Official Proceedings OF THE MANISTIQUE CITY COUNCIL

July 27, 1970
A regular meeting of the Manistique City Council was held on July 27, 1970, at 7:30 P.M. at City Hall. There were present: Councilmen Rose, DeMars, Regue, Cayia, Barber and City Attorney Berger. Absent: None.

The minutes of the regular meeting of July 13, 1970, and regular meeting of July 15, 1970, were approved as read. Mr. Elmar Gustafson was present to ask about removal of trees on South Mackinac Avenue before curbing and resurfacing was put in and also inquired about water and sewer connections, rates and sewer roofing.

An invoice for soil borings at the former proposed Arbutus site on US27 was discussed and the responsibility for payment was determined.

Moved by Councilman Cayia, supported by Councilman DeMars, RESOLVED, that the invoice of Wazany Engineering Company for subsurface investigation of the site on US27 near Lake Street, in the amount of \$620.00 be paid for with funds from the Arbutus Trust.

Moved by Councilman Cayia, DeMars, Barber, Regue, No: None. Councilman Regue inquired about a sidewalk to run from the Senior Citizens apartment building to the corner near Arbutus Avenue and also said that some of the apartments residents on the west side of the building had complained of the excessive heat this summer. It was suggested that both items be referred to the Housing Commission.

Councilman DeMars read a letter he had received from Mr. Keith Wilson that he would recommend to the Waterways Commission at its September meeting that the Waterways Commission assume responsibility for all project costs over and above the City's contribution for construction of a marina at Manistique. Mr. Wilson also suggested that the City withdraw its application for a marina project with EDA and concentrate its efforts with EDA on financing an industrial park.

A discussion on the special assessment district for curb and gutter installation was held and the district was to be the same as originally planned except to remove Outer Street from the project.

Moved by Councilman Regue, supported by Councilman DeMars, RESOLVED, notice having been given of the proposal to construct curbing on Arbutus Avenue from US2 to Lake Street, Arbutus Avenue from Lake Street to Range Street, Arbutus Avenue from Cattaraugus to Steuben, Oak Street from Steuben Street to Potter Street, Pearl Street from Main Street to Arbutus Avenue, North Houghton Avenue from Soo Line Tracks to Center Street, Schoolcraft Avenue from Outer Street to Elk Street, Mackinac Avenue from Wolf Street to Elk Street, and Pine Street, all the cost of the same to be paid by special assessment on the lands benefiting therefrom.

RESOLVED, that the Mayor and the City Clerk are hereby authorized to execute on behalf of the City such necessary agreement and other instruments as may be required to evidence the obligation of the City for the unpaid balance of the purchase price of the International Model TD-15 Crawler Tractor purchased from Bark River Culvert and Equipment Co. as authorized by the special council meeting of July 1, 1970, and being payable in one (1) annual installment, plus interest, at five percent (5%) per annum.

Moved by Councilman DeMars, supported by Councilman Regue, that meeting adjourn.

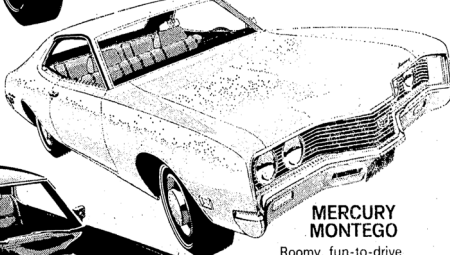

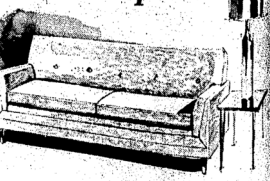

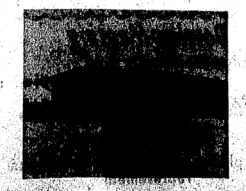

Job census is planned

The Bureau of the Census will conduct a survey of employment and unemployment in this area during the week of August 16, Guy A. Lutz, Director of the Bureau's regional office in St. Paul announced this week.

This survey is conducted monthly by the Bureau for the U.S. Department of Labor in a scientifically designed sample of households throughout the entire United States. The employment and unemployment statistics which are based on the results of this survey are used to provide a continuing measure of the economic health of the Nation as a whole and of its major regions. In June, for example, the survey indicated that 62.1 million persons were employed and 5.9 million were unemployed, with an unemployment rate of 4.1 percent.

Facts supplied by individuals participating in the survey are kept confidential and the results are used only to compile statistical results. The law safeguarding the privacy of the individual applies to all information collected by the Census Bureau.

