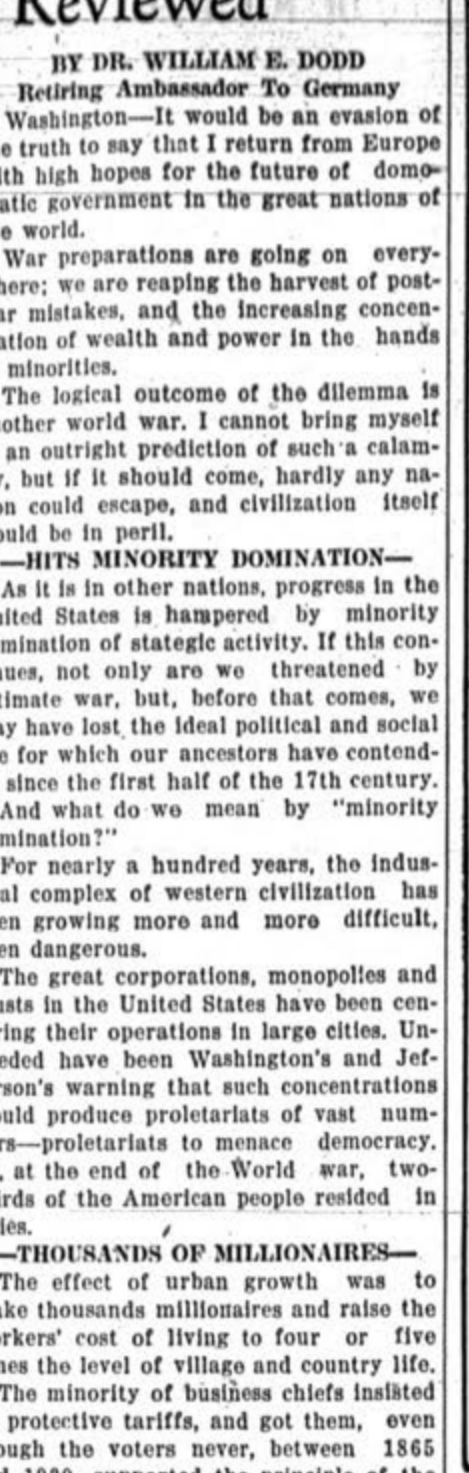
Van Wagoner Honored

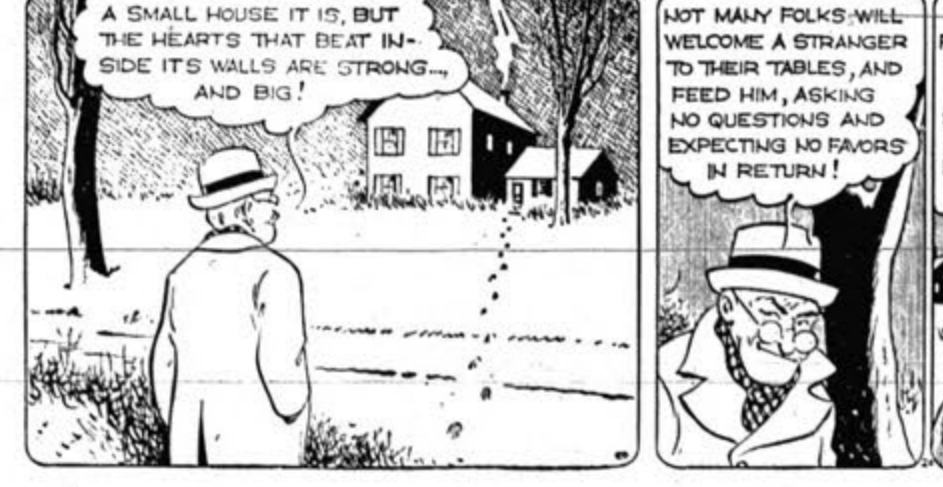

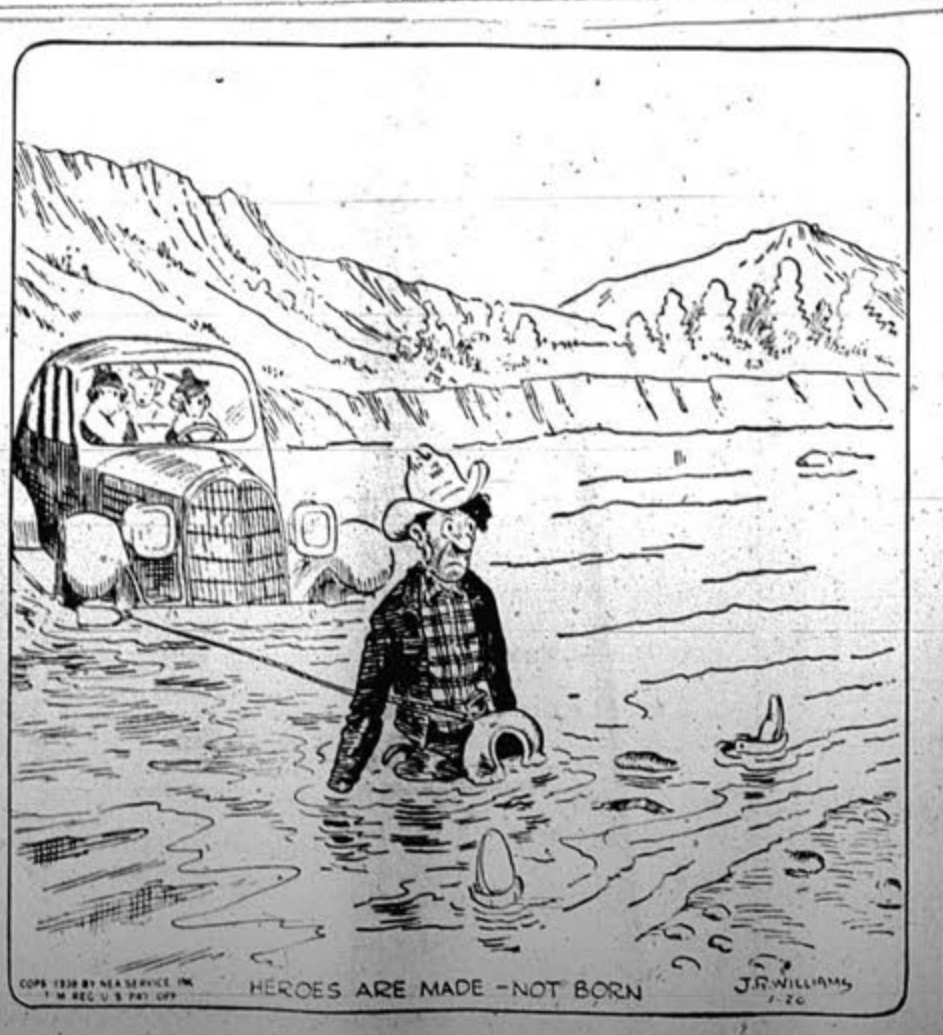
