he pleaded guilty before Judge Hill. He was fined \$5.00, which with the costs added amounted to \$11.00, which amount he paid and departed on the afternoon train for Chicago.

Frank Esterday is a motorman and was employed for some two years in Milwaukee, leaving there about eighteen months ago, going to Cleveland. He is a well-behaved man, was well dressed and had considerable money.

FARM BUILDINGS BURN

Three buildings, a stock of grain and a quantity of hay consumed.

The big farm barn, two sheds, two stacks of grain, a hundred bushels of oats and about 125 tons of loose hay were burned at the Indian Lake farm of the Chicago Lumbering Co., managed by Mr. Billings. The fire, which started from a peck stack near the buildings, less about \$5,000, no insurance.

The dimensions of the buildings were as follows: Barn, six by 12; sheds, 12 by 24 and 12 by 24. Contained in the buildings, besides the hay and grain were plows, sleighs and other farm implements which were saved as was also about one hundred bushels of oats. The stacks contained oats and peas.

Rockwell McIntyre, who owns the tract, noticed the fire first at the base of the stack and made an attempt to stamp it out but without avail.

Only about one hundred bushels of oats were threshed and that amount was saved.

DECEASED BY A BULLET

Miscellaneous Passed through Woman's Breast Making an Easy Wound.

Mrs. Cradler, wife of Clark Cradler, residing in the Dodge neighborhood, was a violently shot last Sunday afternoon, a 1200 bullet from a Winchester out-rig the left breast, grazing the

heart bone and passing out through the right breast. The missile came within an inch of the heart.

Mr. and Mrs. Cradler were out dinner with Anson Hodgins, foreman for E. H. Benson, happened along and they entered into conversation. Hodgins stated that there was something the matter with the gun he was carrying and while examining the lock it was accidentally discharged with above results.

Dr. Burdick was called and dressed the wounds. He states that the injury is not dangerous and that the patient is getting along nicely when called on Tuesday.

Poor Board Appointments

On Saturday the county poor commissioners met in annual session, at which bills made out their annual report and made appointments. All the members were present.

They appointed as supervisor of the poor house, Mrs. L. H. Simmons, and county physician, Dr. Frank Rainey.

There now appears to be two county doctors. Dr. Bowen being appointed at the July meeting and for one year from Oct. 1st. Both have entered upon the duties of the office and the question now arises who is "it." The appointments have caused considerable talk and the members of the board are being ostracized by many. As it looks at the present time the question of who is the poor doctor will have to be settled in the courts.

Lumber Yard Burned.

On Tuesday, the immense lumber yard of the Wheeler & Dusenberry company, located at Endonover, Pa., were completely destroyed. Over 8,000,000 ft. of lumber were burned, together with three houses, entailing a loss of about \$50,000. The insurance on the lumber is \$5,000.

The owner the firm N. P. Wheeler, a member of the Chicago Lumbering Co. of this city, and quite well known in the north.

At a meeting of the school board Monday the following appointments were made: Trust officer, Alex. Davidson; librarian, Miss Edith Fuller. The board has arranged the time for the library to be open as follows: Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays from 1 to 4 o'clock; Wednesdays and Fridays from 1 to 6 o'clock in the afternoon. Books are free to all.

Amicable Settlement

At a meeting of the village council Tuesday evening the Village and N. J. Car Spring and Rubber Co. amicably settled their differences in the hose deal made early in the year. The Village purchased through P. H. Browning, the agent's company, St. Paul, 1000 ft. of cotton covered hose, early in the year, and said hose was not as good as sample from which the selection was made. Chief Laose of the department had considerable correspondence with Browning regarding the hose but could not effect a satisfactory settlement until the arrival of Mr. Browning Tuesday.

The hose was billed to the Village at 25 cents per ft. amounting to \$250. The settlement which was made Tuesday evening, after some correspondence, was the settlement of \$238.50 and in addition we are to receive a ball-bearing cart to carry 1000 ft. of hose, valued at \$125. a 2 1/2 in. expansion coupling valued at \$15, and four sets of coupling \$9, all to be delivered free of charge.