The interviewer who visits households in this area included in the sample survey will be Beatrice Nelson of Collier.

ORDINANCE NO. 5
AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A HOUSING COMMISSION FOR THE COUNTY OF SCHOOLCRAFT, MICHIGAN.

WHEREAS, insanitary and unsafe inhabited dwelling accommodations exist in the County of Schoolcraft, Michigan;

WHEREAS, there is a shortage of safe and sanitary dwelling accommodations in said County of Schoolcraft available to persons who lack the amount of income necessary to enable them without financial assistance to live in decent, safe and sanitary dwellings without overcrowding; and

WHEREAS, it is determined to be in the public interest that a housing commission be established in the said County of Schoolcraft, Michigan;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE COUNTY OF SCHOOLCRAFT ORDAINS:

1. A housing commission is hereby established in and for the County of Schoolcraft pursuant to the authority of Act 18 of the Public Acts of the Extra Session of 1933, as amended by Act 327, P.A. 1969, including, but not limited to, the power to purchase, acquire, construct, maintain, operate, improve, extend or repair housing facilities and eliminate housing conditions which are detrimental to the public peace, health, safety, morals or welfare of the people of the County of Schoolcraft. The housing commission may recommend to the board of county commissioners the institution and prosecution of proceedings under the power of eminent domain in accordance with the laws of the state relative to condemnation. The Commission shall have such functions, rights, powers, duties and liabilities within any incorporated area of the county as may be provided by contractual agreement between the county and such incorporated area.

The Housing Commission of Schoolcraft County shall consist of five (5) members to be appointed from the county at large by the chairman of the board of commissioners. The term of office of members of the commission shall be five

(5) years. Members of the first commission shall be appointed for the terms of one (1) year, two (2) years, three (3) years, four (4) years and five (5) years, respectively, and annually thereafter one (1) member shall be appointed for the term of five (5) years. The term of each member of the first commission shall commence at 9:00 a.m. on the 1st day of September, 1970. Members of the commission may be removed from office by the chairman of the board of commissioners for cause in accordance with the provisions of state law governing recall of elected officers. Any vacancy in office shall be filled by appointment by the chairman of the board of commissioners for the remainder of the unexpired term.

2. Members of the commission shall serve without compensation but may receive reasonable expenses actually incurred in the carrying out of their official duties as allowed and approved by the board of county commissioners.

This ordinance shall go into effect subsequent to the expiration of 15 days after it has been published in a newspaper of general circulation in the County of Schoolcraft, provided that within that time a petition signed by a number of the qualified electors of such county equal to at least three percent (3%) of the number of voters registered for the last county election has not been filed with the county clerk requesting that the question of the creation of such commission be submitted to the voters of the county. If such petition is filed, the question shall be submitted at a special or general election as provided by Act 327, P.A. 1969. The county clerk is hereby directed to cause this ordinance to be published as soon as possible in the Manistiquette Flower-Tribune, published in the County of Schoolcraft and to be posted in three (3) public places throughout the County of Schoolcraft.

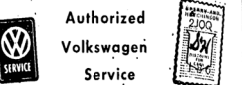

This is the first national meeting of American Indian wo-

... cuss their common problems and possible solutions. It was made possible through the sponsorship of the Associated Country Women of the World and the Country Women's Council. All Extension homemakers are members of the two groups. States were limited in their representation. Michigan could send two and because of a late cancellation, both delegates are from the Upper Peninsula - Miss Bonnie Beshiguad from Wilson and Mrs. Beatrice Labine from Trout Creek. Miss Nancy Burton, an Extension Home Economist from the Copper Country, is also with us.

We've been in session since Sunday night and will continue until sometime Saturday morning. The days are full of talks and discussion. The Indian women are outstanding and real leaders on their reservations and in their communities. Evenings are fun but daytime discussions are serious. Some speakers have been excellent and very frank. They discussed some of the problems the Indian must overcome if he is to live in our technological age.

