Yeah, team!

THE TIME OF YEAR may have something to do with it, with summer's lazy days and vacations and swimming and fishing and the rest of the good life, but this week we just can't seem to get stirred up over the Mideast crisis, inflation, politics, Vietnam and student dissent.

Let it be said instead that this week we joined with the rest of our area in pointing with pride at our Little League team and their tournament record.

Little League has an enviable reputation in our community. The program has gone on for 10 years or so with a minimum of trouble. Public support has been good, a lot of kids have learned to play basebeen good, a lot of kins have learned to play base-ball, and a lot of parents have participated. The new field that was put into use this year is a fine ex-ample of this support, and a credit to the Jaycees and others who promoted its building.

The world still has its problems, but we still have our Little Leaguers, and we'd like to join with the rest of our area in applauding these youngsters and the enjoyment they have brought us, the pride and the recognition.

Using our lands

IT HASN'T CREATED MUCH OF A STIR yet, but the report of the Public Land Law Review Commission could have far-reaching implications, not only for the country at large but for Schoolcraft County and the Upper Peninsula in particular.

It took six years of work and \$7 million to produce the report of the commission, which totals 342 pages and has 387 recommendations. It will take considerable more time to sift through the report and to start turning the recommendations into practice.

This area will be affected because of the high percentage of land owned by the Federal government. In Schoolcraft County, for instance, close to 70 per cent of the land is held by Federal or State agencies. School and local government officials are particularly aware of this because these lands produce no local tax reverues and thus contribute very little directly to the increasing cost of government.

Portions of the report are receiving heavy fire from conservationist groups. These portions deal with permitting fuller private development of the public domain. The report says that timber produc-tions should "dominate" national forests over recreation and other uses. Mining and grazing should be further facilitated, and some oil-shale holdings should be opened to commercial drillers.

Those who oppose these private development provisions predict that they will never become a reality. The upsurge in interest in ecology and conservation has come only recently, long since the commission's report was started six years ago.

The Christian Science Monitor reports: "The epoch when lumber, mining, oil-drilling, and live-stock interests worked their will in Congress may indeed have been eclipsed by the environmental era. A national timber supply act to increase commercial cutting in national forests, as the commission later recommended, was rejected by the House of Representatives in February before even reaching the floor.'

The impact on other areas of usage of public lands will still mightly affect this area. The Public Land Law Review Commission report deserves our careful study and attention,

Maybelle and me

Several people have expressed curiosity about how a simple, north country weekly newspaper editor such as myself could ever have become acquainted with such a glamorous, exotic and exciting show business personality such as my friend Maybelle McZoom, the prominent Hollywood starlet.

The correspondence continued and flourished. The correspondence continued and tourismed, and ultimately Maybelle herself came to visit. The editor in real life was obviously an improvement over a picture of the editor being embalmed, she was noticeably impressed with emoaimed, she was noticeably impressed with my maturity and insight, and evidently accepted my simple living style as another manifestation of my various eccentricities. Our relationship deepened to the point where she has agreed to assist me with surveys and personal ap-pearances, and at this writing I am happy to report that Miss McZoom and I are truly bosom friends.


Only eighteen percent of the people vote in a primary, so teach more about the responsibilities of citizenship in a