We have been most impressed with the caliber of the women and enjoy our visits with them while having lunch and dinner or over a cup of coffee between sessions. They're a terrific group. I've never experienced anything quite like it. They're proud of their Indian heritage and are fighting to retain some of their culture while progressing to enter the mainstream of American life. 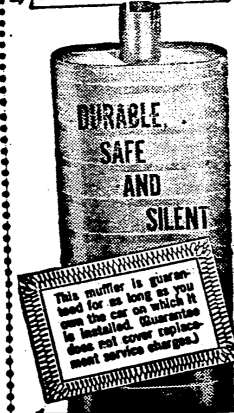

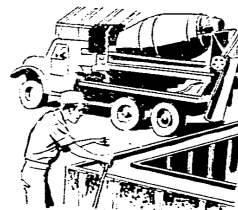

THE TIME OF YEAR may have something to do with it, with summer's lazy days and vacations and swimming and fishing and the rest of the good life, but this week we just can't seem to get stirred up over the Mideast crisis, inflation, politics, Vietnam and student dissent.

Let it be said instead that this week we joined with the rest of our area in pointing with pride at our Little League team and their tournament record.

Little League has an enviable reputation in our community. The program has gone on for 10 years or so with a minimum of trouble. Public support has been good, a lot of kids have learned to play baseball, and a lot of parents have participated. The new field that was put into use this year is a fine example of this support, and a credit to the Jaycees and others who promoted its building.

The world still has its problems, but we still have our Little Leaguers, and we'd like to join with the rest of our area in applauding these youngsters and the enjoyment they have brought us, the pride and the recognition.

Using our lands

IT HASN'T CREATED MUCH OF A STIR yet, but the report of the Public Land Law Review Commission could have far-reaching implications, not only for the country at large but for Schoolcraft County and the Upper Peninsula in particular.

It took six years of work and \$7 million to produce the report of the commission, which totals 342 pages and has 387 recommendations. It will take considerable more time to sift through the report and to start turning the recommendations into practice.

This area will be affected because of the high percentage of land owned by the Federal government. In Schoolcraft County, for instance, close to 70 per cent of the land is held by Federal or State agencies. School and local government officials are particularly aware of this because these lands produce no local tax revenues and thus contribute very little directly to the increasing cost of government.

Portions of the report are receiving heavy fire from conservationist groups. These portions deal with permitting fuller private development of the public domain. The report says that timber production should "dominate" national forests over recreation and other uses. Mining and grazing should be further facilitated, and some oil-shale holdings should be opened to commercial drillers.

Those who oppose these private development provisions predict that they will never become a reality. The upsurge in interest in ecology and conservation has come only recently, long since the commission's report was started six years ago.

The Christian Science Monitor reports: "The epoch when lumber, mining, oil-drilling, and livestock interests worked their will in Congress may indeed have been eclipsed by the environmental era. A national timber supply act to increase commercial cutting in national forests, as the commission later recommended, was rejected by the House of Representatives in February before even reaching the floor."

The impact on other areas of usage of public lands will still mightily affect this area. The Public Land Law Review Commission report deserves our careful study and attention.

Maybelle and me

Several people have expressed curiosity about how a simple, north country weekly newspaper editor such as myself could ever have become acquainted with such a glamorous, exotic and exciting show business personality such as my friend Maybelle McZoom, the prominent Hollywood starlet.

(Faithful readers of this column will recall that it was my friend Maybelle who helped me to conduct my local survey on miniskirts, and who plans to participate in the annual Rutabaga Festival, if and when it is ever held.)

The story of our acquaintance is indeed a fascinating tale, and should probably be recorded here in the interests of historical perspective, if nothing else.

It all started several years ago, during the annual November Seminar conducted at the Upper Inwood Institute of Mathematical Probabilities and Experiment Station on Bob-Tailed Straights and Four Card Flushes, an occasion that coincides with deer season, by some chance.

The question of Miss McZoom, who achieved the titles recently of Miss Avocado, Miss Perfect Posture, and Miss Uplift of 1969 (there's been no holding her since she was named Miss Uplift) came up after one of the Institute trainees came across a picture of her in one of the scientific publications in the reading room. The correspondence continued and flourished, and ultimately Maybelle herself came to visit. The editor in real life was obviously an improvement over a picture of the editor being embalmed, she was noticeably impressed with my maturity and insight, and evidently accepted my simple living style as another manifestation of my various eccentricities. Our relationship deepened to the point where she has agreed to assist me with surveys and personal appearances, and at this writing I am happy to report that Miss McZoom and I are truly bosom friends.

Our relationship has reached the point where I am to serve as organizer of her local fan club, with a charter membership composed of Himself Hentschell, Fat Carl, and my friend Harold the Stone Salesman, and I am happy to report that Miss McZoom and I are good friends.

Unions aren't understood, so teach about the contributions of organized labor to the well being of its constituents and the country.
